Edwards, safe maker, Montreal, valued at nearly \$13,500; Eusebe Martel, general stock, West Farnham, Que., inventoried at \$5,700; the St. Lawrence Pulp & Paper Co., Sorel, Que.; and of Henri Lavallee, Montreal, watchmaker and jeweller, valued

ONE of the principal creditors of J. & G Smith, of Brigus, Nfid., dealers in fish and sup-. plies, recently applied to court to have them declared insolvent, pending a meeting of those interested. Their liabilities are almost exclusively on the island, and foot up some \$25,000. The present proprietors succeeded to the business on the death of their father in 1870. They were chiefly concerned in the Labrador fishery.

John Noble, of Markdale, blacksmith, was, at his best, probably worth about \$500 net, but the village blacksmith has usually a slow class of people for his customers, and unless he be persuasive as a collector is likely to find his assets of no avail in paying for bariron, nails and shoes. Such was Mr. Noble's case, and his recent assignment followed as a matter of course.

A London wholesale and retail stationer, &c., has decided to remove his wholesale business to Toronto. A local correspondent says: --- "His announcement to this effect is regarded as an advertisement to get rid of stock in London but it is a fact nevertheless."-A London, Ont., plumber has invented a self-adjusting annunciator for electric bell systems in hotels, etc., and has obtained a caveat preparatory to taking out a patent.

The employees of the company are now all working full time, in the shops at Stratford, and if report speaks correctly the works of the company will be considerably enlarged during the coming year.

MR. R. R. GOULDING, hardware merchant Tilsonburg, Ont., has sold his business to A. & C. Denton, who will carry on the same, in the premises occupied by Mr. Goulding for the past six years. Mr. Goulding removes to Stratford Ont., and will open out there early in January in the same line, general hardware. Mr. Goulding's business has been very successful in Tilsonburg, and he expects to increase the volume of his trade largely by opening up in the "baby city" of the West.

Simon, clothier, a comparative stranger in Stratford, Ont., has assigned. His stock at any time did not much exceed \$1,000. He came from Brantford but a short time ago.

THE estate of Mr. James Stewart, the Times Printing and Publishing Co., this city, is again in the market, Mr. Chas. Walters, who recently purchased the estate for Mr. Stewart for \$4,800, refusing to be bound by certain conditions imposed by the creditors in the interest of the late owner. James Baxter, the wellknown "financial negotiator,"-Mr. Baxter, does not desire to be taxed as a "broker,"offered \$4,000 for the estate a few days ago, but the creditors held out for \$4,500.

MR. J. B. GRAHAM, merchant, of Belleville who died 24th December, 1885, was insured in favor of his wife for \$10,000 in the Canada Life Assurance Co., and \$5000 in the Sun. Mr. Graham has been in business in Belleville since 1865, when he started a general store with his brother. In 1876 he abandoued the store to deal in specific articles, and in 1877 he became senior partner in the firm of Graham, Barber, Warner & Co. of this city and Toronto, which fell into trouble soon after his retirement. He leaves three children.

THE City and District Savings Bank has been relieved of its congestion, the Government having come to the rescue as a borrower for \$1,500,000 at 4 per cent. The bank has for some time back been unable to find Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.

A little modern improvement in its spacious premises, an elevator or so, should largely increase its revenue from that quarter. There are two or three practical business men on the Board.

MESSRS. I. C. Beauvais & Co., dry goods merchants of this city, have assigned to Messrs Kent & Turcotte. The firm was formerly Beauvais & Perrault, but dissolved partnership about eighteen months ago, Mr. Perrault retiring. The estate then showed a surplus of \$13,000, which was divided between the partners. The liabilities are stated to be \$12,430, with assets nominally the same figure. It is expected the deficit will be only small; stock is now being taken, and Mr. Beauvais is endeavoring to obtain security for a compromise.

TEXTILE INDUSTRIES IN THE UNITED KING-DOM .- A parliamentary return relating to these industries has just been issued. Taking all classes of goods there has been steady growth for the last 30 years. In 1856 there were 5,117 factories, employing 682,000 persons; in 1874, 7,294 factories with 1,005,-000 work people; and in 1885, 7,465 factories employing 1,034,000 persons. In cotton manufactures, the increase has not been so marked, especially in the last decade. The figures are:

1856....2,210 factories 379,000 employees. 1868....2,549 401,000 u 1874....2,655 479,000 1885....2,635 504,000

Joseph Bergeron, dry goods merchant of St. Hyacinth, has assigned. Liabilities are placed at \$2,400, while it is claimed that the assets will reach \$2,000. -Mr. Bergeron has been in business since April, 1884, and his failure has been somewhat a surprise to the trade. No offer has been made as yet. The principal creditors are Dupuis Frères and Hodgson, Sumner & Co. of this city.

Mn. J. B. Deny, who keeps a general store in Sherbrooke, has assigned, with liabilities of \$2,850. He has always been in a small way and has never more than made a living; he is said to be of good character but not gifted with that keen perception necessary in the face of the severe competition he had to contend with. His principal Montreal creditors are Hudon, Hebert & Co.

It is specially noteworthy that, notwithstanding the increase in the number of persons employed from 1874 to 1885, there was a decrease in the number of children from 66,-000 to 49,000. The number of looms in 1885 is given at 44,900,000, of which 43,600,000 are in England and Wales, and most of the remainder in Scotland. There are only 7 cotton factories in Ireland, where the industry seems to be dying out.

ALPHONSE PICARD, contractor, of St. Jean Baptiste Village has failed. His liabilities amount to \$1,000, owed chiefly to lumber dealers of this city, while his assets consist of a second-hand moveable office valued at \$20. His creditors made some pointed remarks on the non-appearance of available assets, but their sarcasms were received by Mr. Picard on the brazen buckler of a sardonic smile.

MESSRS. ADAMS BROS., grocers, of Cornwall, have assigned. The estate shows liabilities of \$8,000, while the assets are valued only at \$4,-000, and may probably show a further shrinkage. The firm has been in business for about eighteen months, and it is said that the members own considerable property in the vicinity, but this is mortgaged, and probably would not help the estate much. An offer of 30 cents on the dollar was made and refused. The failure is attributed to reckless trading, too much credit, and lack of necessary experience.



ADJUSTMENT AND APPORTION-MENT OF FIRE LOSSES, No. 2.

Last week we dealt with that portion of Mr. Lye's address relating to adjustments, stating we would take up the matter of apportionments on a future occasion, which promise we now propose to redeem. We intimated that while we agreed in the main with Mr. Lye's remarks regarding the adjustment of fire losses we could not hold with him as to apportionments. Years ago in these columns we laid down a few rules, which we believed and still consider would always work equitably both for the companies and the insured. We started with the maxim that a loss, where more than one office is interested, must be apportioned in rateable contributions by each office according to its respective liability, and in explanation of this we upheld Mr. Bunyon in his Laws on Fire Insurance where he says that "the word rateable refers to the liability of the respective offices upon the ascertained loss and not to the possible liability upon the sums insured." Further we added regarding the term, "liability" that we agreed with the late Mr. Hore in his "Apportionment of Fire Losses" as follows:-

1. "The ratio of a policy's liability to the total loss covered is also its ratio of liability to any item of such loss."

2. "Such liability is unaffected by the existence or non-existence of any other policies covering the same property.

We would ask the reader to bear these rules in mind, as they are of material consequence respecting the example set forth by Mr. Lye in his address we are discussing.

