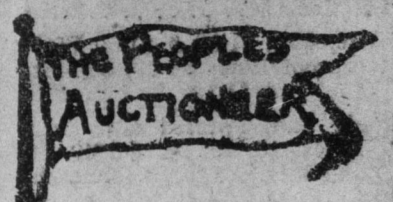

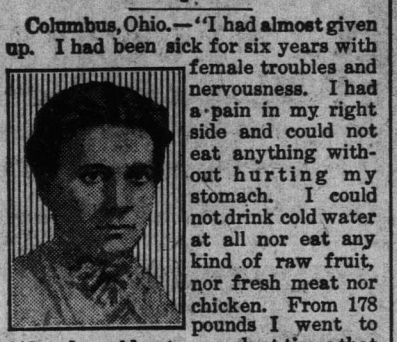

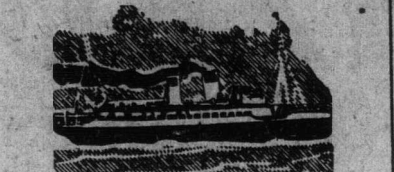

"LEONARDO'S" DEAD. A total of 248 lives were lost when the Italian dreadnought Leonardo di Vinci caught fire and blew up in the harbor of Taranto, Italy, on August 3, says an official statement to-day.

War News.

**Messages Received
Previous to 9 A.M.**

OFFICIAL
LONDON, Sept. 11.
The Governor, Newfoundland:
In the Somme sector the advance
continues. All counter attacks failed.
The toll of prisoners daily increases.
The French have taken seventy-seven
hundred prisoners during the week.
At Verdun the French have taken
the whole first German line on one
mile front of Vaux, Chapitrele Chen-
ois, and again the whole first line east
of Fleury.

In Galicia the Russians are closing
up on Hallez, but are meeting stub-
born resistance on the Narajowka.
In the Balkans the enemy captured
Tartakal and Silistria in Dobrudsha.
The Roumanians, on the other hand,
are progressing steadily in Transyl-
vania, and bombarding Bulgarian for-
tresses on the Danube.

BONAR LAW.
IN PERSIA.
PETROGRAD, Sept. 11.
Victory for Russians over Turkish
troops in Persia, is reported in to-
day's war office statement. In the re-
gion of Takling the town of Bana has
been occupied by Russian forces, fol-
lowing a battle in which the Turks
were defeated. Russian troops are
now pursuing the beaten force, and
the statement.

RUSSIAN FRONT QUIET.
PETROGRAD, Sept. 11.
There have been no important de-
velopments in the situation along the
Russian front from Riga to Roumania,
according to an official statement.

ITALIANS CAPTURE POSITION.
ROME, Sept. 11.
The Italians have captured a strong
position in the Leno Valley on the
Trentino front, the war office an-
nounced to-day. Ground had been
gained also in the Upper Posino Val-
ley.

"LEONARDO'S" DEAD.
ROME, Sept. 11.
A total of 248 lives were lost when
the Italian dreadnought Leonardo di
Vincenzo was blown up in the har-
bor of Larento, Italy, on August 2,
says an official statement to-day.

**ZAIMIS CONFERS WITH CONSTAN-
TINE.**
LONDON, Sept. 11.
A Reuter's Agency despatch says
that Premier Zaimis had another con-
ference with King Constantine on
Sunday afternoon, after which the
Cabinet met. In regard to shots fired
in the neighborhood of the French Le-
gation, the despatch says that the Al-
lies' demands have apparently been
fully accepted although nothing has
been officially announced. Closing
of the clubs of the reservists' league,
a step demanded by the Entente, was
begun on Sunday evening.

**REVOLUTIONARY MOVEMENT AC-
TIVE.**
PARIS, Sept. 11.
A despatch to Le Temps from Saloni-
ka says that the revolutionary
movement is active at Verra, about 40
miles southeast of Salonika, where
Capt. Bartocosa has announced to
General Cordonnier, Commander of the
French troops, his intention of fight-
ing with the Entente Allies. The bat-
talion commander at Verra has also
announced that his battalion will par-
ticipate in the movement. These
events are parts of a rapidly extend-
ing plan for the formation of a Greek
army of national defence. Numerous
volunteers for this army are arriving
here daily, coming from remote is-
lands and regions of old Greece. The
recruits are equipped immediately
with khaki uniforms, and are sent to
camps a few miles outside of the city.

