A HOSTILE FRENCH CABINET.

FIVE MINISTERS REMARKABLE FOR ENEMIES TO BRITAIN.

France is Furious at Being Forestalled by England in Africa—Rosebery is Throwing a Sop to the Irish Displeasure.

New York, June 2.—Smalley cables from London: The new French Cabinet is pre-eminently an Anglophobe cabinet. Mr. Dupuy, when Prime Minister before, made no secret of his hostility to England. Mr. Casimir-Perier was perhaps even less friendly to England, and a Foreign Minister missed few opportunities of being disagreeable. He is succeeded by M. H. Hanotaux of the Foreign Office, who is believed in England to have been more actively concerned than any other of the French Foreign Office people in the ceaseless intrigues against Lord Rosebery which the Quai d'Orsay is the centre. He will now have a still fuller scope for his malvolence.

Next in importance to the Foreign Minister for purposes of disturbance abroad is the Colonial Minister, and the new Colonial Minister is M. Delcasse, the leader of the anti-English party in France, and the most violent of them all. It is in colonial matters that France and England come most frequently into collision, and it may safely be assumed that under M. Delcasse's lead the collisions will be more frequent than ever.

The Minister of Finance is M. Poincaré, who seems to have been selected because he published a few days ago a bitter article in the English press, apropos of the question just now at issue between England and France. Or, perhaps, he published the article in order to secure the same thing, and thus to make a road to popularity and power so sure and direct as to know himself to Great Britain. General Mercier remains Minister of War. Another notorious Anglophobe. It might be difficult to find a distinguished French soldier who is not.

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THE CAMPAIGN IN THE NORTH.

MR. MORTIMER RECEIVES A FLATTERYING RECEPTION.

He Deals With the Mystical Surplus and Shows That Ontario Really Has a Deficit of Three-Quarters of a Million Dollars.

Mr. George F. Mortimer opened his campaign in North Toronto with a rousing meeting in St. Paul's Hall Saturday night. Mr. Mortimer spoke for nearly an hour, and his speech impressed those who listened as being the utterances of a courageous man. Entirely free from even the slightest approach to personalities, he condemned the Mowat Government on the broad principles of policy. With the keen perception of a thorough business man, and the skill of a master of finance, he dealt with the administration of the province, the situation of the Crown lands and Public Works Departments.

Mr. Mortimer's delivery on prohibition was clear, concise and convincing. He was an advocate of cold water. Willing to stand or fall with his principles, he declared his conviction without the slightest hesitation. Without entreaching himself with a multiplicity of conditions he freely and frankly declared himself a prohibitionist.

The chair was occupied by Aid. Shaw, and among others on the platform with the candidate were: Messrs. W. F. Maclean, M. P., R. L. Fraser, P. H. Barton, O. A. Harcourt, Liberal Conservative candidate for South Toronto; E. Bristol, W. B. Newsome, M. C. Ellis, J. Johnson, J. N. Lee and Frank Arnold.

With a few words of personal reference to Mr. Mortimer, in which he effectively answered the Grit cry that Mr. Mortimer could not contest a constituency of which he was not a resident, the Chairman opened the meeting.

Mr. P. H. Barton stated that he voted as a Conservative because he was a business man. If the Conservative policy was best for the Dominion it was also best for the province. With the present financial policy of the Ontario Government it was only a question of time when the province would be bankrupt.

Mr. M. C. Ellis scored Sir Oliver Mowat for his financial policy. He stated that the province, and spoke of Mr. Meredith as a man who, by his unscrupulous Christianity and high nobility of character, had won the respect and admiration of all classes throughout the Dominion.

Mr. Mortimer Received an Ovation. Bounding cheers greeted Mr. Mortimer when he came forward. He said he was not going to speak as a party man, but as a fair-minded citizen of a great country, hoping thereby to convince the Reformers of the wisdom of their cause, and to show the virtues of the Mowat Government were entirely unfounded. Then he launched into a scathing criticism of the administration of the province for the past 22 years.

When the great Liberal convention was held at Ottawa several of the delegates had a surmise that a surplus had been saved from the revenues. Sir Oliver Mowat was chairman of that convention, and although he knew that state surplus was false he allowed it to go unchallenged.

The government had no doubt a balance sheet showing the true position of the province at the present time. The assets were placed at \$1,000,000, while the liabilities were \$2,747,747, or a deficit of \$1,747,747.

Turning to public institutions and the management of the same, Mr. Mortimer stated that the Government employed for \$2,000,000 in seven years, and not one cent of interest had ever been added. Mr. J. Conroy, M.L.A., had offered for seven years without interest. Mr. W. H. Carpenter, a member of the same kind promised, "if we get into power," continued the speaker, "will give you a relation along these lines that will startle the province."

