





Some Interesting Facts about the Despised Worm.

'Only a worm,' we say, scornfully, as we see one wriggling among the upturned earth. We may think of worms only as food for the thrushes that hop over our lawns and sing to us at eventide; but the great naturalist Darwin said of earthworms:

'It may be doubted whether there are many other animals which have played so important a part in the history of the world as these lowly organised creatures.'
Earthworms have no nose, no eyes, no ears. Their long, segmented bodies have no limbs, but from each segment or ring there project tiny bristles, by which the earthworm gets hold of the soil and drags itself along. These bristles are not easily seen; but if one passes a dead worm through one's fingers their presence is felt.

The earthworm is very low in the animal kingdom, and is the prey of birds, fish, moles, and many other creatures; but worms exist in such numbers all over the world that their work has a wide-spread influence. Worms burrow in the soil; in dry weather they go quite deep in search of the moisture necessary to their well-being. Their numerous holes

admit the healthful air and rain to earth beneath the surface. Earthworms eat large quantities of earth; they find nourishment in the tiny pieces of decaying substances, broken leaves, and rotting vegetation in the earth; much of the earth passes out through the worm's body in the form of worm-casts—those tiny coiled mounds of earth which are so familiar. These worm-casts are continually being deposited on the surface of the earth; they dry up in the weather, and are spread as a layer all over the land.

Darwin proved that 'the fine earth voided by worms, if spread out uniformly, would form in many places in the course of a year a layer one-fifth of an inch in thickness.' Earthworms are thus shown to mix up the soil, and to bring fresh soil from below to be admitted to the beneficial action of the sun and rain. They eat leaves, dragging them into their burrows to devour them at their leisure; dark vegetable mould is largely enriched by the decaying leaf-material brought into it by worms.

Earthworms do not as a rule injure vegetation at all; they may occasionally draw a few blades of young corn or grass into their burrows; but their great work is this stirring and distribution of the soil, which is of immense benefit to agriculture.

Worms really aid in altering the face of the earth itself. On the slopes of downs and mountains the fine castings dry up and roll away, or are blown away with the wind. Heavy rains, too, will wash the fine earth down the steep places; so soil is taken from the hills and spread to the valleys below, or the streams carry it away to lakes and to the sea itself. Rains and winds, which can do little to heavy soil or earth bound together by grass roots, can thus affect the soil which is composed of castings.

The body of an earthworm has a scooped head around it; this does not mark the spot where the worm has been hurt by a spade and healed again as many people think. It really marks a part of the body where many glands pour out a fluid that hardens into a band or collar.

This collar is slipped right on the worm's body as it is breeding time, and as it passes over the body the eggs are caught within it, and it forms a cocoon or case for the eggs. Worms' cocoons are small brownish objects, something like grains of wheat; and they are laid amongst the soil, and the young worms emerge from their cocoons in a few weeks.

There are reckoned to be about 20 species of earthworms.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, July 26. It is understood that Germany is insisting upon her original program of compensation, including the cession of coast of French Congo; should France persist in retaining non-possessions, Germany would want application of the Algeiras Act, according to Germany's contention, namely, that the situation in Morocco should be today what it was in 1906, after signing Treaty. France should evacuate interior of the country. The mandate of the powers, authorizing France, Spain, to police Morocco, expires this year, but this mandate Germany will be unwilling to renew.

War Cloud. What is Said in Berlin and London Regarding the Situation.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, July 26. Evidence in the German papers shows increasing nervousness with reference to the Moroccan situation.

Despatches from various points respecting the Moroccan situation, reports from London regarding the British attitude call for sharp comment. The semi-official Cologne Gazette, in a leading article, utters this warning: "Solution of the problem is very simple. France should withdraw her troops having only police. Open doors for national trade will guarantee that Morocco is not to be regarded as a French Colony."

