King George is easily the most travelled of all the kings of England, and there is no part of his Empire which he has not visited on at least one occasion. He is the only king who has ever stepped on Indian soil after ascending the throne. He was crowned king on June 22, 1911.

By Britain's rivals and enemies the decis-Britain's rivals and enemies the decis evitably created that the solidarity the empire is but a myth; that th sea power which would like to see the everthrow of the British naval supremacy, need not be discouraged by the thought that their challenge would be met by the united resources of the mother country and daughter states. Such an impression, too, must be heightened by the doctrine advanced by the opposition to justify their re-fusal to provide three battleships for the imperial fleet. "The naval strength of the empire,"



EDICINE HAT, June 2.—That the people of the west are not willing to have any unnecessary delay in bringing about the union of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches was amply demonstrated by the resolution which was introduced into the Methodist conference this afternoon, being moved by Mr. W. G. Hunt, of Calgary, and seconded by Rev. C. H. Huestis, of Red Deer. The resolution reads as follows: "That whereas church union among Methodists, Presbyterians and Congregationalists has now been under discussion for several years, and whereas looking forward to that union co-operation has been most effective and satisfactory in many places, and whereas at the present time there seems no longer to be any need or advantage of distinguishing denominational lines in Western Canada; be it resolved that this Alberta conference memorialize the general conference special committee to take such steps through the various church courts as will lead to the immediate establishment of a united church (on the proposed basis) in Canada west of the Great Lakes."
