

Strawberries.—During a late visit to Oakville, the strawberry garden of Canada, we made a few enquiries with regard to the crop of the coming season, and found that there is at present every indication of an excellent yield. The ground under stawberry entitivation is of a larger extent than ever, yet there is no danger but that every berry will be in demand. The plants have struggled advantageous ly with the weather of the season, and now present a thrifty appearance. Many of them are in bloom, and prognosticators observe, from indications to them best known, that the yield of berries to the plant will be of a high average, and perhaps beyond that of any former year. It is a well-known fact that Oakville strawberries are parexcellence in demand over all other berries in Toronto, Hamilton, Montreal and other large townspoints to which, for rapid stipment and superior arrangements for transit, are always completed. The demand for the berries is extraordinary, and many quarts have been contracted for in advance at the wholesale price, delivered at the cars, of 9 cents per quart—a figure considered as a good one, and one at which it pays well to produce this luscious fruit. Should the weather prove propitious, one of the largest yields ever gathered may be expected, and that, too, of superior fruit. The number of strawberry cultivators is as large as ever, and so great is the demand for help during the rips season that schools are almost descreted of childran, who, with women and boys, go in scores to the field: every mosming and pick the fruit until the afternoon trains are despatched. A very lively season is anticipated for Oalville this summer.—Humilton Times.