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 26. That Germany would give compensation in South Africa, as a result of her descent upon Agadir and in return for freer hand which France is seeking in Morocco, is conceded here, but it is also clear that Britain is not going to permit the establishment of a German naval base on the West Coast of Africa, if she can prevent it.

The Morocco Trouble.

It may not be uninteresting to note that the obligation of Great Britain to give diplomatic support to France arises out of the Anglo-French Convention of 1904, under which France gave up her territorial claims on the West Coast of Newfoundland. The British Government recognized that France had special interests in Morocco, and undertook to place no obstacles in the way of French intervention to maintain order and secure reform. The British Government also promised France its diplomatic support in Morocco. Germany has looked on at the increasing influence of France in Morocco with uneasiness, and her intervention led eventually to the Algeiras Act, signed by the Powers, which guaranteed the integrity of Morocco, the sovereignty of the Sultan and the open door for trade. It is, however, alleged that France and Spain had a secret understanding and that both have making expeditions and seizures of Agadir in Morocco by Germany. This action of Germany, outside of any obligation to France, is regarded by Britain as a menace to her trade routes and led to the present attitude of Britain towards Germany.

Autos Returned.

The automobiles of Messrs. Reid, Bowring and Parker, which carried the Delegate and party to Portugal Cove this morning, returned at noon to-day. The party embarked on the s.s. Fife for Bell Island. The ship looked very beautiful adorned with flags from rail to mainmast. An informal reception took place before the yacht left the Cove. Those gentlemen who went down from the city and lent their motor cars were presented to His Excellency.

Papal Delegate at Portugal Cove.

This morning Monsignor Stagni, the Papal Delegate, accompanied by the Archbishop, Bishop March and others visited Portugal Cove, and showed much interest in the old type of Irish church which is to be found there. In the church there was a bigger gathering than had ever been known before, and the Delegate bestowed the Pope's blessing on those present. The party were entertained to luncheon at the Presbytery by Fr. Gough, and at 11:30 left for Bell Island in the yacht Fife.

ASK FOR MINARD'S AND TAKE NO OTHER.

German Press Says "Hands Off."

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-Day. The tone of the newspapers discussing the Moroccan question is much calmer than yesterday. The Anzeiger says Germany is not inclined to permit such wanton and frivolous intervention as is preached in the English press, and warns meddling some disturbers to keep their hands off.

Balfour Beats the Insurgents.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The banner of revolt against Balfour and Lansdowne was raised last night at the dinner given in honour of Earl Halsbury, when the extremists among the Unionists intended should be a demonstration of their strength. Several hundred Unionist and members of the Commons were present and cheered the policy of resistance. Earl Selborne, who is credited with being the candidate for the place of the Marquis of Lansdowne, as leader of the opposition in the House of Lords, presided. Young Unionist reformers composed the back of the company. A letter from "Joe" Chamberlain said: "I heartily support the object of the meeting. The country owes a great debt to Lord Halsbury, since at this crisis in its history he has refused to surrender principles." Lord Selborne said: "In this crisis each peer has an individual constitutional responsibility above all party ties. The division in our party is in the simple issue of the creation of a party which will close its ranks and fight for the restoration of the constitution and the repeal of the Parliament Act." Mr. Austin Chamberlain made a stirring speech. When he finished there were cries of "Future Prime Minister." A reference to Premier Asquith was greeted with cries of "Traitor." Chamberlain said it was unthinkable that a great historic assembly like the House of Lords should acquiesce in the surrender of its constitutional rights and its national duty. The final solution of the political crisis is uncertain, but it may be safely assumed that Balfour and Lansdowne will remain in the saddle as leaders of the Unionist party. Balfour in one of the most serious crises in his career has again proved himself the party leader. No sooner was his letter affirming his intention to stand or fall by Lansdowne, published than the impatient mutiny collapsed. The organizers of the Halsbury banquet tumbled over each other in hasty repudiation of being disloyal to Balfour. A list of more than 250 peers was published last night who declared themselves supporters of Lansdowne's policy, and they will let the parliamentary bill pass under protest. The peers adhering to Halsbury do not exceed 150.