We have no fault to find with Mr. Lye's definition of the policies known as " specific," "blanket" and "floating," nor with his reference to the terms "average" and "co-insurance," but in stating afterwards that " some rule of apportionment" is necessary for non-concurrent policies he becomesto our mind-slightly "mixed"-where speaking of "initial" and "ultimate" liabilities—and absolutely instances nine as a few of the rules which may be adopted in apportioning a loss under non-concurrent policies. We, on the other hand, maintain that there is only one rule which will work justly for all parties, namely, the rule we have mentioned above. The example chosen by Mr. Lye is the following:

On a row of five houses there is a loss of \$26,250, viz., \$5,250 on each, and the insurance thus:

Policy A \$5,000 "blanket" over the whole " B \$5,000 "specific" \$1,000 on each

C \$5,000 "blanket" over Nos. 1 and 2 " u

D \$5,000 " 1, 2 and 3 " 1, 2, 3, & 4 E \$5,000

" 3,4 and 5 F \$5,000

and he adds that "to satisfy the loss of \$26,250 there would be \$30,000 of insurance, which had assumed\$90,000 of initial liability, with a proportionate liability of \$7,776.98 to the the first policy, \$1,555.40 to the second policy, \$2,500 to the third policy, \$3,750 to the fourth policy, \$5,390.42 to the fifth policy, and \$5,277.00 to the sixth policy," with all of which we disagree, for whatever initial liability may mean we maintain that no policy can bear a greater liability than the total amount of such policy, while the proportionate liability of each policy is that laid down in Mr. Hore's rules already quoted. To be more explicit, had each of the policies existed singly-the loss being equal on each house or item, and exceeding the amount of any one insurance,their respective or proportionate liabilities (excluding fractions) would have been as follows :-

and such liabilities are neither increased or decreased by the fact of the further insur-

ances, the contributions merely of each policy being affected thereby. It may here be objected that the "specific" policy "B" obtains no advantage over the "blanket" policy "A," but this is merely an accident, owing to the losses on the various items being even, for had there been a loss on any one item of, say, \$5000, "A's" liability

would have been for that amount and "B's" for only \$1,000, the contribution being in proportion.

To continue: after recapitulating the nine various rules referred to, Mr. Lyc in an appendix gives what he terms the proper apportionment of the above example, which we submit with our own:

At first sight it would appear somewhat hard that with an insurance of \$30,000 on a loss of \$26,250 the insured should be at a disadvantage to the extent of \$1,917, but in reality while there are policies for \$30,000 there is only insurance upon the ascertained loss of \$24,333 as, owing to the insured's method of taking out his policies, there is an over insurance on items Nos. 1, 2 and 3, while Nos. 4 and 5 are not sufficiently covered, and this Mr. Lye allows, although he differs with us as to the respective amounts, making the over-insurance\$4323.71 against our \$5,646 and the under-insurance \$573.71 as against our \$1,917, the difference in each case (with the exception of fractions not calculated by us) being some \$1,343, but, to our mind, by a strange blunder, he does not permit policies E. and F., which cover upon No. 3, to participate in the over, insurance on that item! Mr. Lye with an "initial"—by which we presume he means, "prima facie" liability of \$90,000 to meet a loss of \$26,250 makes the insured lose \$573.71, while we with a "prima facie" liability of \$30,000 cause the insured to lose \$1917, and we not only maintain our apportionment to be correct, but that it has the merit of simplicity in addition to accuracy, both we believe wanting in Mr. Lye's.

#### COMMERCIAL LAW.

A case was decided by Mr. Justice Patterson on the 5th inst. which affects the interests of all bankers and merchants who may hold paper due in Ontario, and should, we think, be generally known. The case in question was the suit of the Merchants Bank against A. W. Bell, as assignee of the McDougall estate, for interest on an overdue promissory note.

The bank held several overdue notes, all of which, save the one in question, had been protested for non-payment. On the protested notes they succeeded in recovering interest in full, but on the bill that was not protested no interest was allowed by the Court, notwithstanding the fact the endorsers had waived protest. On appeal from this decision to the court in Toronto the bank relied on the recognized custom of banks in such matters as implying a contract for the payment of interest, and also set up that the waiver of protest was intended by all parties and should have the effect of placing the holders in the same position as if the bill had been protested.

The Court, however, held that no contract had been proven, that the waiver of protest could not be taken as of the same effect in this case as actual protest, and refused to allow the interest claimed.

It will doubtless surprise some of our readers to know that an overdue note does

not, as a matter of course, bear interest. The Ontario statute makes a note subject to interest from the date of the protest, and as an enactment contrary to the common law, this is strictly construed, as we see in this case.

But we would not advise any one to take advantage of this, since on the proper action the Court will almost invariably allow damages, usually measured by the interest which would be due on a debt bearing interest.

We may add that it is not often the principal of the debts due by an insolvent estate is so fully paid that there is any chance to quarrel over the interest.

Another case, of more interest to the commercial community of this Province, has just been brought before the Privy Council. The principle involved is whether French or English law should govern here in banking matters, and the importance of an authoritative settlement of any doubt there may be on the subject cannot be over-estimated. That there is doubt is clear, since the verdict of the courts in this province in the case in question was overruled by the Supreme Court at Ottawa.

The dispute arises under the following circumstances. Mr. James Rose held some stock on behalf of Mrs. Sweeney, which was standing in his name "in trust" simply, no description of the party for whom it was held being given. He raised money on this stock by transferring it to the Bank of Montreal, who were afterwards sued by Mrs. Sweeney for its value. The courts in this province decided for the bank, on the ground that the French law recognized no force in the trust implied by Mr. Rose's title to the stock. The Supreme Court of Canada reversed this, on the ground that the bank was bound to take notice that the stock was held under some sort of trust, and to satisfy itself as to the trustee's right to pledge the same. The case therefore turns expressly on the point whether in a banking transaction the French or English law is applicable, and as so important a principle is involved the Privy Council has given permission for an appeal to them, and the case will soon be argued before them.

We think it is highly desirable that the commercial law of the whole Dominion should be uniform, and there is no doubt the intention of those who prepared the Confederation Act was to make it so, since it places banking and commerce under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Dominion Parliament. But the res mercatæ of both banking and commerce come under the head of "Property and Civil Rights" which are relegated to the governance of the provincial authorities, and it may fairly be argued that their transfer should be subject to the same laws that govern real estate. But

there is a great difference in the two classes of property. Immovables can never pass beyond the limits of the provincial jurisdiction wherein they may lie, while the property dealt in by bankers and merchants can and does constantly pass from one province to another.

The decision in this case will affect several Exchange Bank suits now pending, and it will be looked for with much interest by lawyers and business men. It is to be hoped that nothing will intervene to prevent the principle itself being fully tested; as far as can be seen it is now before the Privy Council in its simplest form, and that tribunal will be called on to decide whether and to what extent the local French law governs in matters which on the one aspect are assigned to the jurisdiction of the Federal, and on the other to the Provincial Legislature.

