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

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

BRITISH MERCANTILE LOSSES.

LONDON, May 31.

BATTLE OF THE SAN.

PETROGRAD, May 31.

The battle of the San, in the vicinity of Przemysl, is developing in fafor of the Russians, according to an official announcement given out today. Furthermore, the Russians between May 12th and May 24th captured nearly 19,000 of their antagonists. In Shavil region, Kovno province, the Germans continue to resist our offensive with violent fire, but fighting in this district continues to our advantage. On the front between the River Pilicia and the Upper Vistula we captured between May 12th and May 24th, 299 officers and 18,617 of rank and file. In Galicia the battle on the San River is also developing in our favor. Our troops have successfully assumed the offensive. Last night they crossed the River Lubaczowka, and occupied the village of Monasterz, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. The offensive of the enemy along the front from Jaroslau and Radymno, in an easterly direction, has been stopped by our fire. In the region beyond the Dneister all hostile attacks of Saturday along the front between Zaderewacz. Boleohow and Jaworow, were repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy. The news that Sir Edward Grey, the Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has been obliged to discontinue his labors even for a short time to rest his eyesight, will cause regret throughout the Empire. Even though his place is temporarily taken by Lord Crewe, who has had experience in the For-eign Office, when he was Secretary to harl Granville, assisted by Lord Lansdowne, who was Foreign Sec-retary from 1900 to 1905 in the Balfour administration, the absence Sir Edward Grey from the Foreign Office will be felt. Sir Edward Grey occupies a unique position in the confidence of the nation as Foreign Secretary, and the nation trusts him there as much as they trust Mr. Asquith as Prime Minister and Lord Kitchener as Secretary for War. He is the embodiment of the plain com-mon sense of the nation and its para-as it did thousands of lives, has fallmount duty, and is actuated by a high sense of personal honour. The outstanding success of the struggle in which Europe is engaged is the dip-lomacy by which Sir Edward Grey has knit together Britain, France and Russia and brought Italy to our side in this gigantic struggle. His is the success which has brought these nations to the determination to fight to a finish until the Teutonic conspiracy against the freedom and liberties of lumanity has been utterly destroyed. The intention of Germany to defeat France and Russia in detail, while keeping Britain out of the war until she could tackle her alone with all the prestige of success on the con-tinent was frustrated by Sir Edward Grey, who has taught the Kaiser and his minions that Britain will fight for right, even though it is but a scrap of paper. Last but not least of his successes in diplomacy has been his efforts to make clear to the United States that Britain is fighting for the success of free institutions in world, and for a high standard of international law and humanity, and his example will be a source of in-spiration to President Wilson in determining the attitude of the United States, as the American people are now confronted with a situation like in many respects to which their English kin across the water had to can exchanges on the Lusitania trag-


GERMAN EFFORT EXPENDED-RUSSIANS ON OFFENSIVE.

LONDON, To-day. The great battle of the San in which the Russians fell back after retreating over half Galicia, still rages, but the Russians assert they have assumed the offensive. This state-ment is taken in London to mean another mighty German effort has ex-pended itself. Though the fate of Przemysl is still uncertain, it is con-tended in Allied circles that the Austro-Germans have failed in their purpose to crush the Russians in Galicia, en short, just as it did in the repeated thrusts at Warsaw and Calais. The official statement issued to-night by the Austrian War Office, makes no claim to any noteworthy advances in the east, dismissing the Przemysl region with the brief declaration tha fighting continues and asserting that there have been no serious engage-ments elsewhere on the eastern front The Russians, on the other hand claim victories virtually along the entire front, especially beyond the Dneister where they say they have taken seven thousand prisoners. In the west neither side has done much of late, although the French continue gnawing around Arras. There has been hard fighting along the Yser. Italy has retaliated for the Austrian air and naval raids along her coast, by bombarding Pola, the Austrian naval base, from a dirigible, while Italian destroyers have made a dash on Monfalconer, doing considerable damage to Austrian shipping and getting away unscratched. German sub-marines have been extraordinarily active, the news last night adding one more neutral vessel to the growing list of victims. STRONG STAND EXPECTED VIEW OF GERMANY'S FAILURE TO YIELD IN FACT OR PRINCI-PLE TO AMERICAN NOTE OF MAY 13th.

