The representatives in the Council of the West Ward have undoubtedly made out a strong case in favor of the additional appropriation which they have endeavored insuccessfully to obtain. The senior member has taken the trouble to compile a concise and complete statement, comparing the number of voters, the assessment, and the length of streets in each ward, and it was read at the Council in Committee of the whole on Monday. We intended to have presented it yesterday with some remarks, but were prevented by press of matter. Here it is:—

The West Ward has therefore 65 chains more ward itriets than the East and North Wards put together, and more than one-half more than the South Ward. If a calculation is made on the basis of the East Ward, with its 185 chains of ward streets, receiving \$200 to repair those streets, in the same proportion of relative length of ward streets, the North Ward should receive \$248, the South Ward \$341, and the West Ward \$519.

It is quite evident that the state of things shown by the foregoing figures cannot long continue without some remedy being applied, and the most thorough and satisfactory remedy would appear to be a division of the West Ward into two.