#### BUTTER AND CHEESE.

In a previous issue there appeared a comparative statement of the value of our exports for the past seven years and, especially as regards butter, it was anything but satisfactory, the figures being the smallest since 1879. The export of cheese was comparatively large as to quantity but, owing to low prices, the total value as compared with last year showed a shrinkage of \$1,188,952. The lessened value of our exports may be traced to a number of causes, but chief among which may be reckoned the depression of British trade and the increased consumption there, of cheap foreign beef, mutton, bacon, substitutes for butter, etc. The position of the cheese trade is certainly encouraging. In 1870 the shipments aggregated only 5,827,782 lbs., valued at \$674,-486, while the figures for the last fiscal year reached 86,579,834 lbs., representing an increase in value of \$8,227,629. On the other hand the export of butter has declined from 12,000,000 lbs. in 1870, to 8,000,000 in 1885. This is all the more deplorable because it is feared that, with the exception of a few creameries which went into the manufacture of cheese, the make in most sections has continued on much the same scale as in former years, and as the trade here has been chary in buying, many farmers must still hold stocks the bulk of which is unsalable except at ruinous figures. Choice fresh but. ter will always command a European market, and the creamery system will, it is hoped, extend and flourish in this country, as a decided improvement in the quality of Canadian butter is of primary importance. It is scarcely true to affirm that the quality of the make has deteriorated in recent years, but certain it is that the standard of taste has been elevated, even Lower Ports buyers, who formerly only betrayed a desire

for cheapness, now critically enquiring into quality as well. Freshness of the offering is another point which has been insisted upon time and again, and yet creamery has been held this year to the great loss of the producers. Fall creamery will go off all right, but the summer make, held stock, is sharing the fate, though perhaps to a lesser extent, of held dairies. When will producers, small though, in many cases, their make may be, learn to send their product regularly to the best market allthrough the season. One improvement is that butter is coming to hand in more suitable packages than formerly, and we trust there will be no reversion to the clumsy kegs of bygone days. In closing we may refer to a speech recently delivered in Ontario by Hon. Mr. Carling, Minister of Agriculture. The speaker quoted from a report just published by Professor Fream, of Salisbury, Eng., in which the butter interests of Canada are dealt with at length. In that report the absence of methods especially adapted to the country was given as the cause for the poor reputation of Canadian butter in England; and in support of this idea, Prof. Arnold, the leading authority on this subject in the United States, had given an opinion showing that, on an estimate, Canada loses \$5,000,000 annually from her imperfect system of butter making and packing. This could be remedied. A false notion had gained ground to the effect that cheese-making paid better than buttermaking. Prof. Fream declared that in a series of years the latter was quite as profitable as the former, and, that being true, Hon. Mr. Carling hoped to see a change take place by which the butter shipments would rank side by side with those of cheese. In concluding on this point, attention was drawn by the speaker to the startling increase in the United States in the manufacture of injurious compounds of fat, which were being shipped as genuine butter. Commissioner Colman, of the United States, said this threatened the legitimate dairy interests of America; but the hon, gentleman said the people of Canada might rest assured that nothing would be left undone by the Canadian Government to fully protect and advance the agricultural interests of Canada.

### IMPORTED CLOTHS.

The show of imported cloths this season is hardly so large as usual, in spite of the number of novel designs shown and the low prices asked for goods of this description. Patterns, as before indicated, are principally checks, but small stripe-patterned cloths with a large shaded check crossing at right angles are a stylish novelty.

West of England worsteds show some

very pretty silk effects, especially in striped trouserings which will undoubtedly sell well. A curious novelty, said to be now all the rage in England, is shown in the so-called "curl" cloaking, which show a new effect of stripes with curls of wool, mohair and silk attached giving a rough appearance to the goods.

Ottoman and brocaded cloths will still be largely worn, and though patterns shown are much the same as last year, some saleable embossed novelties are offered.

Meltons still maintain their position in the public esteem, and, in view of the large lines shown and the great variety of shades, it seems remarkable that their manufacture has not been attempted in this country. Perhaps the low prices, ranging as they do from 35 cents to 65 cents per yard, double-width, may explain this seeming lack of enterprise.

Corduroys and Bedford cords seem to have lost their hold on the public favor, and will no longer be used for jackets, etc., and in consequence, only the commoner lines are now shown. Still a handsome grey and white corduroy called "Partridge" will be undoubtedly admired as much here as it is on the other side.

A most useful novelty is shown in the new rainproof cloakings, in navy, seal and black. These goods closely resemble cashmere, being light and durable, and are guaranteed perfectly waterproof. They are made sixty inches wide, and are offered at \$1.25 per yard. This is a class of goods much needed by the business population, and will undoubtedly sell well, especially in the larger cities where numbers of working girls reside.

Ulster tweeds are shown in all fancy checks, a new pattern being the star check which is shown this year for the first time in this class of goods. Though not a new pattern it has always previously been monopolized by the better class of Scotch tweeds.

A canvass of the trade shows that prices have undoubtedly ruled lower on the other side, and that the purchasers next season will receive better value for their money than last year. Styles, although not so pronounced as in domestic tweeds, are bright and pleasing, and with the present favorable prospects for business it is expected that next season will be a prosperous one.

### THE QUEBEC TIMBER TRADE.

Completed returns show that the volume of business in 1885 was slightly in excess of the previous year. The total supply of timber measured, by the returns from the Supervisor of Cullers, gives 9 million feet against 8\frac{1}{2} in 1884, the export 10\frac{1}{2} against 9 in 1884, and the total stock wintering." 11\frac{1}{2}

against 12½ last year. A great falling off during the past ten years when the average export of white pine alone was over 12 million feet. In deals, taking pine and spruce together the export has been slightly under that of the previous year and the stock wintering rather more. The accounts from Great Britain show a considerable reduction in the consumption of Canadian timber and the imports, though light, have been more than ample for the requirements.

The firm of J. Bell Forsyth & Co., Quebec, in reviewing the operations of the year, state that the quantity of white pine (waney board) measured, some of which has been in the coves for a year or more, shows a heavier supply than last year, and the stock on hand slightly in excess of that wintering a year ago. Fresh timber of choice quality has been in good demand all season at our highest quotations, while old or inferior has been entirely neglected. The stock comprises some choice girthy wood, also a larger proportion than usual of old, small and inferior.

In Square—The supply has been the lightest since 1879 when it was reduced to 2½ million feet, the export light, and the quantity wintering, though less than last year, about an average of the past five. A fair demand existed during the early part of the season especially for choice or new rafts, some of which were placed at high figures, while for old and inferior wood there were no buyers except at greatly reduced rates. Towards the autumn enquiry almost ceased, the Shipping Houses manifesting no disposition to add to their light stocks. The rafts on hand are to a greater extent than usual held on manufacturer's account, though only three or four new lots are comprised in this list.

When we last issued our circular a number of rafts, the production of 1883 and 1884, were laid up on the Ottawa in readiness for the Spring market; these have reached the Coves as well as the manufacture of the past winter, so that the stock now wintering—which includes much inferior wood—is all that can be counted on as available for the Spring fleet. From latest advices the production will be extremely light this winter.

The supply of red pine has been almost nil, owing to the scant demand and low prices of past years, the export fair and the quantity on hand less than \( \frac{1}{2} \) of the usual average, with a good deal of old and inferior wood in stock.

Of oak, the supply has been double that of 1884, the export greater and the quantity wintering more than sufficient for all early requirements. Prices opened steadily, with a downward tendency and a weak market towards the close of the season. The only wood now readily sold in this market is choice in "quality and make, and manufac-

turers cannot be too particular in this respect. The quantity wintering at Garden Island is small. Sawn oak exported from the United States to Great Britain is in many ways now taking the place of square timber.

As to elm, notwithstanding the difficulty in securing standing timber the production last winter was heavier than usual, the exexport larger, and the stock on hand greater than for some years. The demand has been fair but the closing prices easier, owing in a great measure to the heavy stock. It is estimated that the manufacture this winter will be greatly curtailed.

Pine deals have been in good request, especially for specifications containing fair proportions of 1st quality and Broads, which have been scarce all season, and have commanded extreme rates. The enhanced quotations for all the higher grades of lumber in the United States will not only curtail the shipments of Michigan deals to the St. Lawrence, but must also attract a larger proportion than usual of choice Canadian lumber suitable for deals to that market. From all appearances prices are likely to be well maintained, and may rule even higher for next year's delivery. The export has been slightly under that of last year, the stock wintering rather heavier; including, however, a larger proportion than usual of culls and odd sizes. We learn that the shipments from Montreal have increased considerably this season.

