WHY SPRAYING WILL PAY IN 1919

11:

For four years the apple growers of the Annapolis Valley have in response to patriotic calls grown all of the field crops as beans, oats and potatoes that they could, but in some way have found time to prevent their big permanent asset, their apple orchard from deteriorating. It is true that they have not sprayed, pruned nor cultivated quite as well as usual. but the neglect has not been enough to influence the trees appreciably from one year to another. They knew that when the war broke out they were slowly winning over their competitors for supremacy in their natural market, the English market. They knew that neglect was common in competing sections, and that if they cared for their orchards, the end of the war would see Nova Scotia stronger in the English Apple Market than ever before. Two things they did not consider, and did not expect. have come to their aid and placed them to day in a stronger position than even the most sanguine dreamed. is the increase in rail freight rates, which make the cost of transporting of apples from Western America to England almost prohibitive. while Nova Scotia with apples practically at the dock is not seriously affacted by increases in rail freights. The other is the low temperature of the Winter of 1917-1918, which killed an appreciable percentage of the trees in North Eastern America in sections that are in a position to compete with Nova Scotia
