in formulating a plan by which the rates for cablegrams sent by the genguished from code language, be re duced about one-half. That plan has now been worked out and inasmuch tion in the land line rates, charged by the European Governments, and ments will be necessary.

"At present the cable rate is twened plan is to charge twelve and half cents for every five letters in the class of cablegrams. We have found by careful investigation and examination of a great number of cable message that plain language averages only five letters to the word. and hence if we only charge twelve and a half cents for five letters (ex ery letter in the cablegram bein counted as\_though the whole cable ram was one word), the result would be that the public in sending cable grams would pay but one half o vhat it now pays for these cable rams, it being a part of the plan that hese reduced rate messages will be ubject to prior transmission of mesages paid for at a higher rate.

We hope to be able to put the plan nto operation in a short time. To eing necessary first to make the ne essary arrangements with the Euro ean Governments, I would add that his new mode of charging for cable rams will be a decided advantage to the business public which use lucement to them to put a portion at least of their cablegrams in plain language rather than use a very complicated code which requires a great deal of time on their part, first to code and then to uncode. After the most whole subject we are satisfied that his new method of charging for cablegrams will not only reduce the charges for ordinary cablegrams one half, but the plan itself will be logical simple, workable and satisfactory."

#### Two Persons Killed

and Four Seriously Injured in Fire in New York, Apartment House Real Estate Man Jumps From Fifth Story and is Impaled on Picket

New York, Nov. 11 .- Two persons ere killed and four seriously injured o-day in a fire that destroyed two opper floors of the Rosslind, an partment house on Manhattan Ave., n the upper west side of the city. William H. Abbaott, a real estate operator, 45 years old, jumped from a ront window on the fifth floor and was impaled on a picket fence along the sidewalk below, dying instantly. Mrs. William H. Abbaott, his wife, 0 years old, was burned to death in

her apartment. Serious jujnries were sustained by hree other occupants of the building and by one of the firemen engaged in

putting out the blaze.

But for the heroic work of the firefighters, it is probable that many more persons would have lost their lives. The rear fire escapes on the upper floors were early cut off from access, and there were no emergency exits on the front of the building. By liberally studding the front walls of the structure with extension ladders, lowever, the firemen picked panictricken men and women and child-en out of the windows and passed nem down to the street in safety. mped into a fire net spread over the idewalk and all landed unharmed. Miss Alice Culen, 25 years old, a elephone operator, who lived on the op floor, was the most seriously in-ured of the rescued tenants. Her lothing was ablaze when the firemen reached her and she was taken to a hospital severely burned.

## The Coming Treasure Hunt.

of the expedition, was aboard and from him was learned many interesting details regarding the history of the treasure and the manner in which the present expedition is being pre-

When questioned as to his knowof the treasure Capt. Hackett

have stood right over it, and lack of proper equipment prevented me from bringing the treasure back. A landslide had covered the hiding place to some depth. It was useless to attempt the work with pick and shovel, nothing short of hydraulc machinery would have any effect. On the voyage down I had picked up a shipwrecked crew of twenty-six men and it would have been unwise of me to try to uncover the treasure in the presence of this unexpected addition to the crew. This time I am going to Cocos Island fully equipped with hydraulic machinery. We will wash away the earth in the same manner as they wash away the hills in Seattle, or in the hydraulic mines of Alaska. You may repeat this for me and you will repeat no lie that this time I will bring the treasure back.

"The early history of the treasure is well known. In 1835 the Peruvian and Chilean nations were at war. The British barkentine "Mary Dier" -for which the present ship has been named-was then trading on the coast. One night she anchored close to a Peruvian fort near Callao. The fort was on the point of being besieged by the Chilean army. In the fort had been gathered the noney, jewels and golden treasure of the townspeople amounting to over \$15,000,000. The anxious governor o the fort, fearing that the Chilean attack might be successful, decided that would be a wise thing to have it placed on board the "Mary Dier" and under the protection of the British flag. Ten boatloads in all were placed on board the ship. The crew tempted by the glittering wealth proved false to their trust. As soon as the conflict began they slipped their cables and made for sea. The treasure was hidden on Cocos Island. Soon after leaving the Island a storm was encountered which quickly dismasted the vessel. 