#### A PECULIAR CASE.

One of those curious and complicated cases to which the defunct Exchange Bank has given rise is now before the courts, and the result will be looked for with some curiosity by all who have the interests of commercial morality at heart. The facts of the case may be briefly summed up as follows:

In the spring of 1882 Messrs. E. E. Gilbert & Sons, of this city, were sub-contractors under Davis & Son for sub-marine excavations in the Gallop Rapids of the St. Lawrence: considerable friction occurred between the two parties, and finally the Messrs. Davis desired to withdraw from the contract, and in order to recover the deposit of \$15,000 which they had made with the Dominion authorities as security for the due fulfilment of the contract, they placed Messrs. Gilbert in direct communication with the Government. The Gilberts were then required to deposit a similar sum, and after trying some other parties, finally applied to Mr. F. E. Gilman, lawyer, of this city, for assistance in raising this amount. After some delay Mr. Gilman agreed to furnish the deposit of \$15,000 required, and obtained from Mr. Thomas Craig, the famous cashier of the Exchange Bank, a certificate that a de-

posit to that amount had been placed to the credit of the Receiver General on behalf of the Gilberts in his bank; for which he, Mr. Gilman, paid the bank the sum of \$400 in cash, at the same time giving his note for \$15,000. This note was charged in the bank books as a discount on one side and credited on the other as a deposit receipt, and has never been paid. For this service Messrs. Gilbert & Son agreed to pay Mr. Gilman the sum of \$2,000 yearly as interest and commission during the period that the deposit was retained by the Dominion authorities. The interest was to be paid in monthly instalments, and was duly paid to him every month from July, 1882, to September, 1885, when Messrs. Gilbert & Son paid the sum of \$15,-000 in cash into the Government, and notified Mr. Gilman that they had done so, and would therefore discontinue their monthly payments for the loan of his deposit receipt, and the Government returned the document. through a notary, to Mr. Gilman; who, to cap the climax, refused to receive it, but demanded the money instead, alleging that, at the time he deposited it, it was a valuable consideration, but now, owing to the failure of the Bank, it had become valueless. At this very time it will be remembered Mr. Gilman was resisting the suit of the Exchange Bank Liquidators to recover the amount of the note for the sum in question given by him to Mr. Craig.

But this is not all, Mr. Gilman stated that the agreement on the part of Messrs. Gilbert to pay \$2,000 a year for this receipt was a yearly one, and not a monthly one, although it will be remembered he expressly stipulated for monthly payments, and that, as it had run over the year ending July 31st, 1885, the commission must be paid till July 1886, and he therefore entered a suit for the balance of interest for the year amounting to about \$1,600.

The Messrs. Gilbert held that their liability ceased when the deposit was returned by the Government, as they had replaced it with their own money, and when the whole circumstances came to light they entered a contra-action for the amount of interest already paid, \$6,300, claiming that, according to Mr. Gilman's own statement, he had never made any such deposit, but had merely obtained the receipt by a piece of clever "financing."

In a collection of modern fables is a story of a boy who placed a hundred eggs under one hen. When remonstrated with, on the ground that the hen could not possibly cover so many he replied: "I know that, but, thunder, I want to see her spread herself!" It will be interesting to see how Mr. Gilman will spread himself in order to cover the claims against both sides in this extraordinary case.

#### CUCAINE.

It is a little over a year since the discovery of the remarkable power of this alkaloid as a local anæsthetic was first made known to the public, and ever since then medical journals have continued to report the extraordinary results of experiments in its use. But, as the wonderful relief from pain which its local applications have given has in some. instances led to its abuse, some evil consequences which resulted have been ascribed to its employment, and these exceptional cases\_ have in some instances been made the foundation for sensational articles claiming that users of cocaine-or "cucaine" as some physicians write it-form a "cocaine habit," that it destroys the moral sense, that . it is a dangerous poison, etc., and warning physicians against prescribing its use. Notwithstanding these startling statements; however, large dealers in this drug assert that the demand has increased nearly thirty. per cent during the past month and that druggists are ordering it in ounces and even pounds instead of in grains and drachms as formerly, while the price which about a year ago was seventy-five cents per grain, has now fallen to eight cents, owing to the increased supply. The different salts of the alkaloid on the market are the hydrochloride, hydrobromide, citrate and salicylate, the demand being principally for the hydrochloride; the oleate or a solution of the free alkaloid in olive oil has also been found of great value in the treatment of neuralgia and dental complaints. This steady increase in demand is perhaps the best argument that can be used to refute the overdrawn and sensational charges above referred to. The testimony of leading physicians to its efficacy is sufficiently conclusive, but, as little is yet really known of this drug, it would be well for non-scientific persons to be careful in its use. Cucaine is prepared from the leaves of the cocoa-nut tree, and the yield in weight is about onetenth of one per cent. It was discovered some five years ago by a German chemist.

### JUVENILE BUSINESS MEN.

The late Horace Greeley derived considerable fame by the reiteration of his now celebrated advice to young men to go west and grow up with country, but, if the case to which this article refers is any criterion, there are some young men, in fact very young men, there already, whom the country could do better without.

We have no data as to the age at which the youthful population of the west abandon knickerbockers and toffee to enter into mercantile pursuits, but if Mr. A. A. A., —we suppress the name in full—who calls himself an insurance and com-

mission merchant, is a fair specimen, they must start at a remarkably tender age; as, though some years ago he was sufficiently old to incur business liabilities, he shelters himself as having been under the age of manhood, and therefore declines to pay them.

It appears Mr. or, more correctly speaking, Master, A-put an advertisement into a local directory for which he agreed to pay the sum of fifteen dollars, and also purchased a letter-book for a further sum of three dollars and a half. In payn ent of this sum he gave a note which, with juvenile astuteness, he dated on a Sunday. This evidence of infantile precocity failed, as the note was returned to have the date altered. When the note became due he wrote, informing the holders that he was not of age, and therefore the amount could not be collected from him, but that, as he had partially used the book, he did not mind paying \$3.50 to settle the matter.

We are not aware whether the mercantile agencies grant ratings to merchants of tender years, but, if not, in justice to the business boys of our great west, the omission should be at once rectified, and it might be suggested that the initials of the precocions insurance agent, whose method of doing business has inspired this article, might be utilized in the matter, and that the ambitious juvenile in question receive the rating of "A. A. A., " or "A 3." It is to be feared that young A-has only just ceased to devour the sensational boy stories of the New York weeklies, and that he founds his ideas of commercial morality on such stories as "Billy the Biter, or the Boy Bandit with the Big Blue Bundle," but for the sake of his future prospects, we hope that when he reaches man's estate his ideas as to the best method of meeting commercial obligations may alter considerably, and that he may no longer shelter himself behind the quibbles of the law.

#### THE OUTLOOK ABROAD.

Our English exchanges continue to record great dulness in almost every branch of trade. In financial matters we note the comments of the Economist on the condition of the money market immediately after the late increase to 4 per cent. It confesses its inability to find any reason which would account satisfactorily for the heavy drain of gold to Germany, but points out that Berlin has come to be the centre of financial business for all the Continental States, except France, and that the chronic requirements of Russia are provided for there. The London Joint-stock banks, with two or three exceptions, following the rise recently established, have increased their rate of interest to 21 per cent, keeping 1 below the

bank rate instead of 1 per cent, which has so long been the rule. There is no doubt good reason for this change, for the commercial demand for money is still light, and, notwithstanding the high bank rate, there are still accumulations of idle money to be disposed of. We note as an indication of the expected movement of rates that 6 months bills are discounted at rates a trifle less than those having only 3 months currency.