WASHINGTON, To-day. President Wilson intends so to shape the course of the United States lovernment in the international crisis, which has arisen, as to leave no loubt abroad of that country's purpose, not only to speak but if necessary to act for the cause of humanity. Two things were practically determined upon by the President yes-terday in the solemn atmosphere with which Memorial Day enveloped the National capital: First, Germany's avoidance of the larger questions of humanity and the spirit of Interna-tional Law by technical argument on nitherto undisputed points of the law of nations to exercise the right of visit and search by a war-craft when encountering merchantmen whether carrying contraband or not, must be met promptly with a note again setting forth briefly the facts as found by the investigation of officials here by the investigation of officials here as to the cargo and peaceful equip-ment of the Lusitania, reiterating the earnest intention of the United States to hold the German Government to strict responsibility for all violation of American rights on the high seas. Count Von Bernstorff, German Ambassador, has been granted an interview with President Wilson for Wednesday, noon, but unless he brings some proposal from his Government answering the demands of the United States differently from the Note just received from Dr. Von Jagow, German Foreign Minister, a circumstance which is doubted in well informed countries the President's course as quarters, the President's course as framed by his consultation with the Cabinet to-morrow, will not be materially affected; second, notwithstnding the critical situation with a statement which has been in pre-paration for several days and will be communicated to leaders of all factions in Mexico, serving notice unless they themselves bring to an early end the deplorable conditions which their warfare has wrought, some other means will be found by the United States in the interest of humanity to save millions of non-combatant Mexicans from starvation and further devastation of property. To-day the President will lay before the Cabinet both questions. 



Frog's Legs as Labor Test.

How the leg of a frog may be used as an argument in favor of the Ten-Hour Day habor Law was explained recently by Miss Josephine Goldmark, publication secretary of the National Jonsumers League, in a lecture be-fore the economic seminary of John Hopkins University

Miss Goldmark described how she

and taken a frog and attached an electric current to his leg in such a way that the light shocks caused the leg to move. Also attached to the leg was a machine by which the force and rapidity of the leg action was registered on a piece of paper. It was noticed that at first the action was noticed that at first the action was not intense while the muscles were loosening up. During the second period the activity increased and reached its maximum, while in the third it decreased, owing to fatigue. Miss Goldmark maintained that this was the case with human beings and the more they were worked the less

e more they were worked the less icient workers they become.
She also told how blood extracted She also told how blood extracted from the leg of a weary frog and inlected into that of a fresh one caused a decrease of activity of the latler. Thus, she said, poisonous gases becaping from a tired worker might enter and injure a fresh worker unless proper ventilation were provided in the workshop.





The following letter from Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper to Dr. H. H. Mc-Kay, of New Glasgow, will be of general interest. It will be remembered this letter points out that all his son are engaged in active service.

"Your kind note (the first from dear old Pictou) was welcome to my wife and me. My son-in-law has been taken and by brother's death soon followed. They were two of God's men in every sense of the word.

"My son is in a critical condition i Boulogne-shot through both thighs with a compound fracture of the femur. There is gangrene, but I am hoping that, as he was shot on April 22nd, and was slightly better yesterday, his life may be spared to us.

"My youngest son is alive as heard from him by cable from Boulogne. My other son (eldest) is going with the Mounted Rifles now preparing. My only other son is in the Mounted Police and volunteered at the outset and has not yet been allow-

"In all this time of stress, and when the blows are coming heavily my comfort and strength is in the Highland character of my dear wife. I never thought so highly of her till this awful war came upon us. Not a word to discourage her darlings going to the front, and not a word of regret now that they have gone, and yet her silent agony is inexpressible and how widespread is the suffering and how splendid the spirit throughout not only Canada, but the empire. God send us victory."