LONDON, Sept. 11.

THE GREEK SITUATION.
ATHENS, Sept. 11.
If the Entente and anti-Venizelist
factions can only keep quiet for ten
days and not embroil the situation,
Greece's entrance into the war will
be a settled fact, said a prominent
Greek official to the Associated Press
this morning. If not, he continued,
it is the end of Greece. King Constan-
tine and Premier Zaimis had a long
conference on the situation to-day.
On the whole the situation with re-
gard to Greece's entry into the war on
the side of the Entente Allies seems
favorable, notwithstanding the arrest
last Sunday and Monday by the An-
glo-French secret police of German
and Austrian agents, against which
the Premier vigorously protested.
Complicity by the French in the dis-
affection of the Eleventh Greek Di-
vision at Salonika, which profoundly
shocked the Greek public, seriously
endangered the success of the nego-
tiations then in progress. The mere
suggestion of the possibility of King
Constantine commanding the allied
armies in Macedonia seem to override
every hesitation. It is reported that
the opposition of Russia and Italy in
the war is actually much less than
has been believed, and the Serbs, far
from objecting, are most anxious that
the Greeks join the Entente Allies. It
is generally conceded in the Entente
Allied circles that General Sarrailh,
the French commander, would be-
glad of the assistance of Greek sol-
diers who fought against the Bulgars
three years ago. The only menace to
the success of negotiations lies in
the Greek Government holding out too
long in the hope of obtaining conces-
sions offered them eighteen months
ago, but which they can no longer ob-
tain. Eight classes of untrained re-
servists between 33 and 40 years of
age, will shortly be called to the col-
ors.

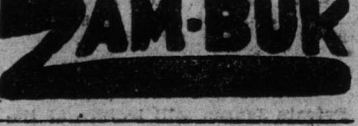

BRITISH OFFICIAL.
LONDON, Sept. 11.

tuation south of Ancre is unchanged,
and the day passed without any spe-
cial incident. Counter attacks made by
the enemy yesterday about Ghinchy,
led to fierce hand-to-hand fighting in
which four officers and 100 men were
taken. Including these, the total num-
ber of prisoners since last report ex-
ceeds 200. An attempted hostile
trench mortar bombardment of our
trenches north of Bluff, was quickly
silenced by our artillery and trench
mortars. There is nothing to report
on the rest of the front."

FRENCH OFFICIAL.
PARIS, Sept. 11.
The official statement to-night says
that except for somewhat violent ar-
tillery duels south of the Somme, in
Bernay Vermandovillers and Chau-
nes sectors, nothing of importance
occurred on the rest of the front.

THEIR HOPES BLIGHTED.
QUEBEC, Sept. 11.
With everything running smoothly
engineers, brigenmen and spectators
congratulating each other that with-
in a very short time the St. Law-
rence River would be spanned by one
of the most magnificent bridges in the
world, something miscarried. Well
laid plans by foremost engineers of
the country on which they had plac-

**The Dogfish Pest
Again Complained of.**

The following are the latest fishery
reports received by the Board of
Trade:—
Sept. 9th, from T. McCarthy (Re-
news to Seal Cove)—The total catch
is 4350 qtls. with 400 for last week.
Eighteen dories and 28 skiffs are fish-
ing. Prospects are fair, but opera-
tions are hindered by stormy weather.
There is plenty of squid for bait.

Sept. 6th, from M. Vavasour (Lit-
tle St. Lawrence to Lawn Pt.)—The
total catch is 9,750 qtls. and for last
week 450. Sixty-five dories and skiffs
and 4 boats are fishing. Prospects
are fairly good, and squid bait is plen-
tiful, though irregular.

Sept. 9th, from J. Gease (Spaniard's
Bay to Upper Island Cove)—Very lit-
tle fish is being caught by hook and
liners, bait being scarce. The trawl-
ers are getting from 1 1/2 to 2 qtls.
daily when they can get on the
grounds. The weather is rough with
high winds, and the total catch is
1,980 qtls.