We recently mentioned the successful issue of bonds of the Province of Manitoba in aid of local railways. From the fuller news by mail we gather that the applications for the loan amounted to £416,100, at prices varying from the minimum of 105½ to 110½. Tenders at 106¾ and upwards received allotments in full, the average price obtained was 107½, or two per cent above the minimum fixed. The bonds were placed on the market by the Clydesdale Bank (agents for the Merchants Bank, who are bankers for the Province of Manitoba) and Messrs. Coates, Son & Co., brokers.

In New York since our last writing there has been quite a flurry in sterling, believed by many to have been started for the purpose of influencing the stock market. Rumored heavy shipments of gold were used to influence rates, and demand sterling was quoted as high as 4.902. It transpired however that many of the leading drawers were selling freely at lower rates; the heavy shipments of gold dwindled to a very moderate compass, and could only have been done even then at a loss, and the market flattened out till it reached a lower level than the existing conditions would justify; from there it will no doubt gradually settle back to a point a little below that at which gold can

With a moderate export of commodities and a cessation of English investment in American stocks, the supply of bills to the market is very limited. There is, besides this, continued if not increased distrust of the financial position, owing to the attitude of many of the leading politicians on the silver question. A leading Washington journal which professes to have canvassed the representatives thoroughly alleges that the majority against any interference with the silver coinage will be about 2 to 1. According to its classification the South and West are all but a unit in favor of continued coinage and the North and East solid against it. From later news it looks as if some compromise is about to be proposed, but we have learned nothing more definite than that a conference of the leading men on both sides of the question is being arranged.

What the effect will be if no legislative action is taken is hard to foretell. There

have been opinions freely expressed that when the last hope of relief from this congress is gone, gold will go to a premium, but we are not inclined to accept this theory, although it may prove true.

This much may be said, that the superfluous silver has not yet reached a dangerous point, and that the President and Secretary Manning control, within certain limits, the financial administration of the country, and may be relied on to avoid anything that would lead to financial difficulties. On the other hand it seems to be recognized that the prospects of relief from the present congress are very much less than they were two or three months ago.

The money market has been unsettled, in sympathy with sterling exchange and the general distrust on the silver question, and rates have varied from 1½ to 6 percent.

The market is, however, well supplied and dull.

The trade conditions are all favorable for a marked revival of business, if not a general "boom," in the event of the currency disturbances being set at rest satisfactorily. Meantime the country is full to overflowing of all material wealth. The visible supply of wheat is greater than for many years, yet at the time of the year when exports are usually most active the trade is simply dead; and the same is true in the main of other staples, except Indian corn.

In commenting on the 'present state of affairs the New York Evening Post says:

"Formerly we commanded the markets of the world as producers of wheat, cotton, petroleum, and tobacco. These constituted three-fourths of our exports. Foreign countries could not do without them-could not do without the portion which we produced in excess of our own requirements. It appears that they can do without our wheat. It is feared that they may soon be able to do without our cotton; the potential supply from Egypt being limited only by the facilities for irrigation which can be furnished by capital, and will certainly be furnished if England retains her hold upon that country. India also has great capabilities for cotton growing, and has been deficient hitherto only in means of transportation. These are now being supplied, not rapidly, perhaps, but steadily. The Russian production of petroleum is increasing in spite of all the obstacles which a low stage of civilization puts in its way. The article being abundant there, it is only a question of time when the facilities for producing and transporting it will be as perfect as they are in the United States. There will be pipe lines and refineries and whatever else is needed to make as good and as cheap an article as ours. Three of our four monopolies are therefore either doomed or threatened. A world-wide revolution of commerce is taking place, akin to that which followed the opening of the Suez Canal-a revolution not to our advantage."

The remedy suggested for the effects of this on American trade is no less heroic than the subversion of the present protective system—that producers may be able to live and therefore to sell as cheaply as their competitors in the East. But until the American abourer is content with the conditions of life that make an Egyptian or Hindoo labourer happy, such a remedy would not accomplish all that is sought.

A POINT of some importance to country merchants has recently been decided in the Texas Court of Appeal. A merchant purchased a bill of goods from a traveller, on the condition that the latter should not sell the same line to any other merchant in the town, or else the buyer would not pay for the goods. The drummer violated this agreement, and the merchant refused to pay. He was thereupon sucd by the house which the traveller represented, and set up the agreement as his defence. The house claimed that the agreement was made without their knowledge or consent, that it was beyond the scope of their traveller's authority, and hence was not binding upon them, and, further, that it was a contract in restraint of trade, and therefore illegal. On all these points the Court decides against them, holding that the agreement was valid, and within their traveller's apparent powers, and also that, while a general restraint of trade is void, an agreement which operates merely in partial restraint, of trade is good, provided it be not unreasonable, and there be a consideration.

A Customs Question .-- A number of metal merchants in Montreal and other cities imported a large quantity of bar and plate steel cut into pieces, rectangular in shape and varying from 9 x 12 upwards, and entered them as scrap steel, which, according to the fariff, is free of duty. The steel was seized by the customs authorities here, who contended that it should have been entered as steel manufactures. The subject has been closely investigated by the Department of Customs, and much evidence taken on both sides, with the result that the steel in question is declared subject to a duty of 121 per cent ad valorem, and the parties interested have been requested to make good the amount.

A New Industry.—A distillery has lately been put in operation in Charleston, S. C., for the manufacture of oil from pine wood. The wood is subjected to intense heat in sealed retorts, and one cord of it is said to yield fifteen gallons of turpentine, eighty gallons of pinewood oil, fifty bushels of charcoal, 150 gallons of wood vinegar, and a quantity of inflammable gas and vegetable asphaltum. Apart from its commercial value the process is interesting, as showing how modern chemical processes are superseding the old methods by which only a single article was produced from a given material, and all the rest wasted or ruined.

We have reports that the dry goods trade in Guelph is considerably cut up, so

that the purchases, large just at this time, bear but a small profit. It is stated that the importing house of John Hogg & Son, more recently D. N. Hogg & Co., has definitely managed to sell out to Mr. Ryan of Barrie and Mr. Crombie of Toronto, the business to be transferred in about a month. The name of Hogg has been connected with the trade of Guelph for more than thirty years, and the place has been largely indebted to Mr. Hogg for the business enterprise he has always manifested.

We need scarcely offer any apology to our readers for introducing at this season of the year—while business men are preparing to put forth new efforts—a column or two of matter somewhat at variance with the usual articles in the Journal or Commerce. The "Christmas Story," given elsewhere is founded on a greater proportion of fact than is, usually to be found in such productions, and will probably require little explanation to many of our readers even at a distance. With this we make an end of it for another twelvemonth and again wish our readers—a prosperous and Happy New Year.

It is predicted that, in the course of the next five years the steel nail will have as completely supplanted the iron nail as the steel, rail has its iron predecessor. Already one half of the nails manufactured in the great nail centres of the States are made of steel and the machinery and plant necessary for their manufacture are being set up at nearly every nail foundry. It is claimed that steel nails, can be made about ten cents per keg cheaper than those made of iron, even where the manufacturer has to purchase his ingots.

Mr. John A. McCall, jun., has accepted the position of Comptroller of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, and resigns the office of Superintendent of the New York Insurance Department, to take effect December 31, 1885. In response to the letter of resignation Governor Hill pays a high tribute to the ability and integrity of Mr. McCall, and congratulates the Equitable on securing the services of so valuable an officer.

Sir Ambrose Shea has been appointed Governor of Newfoundland, a position for which, by his ability and moderation, he appears eminently litted. The appointment is a new departure, Sir Ambrose being, if we mistake not, the first native colonial governor. Lady Shea, his charming and accomplished wife, is from Montreal, a daughter of the late Joseph Bouchette of Quebec.

