





Dr. Thomson has endeavoured to furnish a guide that will enable nothers to understand their babies etter. He shows in detail what a child should be able to do at its various stages, and how backward children should be trained. It is an exellent little book, but perhaps proessional modesty forbids the author from saying that the first step in dealing with a defective or backward child is to obtain the advice of a doctor who understands children. Malnutrition is the cause of most infantile diseases. An irritable or nerous infant, or one who is not quick in the uptake, often owes its condition to the absence of some constituent in its food, which, when supplied, turns the baby into a normal

ndividual. The training of backward children involves ceaseless care and attention, and Dr. Thomson concludes by quoting St. Paul on endurance and happiness, Romans v. 3. A saying that might well be applied to the whole subject of national health. He quotes from the Twentieth Century New Testament: "We know that trouble produces endurance, and endurance stability of character, from which springs hopefulness—a hopefulness which never disappoints." The Authorized Version reads: "Tribulation thorized Version reads: "Tribulation worketh patience and patience experience hope" I do perience, and experience hope." I do not know which translation is the more correct, but I prefer the oldfashioned one.



## Firing Squad

PUNISHED 346 BRITISH DURING WORLD WAR.

LONDON, Oct. 19-(A.P.)-Out of the many millions of men which comprised the British army during the late war only 346 officers and men so failed in their duty as to justify their execution by the firing squad.

Three British offices were shottwo for desertion and one for murder. One man was sentenced to death three times, each for desertion. Twice he was reprieved but he could not stand the welter of blood and mud of the trenches so he deserted again and the third time he was shots

Forty other men, after being sentenced to death were reprieved only to offend again and be shot In 266 cases the offence against the military code was desertion, though 37 men were executed for murder. Eighteen were shot for cowardice, three for mutiny and two for sleeping on duty. In all 8,080 death sentences were

Newfoundland had the honour of rolling the first Overseas Company n 1892. This was due to Sergt. Harold R. Blackler, whose Regimental Number was No. 1. The late Rt Rev. Llewellyn Jones, Bishop of Newfoundland, gave the movement his neartiest support. The Charter is No. 119, B. Co. No. 703 secured their charters on February 5th, 1896. Heart's Content Company was organized August 10th, 1910, known officially as St. Mary's Company No. 2904. To the late Major Melville the first C.O., Captain C. Lewis, John Hookey and others.

School, and as Allan Cake says, "the acorn planted has grown into a British oak." Percie Johnson when the Brigade was turned out "of school" saved the day and offered a portion of his premises as a drill shed, and the Brigade does not forget his kindness. In April, 1893 Lady Bowring organized the first tableau and dramatic entertainment for Brigade funds. To Sir Joseph the Brigade is indebted for securing the first C.L.B. Armoury on King's Road. This action cannot be forgotten as it placed the organization on a permanent basis. After many years on King's Road and under Lieut.-Col. Robert G. Rendell's guiding hand with heroic pluck assisted by the late Mrs. R. G. Rendell and many friends, Col. Rendell burnt his bridges" and determined to illd the present and best Church ads Brigade Armoury in the British Empire at Harvey Road, St. John's, Nfid. Col. R. G. Rendell's pluck and energy was marvellous! The building debt was fully paid off after some years of hard work, and with fifteen hundred dollars to the Brigade's credit in the Bank, the Armoury magnificently equipped — worth forty thousand dollars he asked leave to retire and turn over his command. 
