OIRCULATION. — Letters and postal cards have circulated in 1873 to the number of 34,579,000, being an increase over 1872 of 3,979,000. Newspapers have increased from 24,400,000 in 1872, to 25,480,000 in 1873, a difference of 1,980,000. Registered letters numbered in 1873 1,377,000, and in 1872 1,280,000, an increase of 97,000. Free letters have decreased from 1,125,000 in 1872, to 1,091,000 in 1873. Parcels sent by post numbered 112,300 in 1873, against 95,200 in 1872, an increase of 17,100.

The receipts for correspondence between Cánada and the States were 444,024. There were 1,983,240 letters, 1,736,960 newspapers, 51,998 books, and 24,418 parcels sent between Canada—exclusive of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia—and the United Kingdom.

THE LAND TENURE IN SCOTLAND.—The British Government has published a return of proprietors of land in Scotland, which throws some remarkable light upon a subject regarding which even among well-informed men in political life there existed a vast amount of misapprehension. It appears that there are 131,530 who hold ground in their own right by various tenures. Of these 40,000 own merely building stances and garden sites, in burghs. Those who hold feus of less than an acre, outside burghs number 70,000. There are thus less than 20,000 proprietors of land available for agriculture or pasture. About 15,000 of this latter class derive an income of £1,000 a year, and only 120 more than £10,000 from their land. The extent of possessions is by no means propertionate to the income. Lord Elibank, for instance, from his 1,800 acres of land in East Lothian has a return of about £60,000, while Sir Charles Ross does not get a £1,000 from thirty times as many acres in Sutherlandshire. 

Majesty's mails travelled 13,266,998, an increase of 718,209 miles over the previous year.

OIRCULATION. — Letters and postal cards have circulated in 1873 to the number of 34,579,000, being an increase over 1872 of 3,979,000. Nowspapers have increased from 24,400,000 in 1872, to 25,480,000 an 1873, a difference of 1,080,000. Registered letters numbered in 1873 1,377,000, and in 1872 1,220,000, an increase of 97,000. Free letters have decreased from 1,125,000 in 1872, to 1,091,000 in 1873. Parcels sent by post numbered 112,300 in 1873, against 95,-200 in 1872, an increase of 17,100.

The receipts for correspondence between Canada and the States were 444,024. There were 1,998,240 letters, 1,736,960 newspapers, 51,998 books, and 24,418 parcels sent between Canada—exclusive of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia—and the United Kingdom.

DEAD LETTERS.—The number of dead letters was in 1873 426,886, the unpaid postage on which amounted to \$5,000.

3,089 of the letters were registered.

FINANCES.—The revenue was \$1,406,984 in 1873, an increase of \$213,922 over the previous year. The expenditure in 1873 was \$1,533,604, an increase of 1873 wa

Power of Mayistrates.

The following judgment of the Judges, in reference to the powers of County Magistrates in towns in which Police Magistrates in towns in which Police Magistrates have been appointed, was decision in reference to the objection to a recognizance before the Election Court, and is of interest as it sets at rest a question, as to jurisdiction of County Magistrates, on which considerable discussion has taken place:

The County Magistrate has jurisdiction in the town, except in local cases. The meaning of the statute is to exclude County Magistrates' jurisdiction only in case I arising in town, otherwise he could not take acknowledgments of married women parting with their real estate. Nor could he take proofs of loss arising under insurance policies. It has been held, under 27 Eliz ch. 13, which requires an eath of robbery to be made before a J. P. of the could not be taken before a J. P. of the could not be taken before a J. P. of the city of London—(Paley on Convictions, 18, 19.) Nothing but express words in his commission can outs the jurisdiction of a Magistrate for the County, or prevent his exercising it in an incorporated town—(Paley 30, 31.) He may perform acts out of his jurisdiction, where not of a coercive nature. He may take a voluntary recognizance—(Bacon's Abridgment, 7th ed., vol. 4., p. 619.) He may do a ministerial act, and take recognizances and informations; for these, says Lord Chief Justice Hall, "are acts of voluntary jurisdiction, and may be done in any county." (Regina v. Wharton, et al., 19 U. C. C. Pg.) in any county." (Reg et al, 19 U. C. C. Pg.)

THE LAND TENURE IN SCOTLAND.—The British Government has published a return of proprietors of land in Scotland, which throws some remarkable light upon a subject regarding which even among well-informed men in political life there existed a vast amount of misapprehension. It appears that there are 131,530 who hold ground in their own right by various tenures. Of these 40,000 own merely building stances and garden sites in burghs. Those who hold feus of less than an acre, outside burghs number 70,000. There are thus less than 20,000 proprietors of land available for agriculture or pasture. About 15,000 of this latter class derive an income of £1,000 a year, and only 120 more than £10,000 from their land. The extent of possessions is by no means propertionate to the income. Lord Elibank, for instance, from his 1,800 acres of land in East Lothian has a return of about £60,000, while Sir Charles Ross does not get a £1,000 from thirty times as many acres in Sutherlandshire.