Sept. 8th, from F. Power (Oderin)—
The total catch is 2,400 qtls. and for
last week 100. Twenty-one dories and
skiffs and seven boats are fishing.
Prospects are not good. The boats
arriving from the St. Mary's grounds
report codfish fairly plentiful, but
operations hampered by the presence
of dogfish.

This Greek Impasse.

It is useless to grope for light in the obscurity of the Greek situation. None of the reports from Athens can be believed if only because of the manner in which they contradict one another. A little more than a week ago King Constantine had abdicated and fled to Larissa; now there are hints that he may lead in person the allied armies in Macedonia! To-day it is reported that Zaimis has resigned, just when he seemed, with Venizelos, to be getting the position nicely in hand. The confusion is not altogether inexplicable. It is not as though the issue lay clearly between the Allies and the Greek people on the one hand and the Greek Royalists on the other, strange as that division would be; but there appear to be differences in the two camps themselves which further complicate the situation. It is more than likely that the chief present difficulty is the settlement of the terms upon which Greece's intervention is to be made and that the King and his supporters, in other words the Greek Government, are taking advantage of its complexities to render the problem as hard as possible of solution, thus keeping Greece out of it until it is solved. That even Constantine must appreciate not merely the predominant sentiment of his people but the logic of the military situation cannot longer be doubted, and it is quite likely that he is affecting a change of front, but demanding for Greece rewards for her assistance which he knows will not be granted, thus protracting a state of affairs which is at least less distasteful to him than active participation against the side to which his feelings lean.

However that may be, the Allies are not likely to remit the firmness which they find to be the only proper treatment of Greece. The news to-day of the embargo on our fish seems to indicate a repetition of the former mercantile blockade of Greece, which, if it is enforced, will not this time be raised until the matter is settled once for all. If Greece cannot see and grasp her manifest destiny, she must be made to grasp it; if she is encumbered by her Government in doing so, the incumberance must be removed.

But it is big guns and not diplomats that make the best speakers in an emergency such as this. The Russian and Italian guns persuaded Roumania, and there will soon be such a chorus in Macedonia as should persuade Greece as well. The military situation, however, is not free from the same mystery that envelops the political one. Of no front is so little apparently known of a definite nature as this one from Albania to Kavala. The number and disposition of the Allied troops, to say nothing of the Bulgarian, seems only to be conjecturally estimated. If General Sarail has in fact so large an army under him as has been accredited to him, it is hard to see why he has not long since set it in motion against the Bulgarians, or why so much importance should be attached to securing first the co-operation of Greece. It may be that the advance of the British across the Struma near Lake Tachinoo is indeed the beginning at last of this great offensive, or, as London says, it may aim merely at driving the Bulgarians from Kavala and the impressing of Greece. If it is the former, it will be welcomed in all the Allied capitals. There is as yet little news of the Russians coming through Dobruja, and Roumania is still engaged with the annexation of Transylvania. This latter may be merely a great preparatory precaution to protect her from a flank invasion when she turns at length south against Bulgaria, and it may be that General Sarail will time his drive to synchronise with this movement. If this concerted action takes place, events will probably follow beside which the state of Greece will be comparatively unimportant to all save Greece herself.

Proclamation.

The Governor of Newfoundland: London, Sept. 11. (Official.)—The following has been issued by the King:

A Proclamation requiring returns to be made of British property in enemy territory and of claims by British subjects against enemy persons and enemy Governments.

GOERGE R.I.
 WHEREAS, in the interests of our Realm, it is of great importance that full information should be obtained with regard to property in enemy territory belonging to our subjects, and also with regard to the claims of our subjects against enemy persons and enemy Governments;

AND WHEREAS, for the purpose of obtaining that information it is necessary that returns of such property and claims should be made by our subjects to the officers appointed to receive the same.
 NOW, THEREFORE, we strictly command and enjoin our subjects within the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, or within any country or place outside our Dominions and Protectorates, who are entitled to property of any description whatsoever in enemy territory, or to any interest in such property, or have claims against enemy persons or enemy Governments, forthwith to make returns of their said property or claims to the officers appointed to receive the same, provided that it shall not be necessary to make such returns respecting property or claims whereof returns have before the date of this proclamation been voluntarily made to such officers as aforesaid, in the form prescribed by them.