THE LATIN MONETARY UNION.—The new Monetary Convention was signed by Belgium and the other powers of the Latin Union on the 12th inst. It provides that at the termination of the Union, after the exchange of silver coin in equal sums between the different powers, France and Belgium shall settle for

any remaining silver coined by the other, by paying for one-half in gold, leaving the other half to find its way back through the ordinary course of trade. The French and Italian Governments have made a similar agreement as to coin each may hold of the other's issue.

ONE of the results of the recent heavy exportation of apples from Canada and the United States to England has been an almost entire stagnation of the orange trade at Liverpool and London. Our apples are cheaper than Mediterranean oranges, and being also finer than the fruit the British grow themselves, they are much sought for by those who have hitherto supplied themselves from English orchards. The crop on this continent has been very abundant, so much so that in many parts of the country it has been ungathered, and has been allowed to lie on the ground, there to be eaten by hogs or to rot. With all our facilities for transportation, says a New York exchange, it would seem that this ought not to be, but in former years, and we presume the same is true this season, fruit at thirty miles from this city was ungathered, while street peddlers were asking from two to three cents apiece for good specimens. We obtain every year from Cuba, Jamaica and other West India islands, bananas, brought fifty or eighty miles to the ship, transported by it a thousand or lifteen hundred miles, and here passing through three hands, at a less price per pound than we pay for apples, and in some seasons at half the cost. Oranges for the next three months will remain at almost exactly the same price as apples at re-

BUSINESS IN THE NORTH-WEST .- The total failures in the North-west this year, according to Dun, Wiman & Co., were 66, against 81 in 1884 and 242 in 1883. The liabilities were \$731,507, \$787,000 and \$2,160,898 respectively. The Manitoba Free Press says that of 1,500 men who started business during the past three years not one remains to tell the story : many made a haul and left the country. There are at present about 3,000 men engaged in business all over the North-west. The new men starting are in excess of the number quitting business, and they are considered, on the whole, a very desirable class. Dealers are more inclined to carry lighter stocks, especially as they can now sort up so easily in Winnipeg.—It is certainly a matter for congratulation, says the same paper, that after three years of a steady decline in busineas we can truthfully say that the business depression has touched bottom; and we are now on the up-grade again.

DESTITE the depression in ocean steamship business, the Peninsular and Oriental line makes a favorable showing, the statement for the year ending 30th September exhibiting a balance of £220,897. An interim dividend of 2½ per cent was paid in June, and it is now proposed to pay a further similar dividend and a honus of 2 per cent, leaving £9,902 to be carried over. The directors also recommend the payment of a bonus of 1 per cent from the profits of the underwriting account, making a total of 8 per cent for the year. A list of the vessels belonging to the company shows a

total, excluding the "Bengal," which is being fitted out, of 50, with a registered tonnage of 173,727, and an aggregate nominal horsepower of 31,200.

ASHES.—Receipts for December have been lighter than ever heretofore—yet prices have declined in the absence of any feeling of confidence in the future of the trade, and a total absence of export demand. The sales the past week have been trifling at \$3.45 to \$3.50 for First Pots. Seconds may be quoted at \$3.00. Pearls are nominal, \$5.25 would be paid for export. Receipts since 1st January 5127 brls Pots, 410 brls Pearls. Deliveries, 5251 brls Pots, 484 brls Pearls. Stock in store on Wednesday morning 1332 brls Pots, 133 brls Pearls.

Boors and Shoes.—The boot and shoe trade is quiet, as is usual at this season, and not much will be done till after the holidays. Travellers are sending in a fair sprinkling of orders, but report that country merchants are adverse to buying till stock is taken and the holidays are over. The reported cutting has been confined almost entirely to a few fancy lines, and has not affected staples.

Canned Goods.—A good Lusiness has been done for the season at prices quoted. Tomatoes \$1.50 per doz; lobsters, \$1.45 to \$1.50; mackerel 75c to \$1; sardines, fine \$10.50 to \$11; ordinary at \$6.25 to \$9; salmon \$1.40 to \$1.50; spiced salmon \$3.50; finnan haddies \$1.25; Hoegg roast beef \$1.95 per 2-lb tins; pigs' feet \$3.40; peas \$1.55 to \$1.75; pie peaches, \$1.90; table, 3-lb tins, \$3.30; corn \$1.30 to \$1.80, strawberries \$2; raspberries \$1.80; cherries, \$1.75; Bartlett pears, \$2 to \$2.25; plums, \$1.72½.

COAL AND WOOD.—Business has been moderate at quotations. American anthracite in ordinary distributing lots, stove, \$6.75; chestnut, \$6.50; egg and furnace, \$6 to \$6.25. Lower Ports steam \$4 to \$4.25; grate \$5.50; Scotch steam, \$5 to \$5.25, grate \$6. Cordwood.—Yard prices per long cord (cartage 50c extra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5.50; tamarac, \$5; hemlock, \$4.50. Coke \$2.50 per chaldron of 36 bushels; crushed coke (stove or egg size) \$3.30 delivered.


DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS .- The butter market shows a better tone, and all goods classed as fine are held with a confidence which has been wanting for some time. Dealers here are not heavily stocked with butter, as they profited by the experience of former years and preferred the stuff to come here on commission rather than run the risk. Advices from London report higher prices for Irish, French, Dutch, and Danish butter, and the lower grades are securing some attention. First Corks are firm at 125s, and scconds at 98s. There is a firmer market for cheese, and in Liverpool the price is now 48s. The market here has been enlivened by enquiries which, however, has led to little business, owing to the firm views of holders. It is said that high bids have been made in the country. About 4,000 boxes were shipped from this city this week to Europe. At London and Woodstock, Ont., over 5,000 boxes have been sold at from 9c and 97. We quote fine to finest September and October 81 and 91c, and earlier makes 6c and 81 as to Last year at this date quotations were 111c and 12c, with the cable at 62s 6d.

At Little Falls, N. Y., Cheese sales were 400 boxes at 7½c and 9½c, all late made cheese; resales by home trade dealers of 6,000 boxes at 0½c to 10c, all late made. There is scarcely any cheese left in the factories in that section; probably 6,000 to 7,000 boxes are in second hands. Butter—Sales 200 packages at 18c to 22c, the bulk at 20c. Provisions.—Gut meats and lard have been in fair jobbing request and steady. Dressed hogs were easier at \$5.40 to \$5.50. Strictly fresh eggs are scarce, and sell at high prices. Ordinary, in cases, 19c to 20c; limed 17c to 18c. Partridges were cheaper at 25c to 30c per brace. Venison lower at 5c to 8c per 1b. Turkeys sold at 9c to 10c; ducks, 8c to 9c; and chickens and geese at 6c to 8c.

DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.—The demand for articles in the drug line has been fair for the season; no particular change is reported. We learn that the British makers of bleaching powder are about entering into an arrangement by which the whole production of that article will be sold through one broker. Dye stuffs—Cutch, 7½c to 8c; sumac, \$90 to \$100 per ton for prime brands; extract of logwood, 7½c; chip logwood, 1½c to 2c; archil, 27c to 30c per lb, for concentrated; Gambier, 6c to 7c; indigo, \$1.50 to \$1.75.

