

TORY PAPER SEES IN SENATE'S ACTION A DISGUISED BLESSING

Observer is Quite Hopeful That Result Will Be a More Emphatic Declaration by Canadians of Its Readiness to Take Share in Naval Defence

CHURCHILL IN MEANTIME ASKED TO BUILD SHIPS

Morning Post Tries to Read Hostility to Empire Into the Action; Says Enemies of the Empire Will Rejoice in Action of Canadian Senate.

London, June 2.—The delay may prove a blessing in disguise if it results in a more emphatic declaration of the determination of the Canadian people to bear their own share in the naval defence.

This is the hopeful view of The Observer, in connection with the action of the Canadian senate with regard to the Borden navy bill.

Should he fail, however, it will be a matter for negotiations between his successor and the admiralty whether they are retained as units in the Royal Navy or purchased for Canada as the nucleus of her autonomous fleet.

Commenting on the decision of the senate in rejecting the naval bill, The Morning Post declares it cannot but be viewed with grave concern by every one conversant with the gravity of the problem of the imperial defence.

Official Paper Views. The editor of the Canadian government in proposing to provide three first-class battleships to reinforce the British fleet, made a profound impression in the world.

The senate legitimately refuses to pass the bill until the country has been canvassed. Why Premier Borden refuses to consult the country by means of a referendum is not easy to understand.

DEMAND FOR DOMESTICS EXCEEDS SUPPLY IN CALGARY

Y. W. C. A. Receives 174 Applications in One Month, 132 of Which are Filled

The Y.W.C.A. employment bureau found employment for 132 girls last month, but this number did not nearly fulfill the demand. Applications for domestic help numbered 174, leaving 42 pieces still available last month.
Up to date the Y.W.C.A. bureau has been free, the expenses of maintenance being met by the fee of \$1.00. The demands have grown so heavy that it has decided to apply for a city license and other cities and make the employers inflexible, after the license is granted. In view of the public benefit of the bureau, the city has decided to follow the example of Edmonton and other cities and make the fee a nominal one. Instead, the commissioners are recommending that the council avoid the danger of creating a precedent by granting the "Y" \$50 with which to pay the regular fee.

The New School.
It is not often that a western town has the privilege of seeing such a fine actress as Blanche Bates, nor of also witnessing such a well-balanced play as that of A. E. W. Mason's, but to have Blanche Bates in "The Witness for the Defence" is certainly an attraction which should bring theatre lovers out in full force, and should even tempt non-theatre goers to reform. Without going into the play, any who have seen it must be struck with the fine character portrayal which appears on the stage. Mason is essentially a "live" dramatist. His men and women are real, there are no very great heroes nor heroines in the play any more than there are in real life, and yet all the characters live all humanity, rise above themselves at one or another part of the drama. Ballantine was not wholly responsible, even in the mind of his wife's lover, for his temper and brutality.