The Officers appointed to receive such returns shall be (a) in the case of property in enemy territory and of claims against enemy persons, the Public Trustee, Kingsway, London, W. C. (b) in the case of claims against enemy Governments, the Directors of the Foreign Claims Office, Foreign Office, London, S.W. The said returns shall be made in such form and with such particulars as the Public Trustee and the Directors of the Foreign Claims Office may respectively require for the purpose of this Proclamation.

The expression "Property" includes documents of title to property; the expression "Enemy Territory" means the territory of any State at war with us (including the Colonies and Dependencies thereof); the expression "Enemy Persons" includes all persons, firms, companies and corporations residing or carrying on business in enemy territory; the expression "Enemy Government" means the government of any State at war with us.

Given at Our Court at Windsor Castle, this Seventh Day of September in the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixteen, and in the Seventh Year of Our Reign. God Save The King.

Boy Meets With Accident.

At 9.30 this morning a 15 year old boy named McDonald of Brion Street, son of railway engineer James McDonald of the Reid Nfld. Co., had a narrow escape from death when his right hand got caught between the belt and the cog of an electric planing machine, for shaping iron, in the machine shop at the dry dock. In addition to four villages were captured and held despite heavy counter attacks by the Teutonic Allies. Whether this offensive by the British means the commencement of the attempt to drive through Bulgaria or is merely a manoeuvre to throw the British nearer Kavala, which is about 25 miles east of Neohovi, has not yet been made apparent. In the Roumanian theatre, the Austrians are retreating before the Roumanians in the Mavos and Toplitza Valleys, while to the south of Hermannstadt, the Roumanians have occupied the village of Holmbach. Vienna admits the further withdrawal of the Austrian forces near Guergyo on the eastern front. According to Berlin, Russian attacks along the Stokhod River northwest of Kovel and in Galicia between the Dniester and Zlota-Lipa Rivers with Halyk as the objective, failed with sanguinary losses to the Russians. Except for bombardments and the repulse of German counter attacks, Monday was without special incident on the Somme front in France. To the south of the river in the sectors of Berry-on-Santerre, Vermandovilliers and Chaulnes artillery duels between the French and Germans were especially violent. The fiercest fighting which has been in progress in Turkish Armenia for a week continues in the region of Ognott with the tide of battle still going in favor of the Russians according to Petrograd. In Persia the Russians have occupied the town of Bana near Sakiz. Bucharest official communication at the Roumanian headquarters to-day reads: "On the northern and northwestern fronts in the west Upper Valleys of the Maras and Toplitza Rivers the enemy continued his retreat. We captured three officers and 106 men. South of Slobin which is also named Schelleberg. It has been established that the enemy has used dum dum bullets. In a street in the Bar Valley west of Meritorz we repulsed several enemy attacks; our troops taking the offensive captured two guns and several machine guns, caissons of munitions and three officers and 300 men. On the southern front there has been heavy fighting. Along the Danube on the Dobruja front fighting continues."

GERMANY WILL FIGHT ON THE DEFENSIVE.

PARIS, To-day.
 The Kaiser and Von Hindenburg may be expected henceforth to fight defensively, and we must not forget that they will do this on our territory, therefore we cannot expect the German defensive to be of short duration. The Kaiser and Von Hindenburg cannot conquer, but we must be prepared to face the fact that they can prolong the resistance indefinitely, thanks to the passive obedience of the German people and their powerful military organization. This is the opinion of Geo. Clemenceau.

LONDON, To-day.

POOR ENGLAND.

LONDON, To-day.
 In a despatch from Berlin to the Daily News, Rutledge Rutherford, says that Germany has decided to declare a blockade against England to become effective on January 1st next. For this purpose a powerful fleet of submarines is being completed and plans are being worked out to make the blockade a stringent one. The movements of the submarines, it is said, will be guided to some extent by Germany's high flying Zeppelins. These submarines and Zeppelins will be equipped with extra sensitive wireless apparatus. One high in the Councils of the German naval administration says that by the end of the year, and perhaps a little sooner,

Sees End of War by Winter of 1918

Neutral, Back in London From Berlin, Believes Germany Can Continue for a Year. — No Danger of Starvation — But the People, He Says, Are Greatly Disheartened by Their Enormous Losses.