DRY Goods .- The general features of the wholesale dry goods market for the past week have been much the same as are usually presented during the closing days of the year; but although the general market has ruled very quiet, yet in some directions the wholesale houses have done more than the usual amount of business for this period of the year, and a fair aggregate trade has been done in ropeat orders from the retail trade. In the retail, the usual holiday rush is progressing, the French buyers having their turn this week in making purchases for the new year. Stocks are now rapidly accumulating, and a few days will see the travellers all on the road with spring goods. Collections are not altogether satisfactory, and money is coming in but slowly. In the States, as usual on the eve of the holidays, new business in the wholesale branches of the trade was confined within very narrow limits, but the commission houses continued to charge up and make liberal deliveries of spring goods on account of previous transactions. The order demand for spring goods was comparatively light, because jobbers are making preparations for "stock-taking," and are not likely to resume operations until the opening of the new year. It was a quiet day in jobbing circles, retailers having been too busily engaged in the distribution of holiday goods to attend to the renewal of their stocks. The main features of the market remain unchanged, and few fresh developments are likely to be made just at present.

FLOUR AND GRAIN—The market for flour has ruled quiet, and closes slightly in buyers' favor. The chief business has been in broken lots on local account. Among recent sales were a car of Manitoba strong bakers at \$5; 120 brls superior at \$4.25; 125 choice at \$4.30; 210 sacks Canada strong bakers at \$4.60 per 196 lbs, and 210 do. at \$4.75. The grain trade at this point seems to be at a standstill, and prices are unchanged; a few lots of peas and oats are selling along the lines of

rail. Advices from the Canadian North-West state that the movement in grain is still rather quiet, the falling-off of shipments to eastern markets being still principally due to the scarcity of cars on the C.P.R., whilst there appears to be a difficulty in moving any great quantities west of Winnipeg, owing to the bad condition of the roads. Receipts of wheat in that city were fair on the whole; on the other hand street receipts of outs were quite plentiful, and all offered taken, the demand being a good one for feeding purposes. Receipts of barley were also good in Winnipeg and some large shipments are now being made to the east every day. East-bound shipments of flour still continue rather light. The British grain markets at the close were quiet and steady. The stock of wheat in Chicago shows an increase of 55,000 bushels compared with last week and an increase of 1,205,000 compared with the same date last year. Corn shows an increase of 858,000 with last week and an increase of 451,000 over last year. The Chicago visible supply of wheat exhibits a decrease of 68,000 bushels, compared with last week and an increase of 10,811,000 compared with same date last year. The Chicago speculative market after a strong opening on the decreased visible supply, ruled weak underliberal offerings for local account. The decline was in accordance with the feeling of local talent, which is decidedly bearish and short of the market, forcing weak longs to let Receipts are light, but in the absence of export demand and no strong power working the bull side except Minneapolis millers, it bulls hard. Corn was steady. Provisions

were weak and lower in sympathy with wheat. The country is said to be heavily long of all hog products.



FISH AND OILS.—There has been scarcely any movement this week, as usual during the holiday season, and we make no change in prices. No. 1 Labrador herrings are said to have sold under \$3.12½, and we quote \$3 to \$3.25 as to quantity. Cape Breton herrings are generally held at \$3.75.

Furs.—A fair quantity has been received, but the holidays have interfered with business. We quote strictly prime skins as follows:—Beaver per lb., \$2.25 to \$2.75; bear, large, per skin, \$8 to \$12; bear, small, per skin, \$5 to \$7; bear, cub, per skin, \$3 to \$6; fisher, per skin, \$2.50 to \$4; otter, per skin, \$8 to \$10; lynx, per skin, \$2 to \$3; mink, per skin, 50c; marten, per skin, 50c; skunk, per skin, 25c to 50c; raccoon, per skin, 25c to 50c.

Green Fruits, etc.—Apples in good demand at \$2.25 to \$3. Valencia oranges scarce at \$6 to \$6.50; Jamaica in brls \$6.50; Floridas in boxes \$3.75 to \$4. Cranberries \$6 per brl. Almeria grapes \$6 per keg. Malaga lemons, \$2.50 per half chest; Messinas, \$4.50 to \$5 per box; cases \$4 to \$6; cocca-nuts, \$5.50 per 100. Fancy Eleme figs, one-lb to ten-lb boxes, 11c to 13c per lb. Canadian onions in brls, \$2.50 to \$3. Fancy French prunes in 5 and 10 lb boxes 20c per lb. Evaporated apples in 50-lb boxes \$\frac{1}{2}c\$ to 9c. Brazil nuts 10\frac{1}{2}c. Box dates, new, 7c. Cob nuts 20c. per lb. Yellow bananas \$4.50 to \$5 per bunch.

GROCERIES .- The jobbing trade with the country and city storckeeper has been light, as is usual during the holidays. There has, however, been quite a stir in tea among leading houses, and sales during the past few days have reached about 2,000 boxes, with bids reported for several thousand more; 700 boxes of greens sold in one lot. Some 1,500 boxes or more were grades at 16c to 25c, and increased activity in these grades is looked for. The demand is partly speculative, spurred on by anticipations of a duty. The foreign markets are, however, firm, and 2,000 blacks offered by a London firm through a broker here are said to have been withdrawn by cable. Last mail advices from Hiogo-osaka are as follows:-A steady business has been passing during the



month, resulting in the settlement of about 5,000 piculs. Prices have remained firm. common grades are searce and command very full rates. Good medium and fine are in fair supply. Total settlements to date are 116,916 piculs against 97,018 piculs at corresponding date last season. Sugars.—The position is a firm one. Yellow refined is now held at 5½ c, offerings at 5½ c having been swept up. Granulated is quoted at 6½c, with higher prices asked for small lots. Raws are steady. In other lines of groceries the movement has been unimportant on account of the holidays; prices generally unchanged. Molasses steady at 29c to 30c.

HAY STRAW AND FEED.—Choice timothy sold at \$12.50, with inferior at \$10.00 per hundred bundles. Pressed hay was in good demand at firm prices; No. 1 brought \$16 and No. 2 \$15 per ton. The demand for straw was firm, and prices were steady at \$5 to \$7 per hundred bundles as to quality. There was a good enquiry for pressed straw at \$10 per ton. Moulie was quiet at \$23 per ton. There was

more enquiry for bran at \$14 to \$15 for Montreal, and \$16 for Upper Canada. The demand for shorts was fair; sales of two cars at \$16.-50, while we quote \$16.50 to \$18 per ton.

HIDES AND TALLOW.—The market has continued steady with a fair amount of business doing; prices of both hides and tallow are unchanged.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—The local market for pig-iron and heavy metals has been dull, and the position is altogether unchanged. At a meeting of manufacturers of cut nails this week, no change was made in the price list; there is also no change in horse shoes. As to horse nails, the following has been issued to the trade under date December 26, signed by W. M. Mooney & Co., Peck, Benny & Co., and the Montreal Rolling Mills:—We now have the pleasure of advising you that at the Annual Meeting of the horse nail makers of this city,