Mr. Mortimer also instanced the case of one Plunkett, a Government bushranger, who, in league with Sharpe, M.L.A., had secured a London farmer out of several thousand dollars, and although it was brought to the notice of the House, the government refused to prosecute the plunger. A great deal had been said about the Ottawa Government had released McCreary and Conroy from jail, but the Ontario Government had never even put a man in jail.

MANY MEASURES STILL BORN.

THE SESSION AT WESTMINSTER MAY PROVE A FIASCO.

Precedence Being Given to the Evicted Tenants' Bill Will Struggle All Others and May Result in a Defeat of the Government.

LONDON, June 2.—A legislative fiasco appears to be impending in the present session of Parliament. Even with the most rigorous application of the closure rule the budget clauses will occupy the attention of the House of Commons until the middle of July. The Ministerialists admit that the Welsh Church Disestablishment and Local Option bills must be dropped, and the Registration bill limited to a brief and non-contentious measure, simply shortening the period of the residence qualification.

Evicted Tenants' Bill to be Passed. The McCarthys have been given the assurance that whatever bills may be necessary to carry out the provisions of the bill will be passed before Parliament is prorogued. It is expected that the bill will be passed before Parliament is prorogued.

Prorogation Desired in August. Both sides are desirous that Parliament should be prorogued in August, at the least, and to attain this object the leaders of the Opposition have privately proposed to the Government that they should suspend the session, providing that all business be abandoned except the budget and the continuation of the Supply bill, and the Government has agreed to this proposal.

£150,000 For the Evicted Tenants. The formation of a French Cabinet with a view to the evacuation of the British colonies has excited grave apprehension in English financial circles. The record of M. Hanotaux in the past has not been particularly brilliant, and it is not surprising that the French Government should be in a position to offer such a large sum of money to the British Government.

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WORSE THAN LOCUSTS.

TARIFF PROGRESS BLOCKED.

Republicans and Populists Combine to Prevent an Obstacle to Progress—Movement of the Bill to be Brought in—The End Not in Sight.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Two months of tariff debate have passed in the Senate and the end is not yet within telescopic vision. Republican senators stated 10 days ago that the close of this present week would find the sugar schedule still undisturbed. The course of events in connection with the investigation of the special committee as far as that investigation has proceeded and the fact which it is expected will be disclosed in the future sessions of that committee seem to make it possible that this threat may be verified. Some of the leaders on the Republican side insist that the vote cannot be taken until the investigation into the sugar schedule under the investigation into the allegations of improper influence being used to secure the adoption of that schedule has been disposed of. Several of the populist Senators, however, Mr. Hill are on record as favoring this view. Their forces, added to the united Republican strength, will form a phalanx dangerously near a majority, provided there should be one or two Democratic absences on the critical roll call, and it is anticipated that the vote will be taken.

Night Sessions Until the Vote is Taken. Mr. Harris has given fair notice of an intention to prolong this debate. An amendment to the bill has been prepared and will be introduced probably this week, which provides for the repeal of the 10 per cent duty on sugar. This may prove an embarrassing "Trojan horse" in the camp.

Additional Amendments. The subcommittee of the Finance Committee had been looking over the situation lately and will shortly bring in a number of additional amendments. Among these is one putting a 10 per cent duty on imported lithographic work, satisfactory to both the American lithographer and the printer. Another important matter is the proposed amendment which would place in the hands of the Senate the duty on imported tobacco and cigars.

ADVANCE IN SUGAR TRUST.

THE TONE OF THE WALL-STREET MARKET FIRMER. Wheat in the West Quiet and a Trifle Firmer—Cables Are Lower—Heavy Receipts of Hops At Chicago With Market Weakness.

Consols are firm, closing to-day at 101 1/4 for money and at 101 1/2 for account. Canadian Pacific is 5 1/2 higher, closing at 107 1/2.

It is expected that the visible supply of wheat will show a decrease of 700,000 bushels on Monday. During the corresponding week of last year there was an increase of 925,000 bushels.

The amount of bullion gone into the Bank of England on balance to-day was £2000. Montreal funds are 20c per \$1000 discount.

The gold redemption fund of the United States Treasury amounts to only \$75,000,000, or a decrease of over \$30,000,000 since May 1.

The settlement on the Buenos Ayres Bourse has caused the Argentine market to be weak. It is speculated for a fall in the premium on gold.

Bar silver in London is firmer at 88 3/4 per cent. At New York the price is 68 1/2.

Exports of wheat and flour, both counts, for the week ended 28th ult. were 1,300,000 bushels of wheat and 3,315,150 bushels of flour.

The available supply of wheat, according to the latest figures, is 2,400,000 bushels of the Rockies and 5,804,000 bushels, a total of 8,204,000 bushels.