London, Sept. 11.—The Daily Mail publishes an account of conditions in Germany ten days ago, which was obtained from a neutral who toured the country in July and August for the purpose of an independent inquiry into the existing situation. The Mail's informant said: "My mission was to sound every class of German opinion as to the present and the future of war. I interviewed bankers, manufacturers, high State officials, merchants, diplomats, workmen, and common soldiers. I am a graduate of a German university and have known German ways and habits of thought for thirteen years, most of the time as a resident in the country. I flattered myself at the outset that the Germans would not be able to deceive me when I sought to find out really what was at the back of their heads. "They succeeded in convincing me that they genuinely believe they will win the war. They do not appear to be able to produce any very tangible evidence on which to base their belief, but the belief is there. Every-where I was asked 'Is this hideous war were over?' I heard on all sides, but nowhere did I encounter any desire to stack arms on the basis of a defeated Fatherland. "I am quite amazed by the English people's curiosity to know if the Germans are starving. They are nowhere near starvation. The crops are good, somewhat better than the average. They are satisfactorily harvested. There will be nothing to prevent the Germans, so far as food is concerned, from fighting for another year at least. Food shortage alone will never cause

Germany to sue for premature peace. It is a widely cherished misapprehension, too that monetary conditions are hastening the collapse of Germany's ability to continue the war. I imagine Heiferich (Minister of the Interior) can have another £500,000,000 (\$2,500,000,000) this Autumn or any other time he calls for it on the same terms as he secured the rest. "Well-informed authorities assured me there were at least 1,500,000 men of fit military capacity in garrisons and depots and under training ready for the trenches when needed. Other people placed the number at 2,000,000, and all reminded me that anywhere from 400,000 to 600,000 youths come of military age annually in Germany. Little is said publicly of Germany's enormous casualties. Newspapers are not permitted to give any idea whatever of the grand total, which is approaching 4,000,000 certainly. It is their hideously heavy losses of men killed and incapacitated, which are sickening the Germans of the war more than anything else, I think. It is these sacrifices which make me doubt whether the approach of the Winter of 1917-18 will find Germany able to stand a fourth year of war. Of her ability to weather the third year I am left in no doubt whatever. "England, Italy, and the United States are incessantly strafed. England most of all. They blurt out everywhere that their deal with President Wilson about submarines was only a convenient makeshift for Germany, and that sink-everything-at-sight tactics will be resumed as soon as the new submarines are ready. I was in Baden-Baden, where there is still tremendous anger over the destructive air raid on Karlsruhe. It caused the Germans to ponder over the wisdom of airship frightfulness against their enemies, although, I must say, I found universal enthusiasm for the merciless Zeppelin raids on England."

Both Pathetic and Exasperating I have, again and again, and sometimes I'm exasperated by her and sometimes I'm sorry for her.

The daughter-in-law of another neighbour of mine came to visit her last summer with her children. "She is an attractive, capable woman and the mother-in-law really looked forward to the visit, her first."

Unfortunately the younger woman had the defect that so often goes with the virtue of capability—the habit of imposing her own ideas on others.

Whenever an entertainment was suggested she had another plan which she regarded as superior; when a meal was planned in her hearing, she knew of a dish that was perfectly lovely that she would like to prepare. If she were allowed to wash the dishes she started in to scour every shelf and cupboard, thereby

suggesting to the housewife that she was extremely slovenly, which was far from being the case.

And she only meant to be helpful. Of course she meant to be very helpful, and equally, of course, she succeeded in setting her mother-in-law on edge. The latter couldn't conceal her feelings and the daughter-in-law felt hurt and resentful that her well-meant helpfulness should not be better received.

If this woman had had half as much capableness and twice as much tact, she and everyone about her would have been happier.

Rightness, no matter how well founded, if not held in check by tact, becomes positiveness and arouses antagonism.

It Doesn't Cost Anything To Say "I Think."

People who always say "Such and such a thing is so," and never "I think such and such a thing is so," are never popular.

