## ADVENT SERVICES.

Advent is but a short season this year, some twenty-four days, from St. Andrew's Day to Christmas Eve. Announcements of special preachers will be made later. Professor Duckworth, the new Professor of Divinity at Trinity, will preach on the evening of Advent Sunday. Advent is a solemn season of preparation for both the First and Second Comings of our Lord, and is therefore sacred to thoughts of the greatest event in the world's history—the Incarnation of the Son of God; and also of that solemn event, the Coming to Judgment, which, whether far off or close at hand, will be the close of human history.

On the weekdays in Advent, in addition to the Tuesday celebration and Wednesday Evening Service, Evensong will be said on Monday afternoons at 5 p.m., and the Litany on Friday mornings at 10.30 a.m.

## CHRISTMAS SERVICES.

The Celebrations on Christmas Day will be at 7 a.m., 8 a.m., and also at the Morning Service of 11 o'clock.

On the three Holy Days following Christmas Day the Celebrations will be at 8 a.m., and on Innocents' Day besides there will be Mattins and Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m.

## ST. GEORGE'S LITERARY AND MUSICAL SOCIETY.

Following Professor Clark's most interesting lecture on "What to Read and How to Read," on Nov. 5th, the Rector kindly entertained over one hundred members at a social reunion when a very pleasant evening was passed, a number of the members contributing songs and recitations. A short *resume* of the objects of the society was given and a very hearty vote of thanks offered by acclamation to the Rector for his hospitality. The debate on Nov. 12th, on the question "That it would be mutually beneficial for Canada and Newfoundland to confederate," was well attended and of surprising interest. A pleasing feature was the presence among the four Trinity men who conducted the debate of Mr. Charles Robinson, a son of one of our oldest and most respected parishioners, whose clear, concise and almost eloquent presentation of his case won deservedly and loudly expressed applause. The Rev. Mr. Gordon, Mr. Summerhayes and Mr. Dunfield also admirably expressed their respective views and we are really grateful to these gentlemen for their welcome visit.

The concert on Nov. 19th was a decided success, and the songs by Mrs. Mackellar, Miss Moore, Miss Saunders, Mr. Giles and Mr. Boulton were exceedingly well rendered and in some case: encores cheerfully accorded in response to unanimous demand. Perhaps the feature of the evening was the exquisite performance on the violin of Miss Hilda Boulton, who was repeatedly and enthusiastically encored. We are much indebted to Mr. Phillips for his kindness in accompanying the vocalists which he did with his accustomed skill and finish. Miss Mary Hagarty opened the proceedings with a delightful pianoforte solo which proved her to be already

an accomplished musician. A premature playing of the National Anthem prevented the Rector publicly thanking those who had done so much to provide so excellent an entertainment.

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## Parish Notes.

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Dr. and Mrs. Lough have gone to spend the winter with relations in Bermuda and will be much missed.

The Sunday morning congregations have been particularly large of late, and we observe and welcome many newcomers.

The Toronto Sunday School Association will hold its monthly meeting in St. George's school room on Monday, 16th inst. at 8 p.m. Canon Sheraton will read a paper on the Acts of the Apostles, and Mr. Biggar will give a digest of the valuable work of the New York S. S. Commission. A discussion on the subjects will follow. We hope that St. George's will be there in force.

The Sewing School reopened on Saturday, Nov. 2nd, when thirty children assembled to be

instructed in the mysteries of hemming and felling under the able direction of six "grown-ups." The following is the report of last year's work: The school opened on Nov. 24th, closed on April 27th, having held twenty meetings; average attendance, thirty; spent for material, \$5.10; received from children for material, \$5.90; balance on hand, 80c.—E. M. CAYLEY, Supt.

The weekly meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary have been very well attended throughout the past month and two new active members have joined. A valuable gift of men's clothing, always particularly welcome, was sent, and many other useful things, which will help make the winter bales very acceptable to their recipients. One goes to the Gordon School, Qu'Appelle diocese, next week. Small gifts suitable for Christmas trees will be very welcome if sent to the Rectory, or, on Monday afternoons, to the schoolhouse.

Owing to the Mothers' Meetings commencing so late last year comparatively few meetings were held. The first one was on Feb. 7th, and there were altogether eight gatherings, with an average attendance of ten mothers. They were occupied by making up garments, sheets and other household articles. At four o'clock a cup of tea was provided for the mothers, followed by a short service and address by Dr. Hare. This year we commenced on Oct. 17th with some additional members. It is hoped the numbers will

still increase, as they are a very nice set of mothers to work with.—A. B. RITCHIE, Supt.

The appeal for additional members of the Choir has been well responded to. On the Cantoris side the ladies' choir desk has been lengthened to its fullest extent for the accommodation of five new members. In the men's section there are three or four new members and several new boys have come and are coming in. It is proverbial that in church choirs there is usually an unharmonious, sometimes a rebellious, element, but this is a sort of thing of which St. George's has no experience whatever. The co-operation of the Choir among themselves and with the clergy and organist is thoroughgoing, while the clergy alone know how greatly the congregation appreciates the work of the Choir and the accompaniments of Mr. Phillips.
