The Committee state that they did not consider that it would serve the public interest in any way to pursue the inquiry further, and we believe every person who read the evidence day by day as it appeared, will agree with them. It was little else but a collection of gossip and scandal, indus-triously collected by McCandless, which he had for months been arranging in presentable form, for the purpose of dameging the public and private character of the Commissioner of Agriculture, and the standing and character of there who were, or are now, employed at the Farm.