Suppose you do know a thing, does it do any harm to soften your statement by an "I think"?

When people find out how wise you are they will only honor you the more for not being self-assertive.

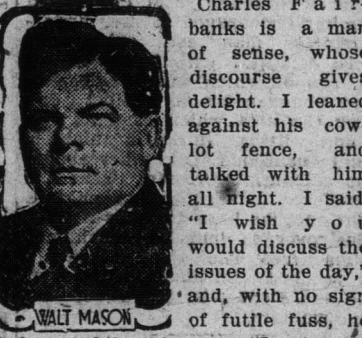

CAMPAIGN WHISKERS.



Charles Fairbanks is a man of sense, whose discourse gives delight. I leaned against his cow-lot fence, and talked with him all night. I said, "I wish you would discuss the issues of the day," and, with no sign of futility fuss, he spoke a while this way: "I voice my views at your behest—my words come from my heart; I think chin whiskers are the best, viewed as a work of art. It is a whiskery campaign that now pervades the land; and whiskers fancy, whiskers plain, are seen on every hand. So far as whiskers are concerned, each man must dress his beard, and some men say they would be demoted before they'd wear a beard; and some men wear a bunch of hay, to every zephyr flung, and there the oracles, in May, build nests and rear their young. I do not favor drastic laws to govern whiskeriness; let men still grow upon their jaws and chins their patch of greens. If laws were passed our beards to kill, we'd surely take it hard; let whiskers flourish as they will—but sideboards should be barred."

Imitation salmon, sold to patrons of East Side fish stands in New York, represented until recently codfish or fillofish carefully dipped in a solution of red ink. It is reasonable to assume that much of it found its way into the homes of fish connoisseurs in that densely-populated quarter, but there is no demand for it now except from the Department of Health. The originators of this adulterated food have long since retired from business, and some of them are being held under lock and key in well known local penitentiaries. But red ink still continues to be useful, and some of our foreign fishermen will probably never give up tinning the gills of fish which have laid long in the open air on the counter. Fish smoked with liquid smoke and other cured varieties known only to a section of the metropolis are to be had even though the Board of Health has had its drug experts at work for months. It is enough to note that only a few blocks from the wholesale markets of the West Side and the great fishmarkets a bit to the south, this sort of practice goes on, in one way or another, in spite of the diligent efforts of the authorities to stop it.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

Superhuman Effort of Injured Woodsman

How He Crawled and Rolled One-Half Mile, Without the use of a Leg and an Arm, Mounted a Horse's Back and Drove Home. Had Hard Experience.

Suffering most intense pain as he crawled and rolled for upwards of eight and a half hours—such was the experience of David Slaney, who now occupies a cot at the General Hospital, having been brought here the night before last by the S. S. Portia. He is a young man belonging to St. Lawrence. He has only one arm, as he lost the other in a running accident a couple of years ago.

Slaney left his home in St. Lawrence early last Friday morning, taking his axe along with him, and went into the woods a distance of four miles, "felling trees," as he called it. Shortly before 9 a.m. he hewed a heavy tree, which in falling, came across his right leg, breaking the largest bone midway between the knee and ankle of that member. Poor Slaney lay on the ground for several minutes powerless to help himself and equally unable to remove the tree, which lay where it fell. Believing that there might be other woodsmen or somebody else about he tried to attract their attention to come and give him aid by shouting as loud as he could, but in vain. After considerable exertion, patience and suffering he managed to remove the piece of timber of his leg and free himself somewhat, but even after doing that he was still in an awkward predicament. He was in a quandary as to what to do, as all that was left for him was to lie on the ground and remain there, until help should arrive. After much deep thinking he stood up on the sound leg supported by the limb of a tree and looking ahead, fully a half mile away, observed a barren place where horses were grazing. He then conceived the idea that if he could reach that spot he might be able to make a conveyance out of one of the horses to his home. It was a superhuman task, but Slaney undertook it and accomplished it by crawling and rolling the entire distance until he reached his desired end. It was a case of getting through trees, over stumps and along the rugged and unbeaten path. At intervals he was obliged to stop, owing to the untold agony the leg was giving him, but when the pain would subside he continued on his harrowing journey. Towards the end the one-armed man, as can be imagined, became very exhausted and fatigued, but eventually reached his objective,

