Outcome of Earthquake.

"The fundamental strength of Japan has not been affected by the disaster," states Frank R. Eldridge, Chief of Far Eastern Division, Department of Commerce in an economic survey made public to-day. "The principal agricultural and industrial areas of Japan were not seriously damaged," Mr. Eldridge adds.

"If a true economic balance sheet of the losses were drawn the cost of replacement would be greatly modified by other factors. First, the Japanse people can and will produce more goods under the impulse of this need than normally. The plant and equipment of the Empire will run at a higher ratio of capacity. The people will especially in the damaged regions, work longer hours and more energetically. "The manufacturing industry of Japan has been relatively little affested, the spinning industry, which is the backbone of Japanese industrial growth, being largely outside the earthquake zone. Manufacturers of electrical goods, metal ware, paper, and chemical producte in Osaka and Nagoya will undoubtedly increase their capacity so as to take care of the shortage caused by de-

struction of factories in Tokio. "The question of how far the insurance companies will make up individual losses will undoubtedly rest ultimately upon a decision of how far the Government wishes to make grants through insurance companies to re-habilitation of in-

dustry. "Out of the whole disaster Japan will probably emerge with stimulated productive capacity due to the necessity of large rebuilding programme, modernization of public works and buildings and advanced methods of sanitation, drainage, and the planning of a newer and greater

Mr. Eldridge discusses in some detail the estimated economic losses caused by the earthquake. He shows that in a considerable portion of these losses the labor element is a large factor in replacements. "Fuller realization of Japan's productive capacity," Mr. Eldridge states, "will greatly reduce the labor factor in re-

construction and replacements." A review of the credit and financial situation causes Mr. Eldridge to conclude that Japan will be able to finance readily the re-habilitation programme. The Japanese will probably purchase necessary raw materials and machinery to replace property destroyed in the disaster through coordinated purchases by centralized agencies or possibly a purchasing syndicate, Mr. Eldridge

Tunneling to **Empire Through** Continental Divide.

We are generally inclined to believe that the age of great railroad pioneering has passed long since, and remain for modern builders. But fifty miles west of Denver

work has been started on the sixmile Moffat tunnel which will pierce gateway to an undeveloped empire larger than the three states of Masregion and cut the very center of a nearly 3,000 years, more than seventeen times the amount of oil thus the country, and over 700,000 unde-Although estimates have been made, the extent and amount of such minerals as iron, copper, zinc, lead and gilsonite, wurtzilite, nigrite, elaterite, are still little more than a rough approximate waiting for development and closer exploration for

fairly accurate estimates. That region is the western corner of Colorado and the eastern part of Utah-a hinterland filled with vast natural resources and waiting only for adequate transportation to begin a boom of tremendous prosperity.

Moffat tunnel has not attracted much attention outside Colorado. At first it was the dream of one man, but now it is a district affair, sponsored especially by Denver because readily curable ailment was what it is expected to make that city a future distribution point for the oil eventually to be extracted from the oil shale of the Uinta basin. And, when the six-mile tunnel is opened, the Carbon County coal fields will be able to ship coal across the short cut to Denver and thus reach the states northward at a much lower cost for transportation.—Wyman S. Smith, in Forbes Magazine, New York.




