The fact that Digby is to be the terminus of the Bay of Fundy Steamship service at an early date is doubtless a matter of considerable satisfaction to her citizens, as well it might be. Whatever course the cold logic of facts dictates is the one which must be followed, no matter what may be its effect upon certain private interests or particular localities.

Other things being at all equal, the company which can land its passengers at their journey's end in the shortest possible time is the one which gets the most patronage. In no way has this been so marked during recent years as in the efforts being made by the various Atlantic steamers to reduce the time of the ocean voyage: and it was mainly with this incentive that the Canadian parliament at its last session voted a subsidy of three quarters of a million dollars a year to assist in establishing another and faster line of steamers than any now crossing the Atlantic. And if there were no other reasons than that of reducing the time of the journey from this province to New Brunswick or the upper provinces, the Dominion Atlantic people would in that one point alone have ample reason for making the change in terminus.

Of late years the steamship companies have been in the habit of giving to agents and large shippers what is known as a rebate in freights. That is to say, the companies charge the grower a certain rate and give the agent or shipper a part of it as a commission. This commission is never less than ten cents parted, and in some cases it is more. Some agents get a commission on all apples sent to a certain London house from this province, others on every barrel which is sent by a certain steamship line, no matter whether the grower ever knew these agents in the transaction or not. In addition to this rebate in freight there is also a return commission of a certain per cent given to these shippers by the London house.

These things explain why the freight and other expenses are so high. There are altogether too many middle men between the producer and consumer, and the fruit grow ers association would do well to take hold of the matter and if possible effect some radical reform in the present methods. 

How to Make a Doll's House. Get a wooden box for about a quarter o dollar and put the lid on hinges, and when the box is stood on end this lid opens, forming the door or side of the house. Two shelves are fitted in for floors and four holes cut for windows on each floor. These are filled in with window glass found about the house. The outside of the house is painted a warm yellow, with white around the windows. The walls are covered with old blue cartridge paper, with a frieze of pale yellow roses and olive pattern on the second story. Books and samples are often given away by dealers in wall paper. If paper is not to be had without an outlay, cover the walls with pale tinted silesia or cambric with a little frill at the top. Fasten to the wall with tacks. Then add little curtains of lace or cheesecloth and make rugs of bits of old

carpet or heavy cloth. A piece of plush of clive or cardinal, with a wide border of another darker color, would make a rich looking carpet. -It is well to allow house-plants to becom quite dry.