The Beginning of the End

Roumania's entrance into the war so long expected, but so frequently postponed, means the beginning of the end for the Central Empires. The tide of Teutonic success, which reached its high mark with the great Russian retreat and the crushing of Serbia, paused at its full during the most critical days at Verdun, and was definitely turned with the beginning of the general offensive of the Entente Allies on all fronts. Only in the Balkans has the situation remained as before, and now with the Roumanian declaration of war against Austria-Hungary which probably will mean war against Bulgaria, Turkey and Germany, the military recesses as rapidly as it rose in the first year and a half of the great conflict.

Dramatic as Roumania's action must appear at this time, it should be followed by even more sensational developments. Roumania has long held the key to the military situation in Europe. She represents a formidable enemy with an army of over half a million men, standing on the unprotected flank of the weakest of the Central Empires. More than that, she now opens the door for the Russian hordes already crowding toward the Hungarian plains for a real invasion though Roumanians may for the Austrians, now vainly struggling to beat back the Russians fighting their way through the Carpathian passes, find themselves with an even more dangerous enemy in their rear.

Austria and her allies must now find the men to stop the Italians in the west, the Russians in the north, the Roumanians in the east and the Allied forces pushing up toward the Danube from Salonica. First of all, however, is Bulgaria that is directly menaced by Roumanian action. The Bulgars are caught between two millstones, for Russia may not strike directly at Sofia through Roumania, vasion of the Dual Monarchy. The moment deter attacking Bulgaria. There is little doubt now that Greece will soon enter the field, which should mean the hasty crushing of Bulgaria, to be followed by the isolation of Turkey, the redemption of Serbia and the closing in on Austria-Hungary.

With that event will come the last act of the great drama. Austria, now weakened by many defeats and steadily losing ground on all fronts, cannot long withstand such an attack. Nor can she get much help from Germany, which has twice saved her from the Russians. It is significant, too, that Germany has a new enemy, for Italy has now declared war upon the Kaiser. From a military point of view this would not be specially significant at this time, since it is merely a public declaration of a condition that has long existed, but the political effect just now will be important.

It is difficult to comprehend the full meaning of the latest developments in the war situation, but of one thing there can be no doubt. After two years of splendid effort and great military achievements Germany and her allies are facing decisive defeat. The war may last another year, but the prospects for an early peace were never better. And that peace will not be based upon a deadlock. The map of Europe has been definitely lost to the Central Empires.—Brooklyn Eagle.

An Address on Early Colonization.

At 8 o'clock last night a large number of the members of the Epworth League assembled in the Sunday School room of Wesley Church and listened to an interesting address on the early colonization of Newfoundland, ably delivered by A. W. Martin, Esq., of the G.P.O. Although only given a very short notice to prepare such a difficult subject, Mr. Martin responded with an address that was a rare treat for those whose privilege it was to attend. Diving down into the depths of the past the lecturer recalled the days when none but the silent Red Indian roamed the shores of our Newfoundland. While the island was discovered in 1497, it was not settled till 1610 when John Guy landed in Conception Bay with a band of noble followers, after a long and stormy voyage across the then practically unknown Atlantic. He described the part Wildbourne played in the early settlement of the peninsula of Avalon, that played by Lord Baltimore, and the taking possession of the island by Sir Humphrey Gilbert in the name of Queen Elizabeth of England, on St. John's Day, June 24th, 1583. At the close of the address a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Martin by the President of the Epworth League which was carried unanimously. Messrs. Whalon, Cross and others expressed their thanks to the lecturer for the very enjoyable and interesting hour.

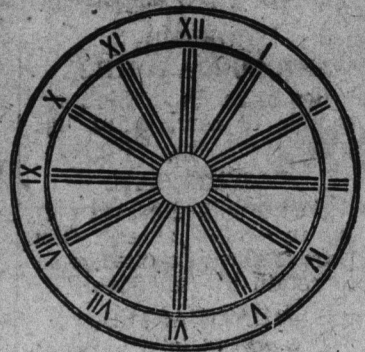