A Deadlock.

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, To-Day. The Foreign Office, adhering to the pact with the German Foreign Office, refrains from all communications to the press regarding Franco-German negotiations. It is understood here that the situation is unsatisfactory. The status of the negotiations might almost be described as a deadlock.

Reciprocity.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. Instructions for the administration of so much of the Customs law as is effective until the whole Reciprocity Agreement is ratified by the Canadian Parliament were telegraphed to the Customs Collectors along the Canadian border. Until the Canadian Parliament has ratified the agreement, only Section Two which covers wood pulp, paper, and paper-boards will be effective.

Leaving the cruelty of the act out of the question (killing the bird in the nesting season), it was a punishable offence, first in having a gun in his possession on those grounds where game birds are to be found; and secondly, in killing wild birds out of season.

The fact is that going into the woods where those camping out parties are located has become dangerous; you don't really know where a 22 cal. bullet will find a billet in some part of your make up.

The law is strict enough, if carried out, as it should be. Farmers on the Freshwater Road have asked me if something could not be done to stop boys from carrying those 22 cal. rifles, as they not only shoot partridge on their nests, but kill a great many of the farmers' ducks and fowls, in fact, anything in sight is made a target of. He will celebrate Pontifical High Mass at St. Patrick's Sunday, and will leave for St. George's by Sunday evening's express where he will be enthroned by His Excellency Monsignor Stagni on Tuesday. His Grace the Archbishop and His Lordship Bishop March will accompany Bishop Power to St. George's. His Excellency will leave for Ottawa Wednesday via Port aux Basques.

More Excitement in the Commons.

Special to Evening Telegram
LONDON, July 26.
Another exciting day. Political conferences, party caucus meetings, ministerial visits to the King, left the crisis no nearer solution than yesterday. The session of Commons was not important, but much heat and bitterness was displayed. There was renewed flinging of epithets, such as "Hotentots," "insolent swine," and similar terms. The only significant incident of the session was when Smith, one of the leaders in yesterday's turmoil, quit his seat among the adherents of Balfour, and ranged himself with Lord Cecil and other insurgent Unionists. The most important event of the day was publication of a letter, which Balfour wrote Lord Newtown in reply to a request for his opinion on the situation. As was expected, he fully supports Lansdowne in bowing to the inevitable, avoiding creation of Peers. Thus the rupture in the Unionist party is definite and open. The present crisis has been seized upon by the malcontents to renew an attempt to displace Balfour from the leadership in favor of Austin Chamberlain. This time the attempt is more likely to succeed, because it has the assistance of a similar movement of the Lords to dethrone Lansdowne in favor of Earl Selborne. It will probably be a few days before either side takes any forward step in the political crisis.

A Steady Increase in Commerce.

WASHINGTON, July 26.
A review of foreign trade states that the last twelve months shows a steady increase of commerce with Canada and the Orient. Exports jumped from the States to Canada from \$216,000,000 to \$270,000,000, and the imports from Canada increased from \$95,000,000 to \$101,000,000. Comparative increases of business with China and Japan are also evident.

To Clean Gas Stoves.

1. Lift off all the bars from the top.
2. Wash the top of the stove under the burners with hot soda water.
3. Clean the burners every now and then with an old brush dipped in paraffin if they are greasy.
4. Do not poke wire into the holes in the burners as this enlarges them and leads to an increased use of gas.
5. Wash bars with hot soda water, and polish them with blacklead, unless the bars are of steel, when they must be cleaned with emery paper.
6. Clean the brass taps and fittings.
7. Scrape and wash the shelves with hot soda water.
8. Replace all the parts.

Jackman, Mayor Ellis, Deputy Mayor Martin, James Ryan, of Bonavista, and all the Christian Brothers of the city. An interesting programme of athletic events was rendered. 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
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
