The law of libel.

As the law of libel now stands the editor of a newspaper may be arrested and taken to court, or summoned to appear in any other part of the domain to answer a charge of libel.

The editor of the News of Toronto was arrested here and taken to Montreal to answer a charge of libel.

Public attention has been attracted to the case of the News of Toronto by the fact that the alleged libel was delivered at a post-office in this country.

An aggrieved party in British Columbia may bring an editor from Prince Edward Island to Vancouver if he can prove that one copy of the paper, as received in the latter place, contains libelous matter.

All that is necessary is that the aggrieved party in Vancouver swear out the information and demand a summons to an agent in the east to be served on the publisher.

An information was laid at Woodstock this week against the editor of this paper and a summons sent down and served, and yesterday the defendant appeared before the Woodstock police magistrate and was committed to the next court for trial.

We notice that a number of our contemporaries have taken up the matter and are advocating radical changes in the law.

We do not say that we do not see how the law could well be changed to regard the place where the case is to be heard.

The citizen is as much entitled to protection as the publisher, and it is necessary that there may be some hardship under the present law for the publisher it seems to be a wholesome check on him.

Rather the law to be changed in the direction of making it more difficult for parties who feel aggrieved, involving criminal prosecution against the publisher who prints what appears to be an ordinary item, and which he publishes, not maliciously, but simply as news.

The proper remedy is a civil action. It is no justification of a criminal prosecution to say that the journalist is said to be no good for the amount even if a verdict is had against him.

That is tantamount to saying that the poor editor must go to jail, but the rich one can buy himself off.

That criminal libel still remains one of the ten never get beyond the commitment is one good proof of our civilization.