held on the 24th inst, the combination of 1885 was renewed for 1886, excepting that an advance of 5 per cent will take place on all makes of nails, on and after January 1st, 1886.
The discounts for 1886 are as follows:—W.
M. Mooney & Co., The Canada Horse Nail Co. quote 40 and 21 per cent trade discount. Peck, Benny & Co. and the Montreal Rolling Mills Co. quote 40 and 5 per cent trade discount. Any party whose purchases from one manufacturer between this date and December 31st, 1886, amount to the following number of boxes of horse nails shall be allowed drawbacks as stated below:—1000 boxes and upwards a rebate of 10 per cent. 500 boxes, 7½ per cent., 250 boxes, 5 per cent. These drawbacks will not be allowed to the said purchaser if he has at any time sold horse nails of the above makes at better prices than the discounts already named for them; and these drawbacks will only be allowed at the end of the specified time, and only on the condition that the purchaser has taken the quantity necessary to entitle him to the extra rebate. Terms .months from delivery or shipment, or 5 per cent. discount for cash if paid within 30 days from date of invoice. Goods delivered f.o.b., Montreal. No deviation will be made from these terms on any condition whatever. The exports of iron and steel from Great Britain to Canada up to November 30, according to statistics received from Wm. Dixon. Glasgow, by Drummond, McCall & Co., of this city are as follows:-1885, 175,455 tons; 1884, 165,-516 tons; 1883, 225,208 tons. The total for the cleven months this year is made up as follows:-Pig-iron, 40,345 tons; railway iron and steel, 67,853; manufactured iron and steel 67,257. The total exports of iron and steel from Great Britain to all sources for eleven months ended November 30, last was 2,910,-347 tons, valued at £20,128,374, against 3,267,490 tons for same period in 1884, valued at £22,707,708. The United States took 350,094 tons in 1885, 428,972 in 1884 and 650,900 in 1883. Australia imported 311,984 tons in 1885, 295,078 in 1884, and 307,554 in 1883. India is about the largest customer, as she required 417,518 tons in 1885, 307,140 in 1884. and 317,989 in 1883. Germany, Holland and Russia are also large purchasers of British iron and steel. The largest quantity exported within the past twelve years was in 1882, the total reaching 4,062,215 tons.

LEXTHER.—The leather market is still steady, and much more business is doing than is usually looked for at this season of the year. Prices for all descriptions are very firm, and though no change in rates can be chronicled, best makes are bringing top prices. That the price of leather must advance seems to be a foregone conclusion, unless some fall takes place in the price of hides, for, with hides and bark at their present figures, it is difficult to see where the profit of the tanner comes in.

Live Stock.—There was a fair demand from local butchers for New Years, but little enquiry from exporters. The best butcher's cattle were quoted at 4c per lb, live weight, with inferior down to 2c. There were fair offerings of sheep, but demand was slow. Prices, however, were steady at 3c to 3c per lb, live weight. Lambs were quoted at 4c to 4c. Live hogs were quiet and steady at 4c per lb.

Petroleum.—The local market has ruled quiet and steady at quotations. Canadian oil

in car lots 17 %c; broken lots, 18 ½c. American, in car lots 23c; five and ten brl. lots 24 ½c; single brls. 25c.

Wook.-There is no appreciable change in the wool market this week, but a fair seasonable business is being done. Prices are firm and fine foreign wools are well held. There is a strong belief in the trade that prices have seen their lowest figures, and it is expected that trade will improve after the holidays. In the States scoured wools have been in good demand and realized 45 to 60 cents for Texas and California; holders seem to have faith in such grades, and do not offer with much freedom. Texas wools are firmly held, and in good request; a large lot of fall sold at 20 to 21 cents. Territory wool has found purchasers at the same price noted in our last, viz., 20 to 21 cents. The demand begins for heavy wools, though a few manufacturers are still running on light stock. There is no change in the situation for foreign goods.

There is no export demand and sales of medium to good store-packed rolls range at 10c to 12c. Choice tub jobs at 5c to 16c. Eggs are in moderate supply, nd prices rather easier; fresh are quoted a

20c and pickled at 17c. Cheese is firmer in sympathy with outside markets; the Sept. jobs at 9½c to 10c, and inferior to good at 8½c to 9c.

COAL AND Wood.—There has been a fair 'rade in coal, and prices rule firm, stove, and n.:t sell at \$6.25 a ton delivered, egg and grate a: \$6, and the best soft at \$5.50. Wood is quoted at \$4.50 to \$5 a cord for the best hard, \$3.50 for second quality, and \$4.00 for best pine.

COAL OIL.—The demand for burning oils is only moderate, and prices are unchanged. Canadian refined sells at 18½c a gallon for single barrels and at 18c for five to ten barrel lots. Carbon safety 20c. American oils unchanged at 24c for prime and 27c for water white. Crude is firm at 87c to 87½c in Petrolea, and refined is quoted at about 14½c a gallon in car lots.

DRESSED Hogs.—Receipts are remarkably light for the season of the year, and, in consequence, prices are sustained. Averages of 175 to 200 lbs. bring \$5.12½ to \$5.25, and light ones for butchers' use 12½c to 25c more.

DRUGS.—Business is quiet, with orders of a sorting-up description. There are few changes to note in prices Turpentine 58c to 60c a gallon; alcohol at \$3.27 per gallon; castor oil at 10c to 12c; opium at \$3.80 to \$4.00; glycerine, steady, at 16c; quinine, 90c to \$1.00; morphia, \$1.80 to \$2



There was a sale of superior extra the latter part of last week at \$3.70 and more offered at that price vesterday. Extras can be had at \$3.60 and spring extras at \$3.50 but no sales reported. The stock in store is 500 barrels, the same as last week, as compared with 1,625 barrels the corresponding week of last year. Wheat is also very dull, there being but little demand, and holders asking too much. No. 2 fall offers at 85c to 831c bid cash; for May delivery this grade offers at 91c with 904c bid. No. 2 spring is firmer, owing to scarcity; it is held at 86c to 87c. There is little doing in Manitoba wheats. The stock of wheat in store here is 225,214 bushels as against 208,991 bush. last week, 192,093 bush. at the corresponding period of last year, and 100,116 bush in 1883. Barley has been very quiet; higher grades are the firmest; No. 1 quoted at 92c to 94c, No. 2 at 81c, No. 3 Extra at 69c to 70c, and No. 3 at 57c to 58c. The stock in store is 157,643 bush., as against 146,463 bush last week, and 114,034 bush at the corresponding period of last year. Outs are a trifle easier on freer receipts; sales are reported at 33c to 331c on track. Stock in store 700 bushels as against 875 bush at the corresponding period of last year. Peas quiet and steady, with sales of No. 2 at 60c. The stock in store is 6734 bushels, as against 14,544 bushels the corresponding week of last year. Rye is nominal at 60c; no stock in store. Oatmeal is steady at \$3.75 for ordinary cars on track. Bran in moderate demand and firmer; car lots are quoted at \$12 to \$12.50.

GROCERIES.—The movement is restricted, and prices show little or no change. There is a good demand for low and medium grades of teas, and prices rule firm. Sugars quiet and steady; granulated 6½ to 7c. Fruits unchanged; valencias are firm at about 9c. Tobaccos and liquors firm at former quotations.

HARDWARE.—A moderate trade is reported; orders are chiefly of a sorting-up character, and, the open season being favorable for building, the demand for such material is fair. Prices rule steady; ingot tin is quoted at 23cto 24c. Bar iron, \$1.70; pig iron, Summerlee \$19; Carnbroc, \$17 and \$18. Glass, \$1.80. Payments fair.

HIDES AND SKINS.—The trade in hides is quiet, and prices steady; cured sell at 9½c for cows and 10c for steers. Dealers pay 9c for No. 1 green steers and 8½c for No. 1 cows. Callskins are nominal at 10c to 12c for green, and 13c to 14c for cured. Sheepskins.—There is a good demand, and prices rule firm. Country receipts are fair, and prices from 70c to 85c; the best offering being \$1.00. Tallow is dull; rough is quoted at 3c and rendered at 6c.





Live Stock.—The receipts of cattle are limited and prices easy. There is very little demand for export steers, and prices are nominal at 4c to 4½c. Butchers' in limited demand, with sales of the best at 3½c, and inferior at 2½c to 3½c. Sheep unchanged, at 3½c to 3½c for the best and at 2½c to 2½c for inferior. Lambs are firm, with offerings fair, choice sold at \$3.25 to \$3.50 a head. Hogs are slightly easier at 3½c to 4c, the latter for choice light weights.
