FLOGGING AT THE GAOL.

Ianitoba Law Journal.

Waving the constitutional question, no one doubts that in order to justify the corporal castigation of a recaptured prisoner, there must be some written law somewhere. Granting that the Legislative Assembly has power to impose the lash as a part of prison discipline, and that it has power to delegate to the sheriff, or the Lieut.-Governor-in-Council the right to frame rules under which it is applied, there does not appear to be either statute, order-in-council or rule which Under Con. Stat. Man. c. 7, ss. 53 57, rules may be made for maintenance of order, the duties of the gaoler and turnkeys, and with regard to all matters neces ary for the proper security and the due ordering of the

It will be seen that flogging has not been sanctioned as a punishment for any offence, and that the penalty for an attempted escape is a further term of imprisonment. This further term of imprisonment must be awarded after trial, and the law has provided a tribunal. An attempted escape & a misdemeanor; and one accused must be tried and condemned for this, as for all other crimes. No power is given to the gaoler, or even the Attorney-General, to convict without information, evidence or the presence of the prisoner.

OUR POLICY.

It will follow experience always, because it is well aware that it is the safest guide. Of one thing the pub may rest assured, it will watch with eagle eye every move that is made by third parties who cannot toler ate an opponent, and who while professing to be liberals, are in most cases the most intolerant. Upon general as well as special principles the NoR-WESTER is opposed to public agitations in the North-West because it believes that any good purpose under our system of government can be se used without noise and bitister. The past him of public agitations in the North-West proves that they have never accomplished anything but mis chief, because in mischievous agila tion the designing trickster generally comes to the front, for howsoever, a cause may be good in the abstract, unless it is managed in a righteous way it were better that had never been undertaken. These gentlemen who are friendly to this journal and who are sincere in their belief that great good will result from a public agitation should first ask themselves if they are competent to control a public agitation when once it is under way, and so regulate it that it will be confined to its original limits. If they are nessectly sure that they can do this the mischievous spirits may be controlled, but are they sure that they can secure this obedience. It is a great undertaking to shape an agitation, and rare-good men are needed. Are they here? We are afraid not.



Coal Lands of the Northwest.

At the meeting of the national academy of elences at Newport, R. I., Prof. R. Pumpelly, who had charge of the survey of the country along the Northern Pacific in 1881, read a paper on the Mesozoic coals of the northwest. The coals in Washington teritory, northern Montana, Idaho, Oregon ad Dakota are all cretaceous, from the on of the Laramie formation down. From he Missouri river west to the Rocky mountains, the coal layers are thirteen sixteen feet thick, but are lightic and and crumble on exposure. West of that the yers are two to six feet thick; but are tuminous coking coals, In Judith basin, up to or past the British line, are coking chils from eighteen inches to five or six feet thick. The next great coal fields are west of the Cascade range. Here the thickses of carboniferous formation is at least 13,000 feet. All the bituminous coal has ben studied, but not yet the liquite. which les valuable. Some of these coals have been converted into natural coke, having the same chemical composition as anthracith. The bituminous coal is confined to' strips along the Cascade range and Vancouver's island. The total amount of carboniferous material is very great. The coul fields of Wyoming territory have no representative in the north.
