DISEASE IS DUE TO UNHEALTHY CATTLE

Hon. Martin Burrell Repeats His Assertion That Bovine Tuberculosis Causes Deaths of Children, and Also Is the Direct Cause of Much Consumption Among Adults.

That not only were twenty per cent. of the deaths from tuberculosis of children under five years of age directly attributable to bovine tuberculosis, but that in a great percentage of the cases among adults the tuberculosis bacilli from milk had entered their system when children and had not taken effect until a number of years afterward and thus not attributed in the records as due to bovine tuberculosis, was the contention made by Hon. Martin Burrell, minister of agriculture, in an address to the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada at the fifth annual banquet last night.

The minister of agriculture stated that in view of the criticism which had been made of the Dominion Government's action in making it necessary to purchase some groceries, upon entering the house again she heard the screams of her little girl. She rushed upstairs to find the child enveloped in flames.

As the water pipes in the house had been frozen, it was necessary to run down to the street for water. When the flames were finally extinguished, the little girl was so badly burned that she could not recover.

Wainwright Succeeds Fitzhugh

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—(Can. Press.)—At a meeting of the directors of the Montreal Southern Counties Railway, held today, the resignation of E. H. Fitzhugh, president of the line, was accepted, and a new president, William Wainwright, elected.

Mr. Fitzhugh's resignation completes the severance of his relations with the Grand Trunk interests.

Mr. Wainwright has been for many years a vice-president of the G.T.R., and was one of those mentioned to succeed the late C. M. Hays. There was no other change in the executive. W. B. Powell, who has long been vice-president and general manager, retains that position.

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Turks are in Abject Misery

LONDON, Feb. 6.—(Can. Press.)—The Daily Telegraph publishes a long, unencensored despatch from its correspondent, Ellis Ashmead Bartlett, at Constantinople, in which he says that the Turkish people are in such a state of misery and destitution as a result of the war that they are completely indifferent as to the fate of Adrianople.

"The cabinet is in a quandary," says the correspondent; "it knows that it will be compelled to cede Adrianople and is only seeking some means to save its face. It is said that the coup d'état was only intended to occur after Khalil Pasha surrendered Adrianople, but was precipitated by some mistake. Hence the difficulty the ministry now is in."

"There is not a cent in the treasury and there are no means of getting money until peace is concluded, and meanwhile the country is drifting to ruin and bankruptcy."

"A great anti-war demonstration occurred Sunday in front of the war office, at which the Young Turks were publicly denounced as murderers and thieves. Mahmoud Shekief Pasha appeared on the balcony and tried to make a speech, but was greeted with opprobrious epithets."

"Indescribable Misery. The misery in the Turkish camps is indescribable. It is bitterly cold, with a heavy snow; the soldiers are ill-fed and badly sheltered. Smallpox, dysentery and pneumonia have replaced Asiatic cholera."

"It is understood that the force at Tchatalja has been reduced to 120,000, which is considered ample to defend the lines. Large reinforcements have been sent to Gallipoli, where there are now 70,000 men. There is talk of landing a force in the neighborhood of Rodosto, to outflank the Bulgarians, but such a scheme is impracticable in the present state of the Turkish organization, the army would starve the moment it attempted to leave the coast."

"From a military and economic standpoint Turkey's position is hopeless. Nothing can prevent even worse misfortunes except immediate acceptance of the inevitable."

Gallipoli Chief Objective of Bulgars

LONDON, Feb. 6.—(Can. Press.)—The Bulgarians are devoting their chief attention to the bombardment of Adrianople and to an attempt to capture the Gallipoli Peninsula and so take the Turkish forts in the rear. An official despatch issued at Constantinople indicates that the Bulgarians have been successful in their first operations in the latter quarter, and according to a Sofia despatch, the capture of Gallipoli is the chief objective of the Bulgarian ambitions for the time being, and no attempt will be made to force the Tchatalja lines.

The same despatch says that the Bulgarian attack in Gallipoli is supported by the Greek navy in the Gulf of Saros. Fifty thousand Bulgarians were landed along this coast last November, and it may be presumed that during the armistice this force was strengthened by artillery.

Should the Bulgarians capture the Turkish forts, there is nothing to prevent them from capturing Constantinople.

Jurors Unable to Fix Blame

An open verdict was returned last night by Coroner Dr. G. G. Rowe's jury, investigating the death of James Mitchell who was fatally crushed between two freight trains at Mimico last Saturday.

The jury added a rider stating that owing to the unsatisfactory evidence and the condition of the chief witness they were unable to arrive at any conclusion as regards negligence.

H. A. Cameron, the other brakeman on the train, testified that he was standing on one of the cars which were being coupled. Mitchell offered to assist him with the brake, but he warned the latter to be careful. Mitchell disregarded this caution, according to the witness, and stepped between the couplers with the result that he was injured and died upon reaching Toronto.

Mayor Lavallee, after proposing the health of the king, proposed that of the corporation of the City of Toronto. The delegation, said Mr. Hocken, came to Montreal as brother Canadians, and it was gratifying for them to find in a Canadian city what they were looking for in a system of modern filtration. Mayor Hocken made some humorous reflections on the things that Montreal possessed, and which Toronto would like to get, such as Mount Royal and an extension of the head of river and ocean navigation. The corporation of Toronto, said his worship, extended a hearty invitation to their colleagues of Montreal to visit them in the near future. Both cities were trying to develop the best spirit and both would sing "O Canada" and "God Save the King."

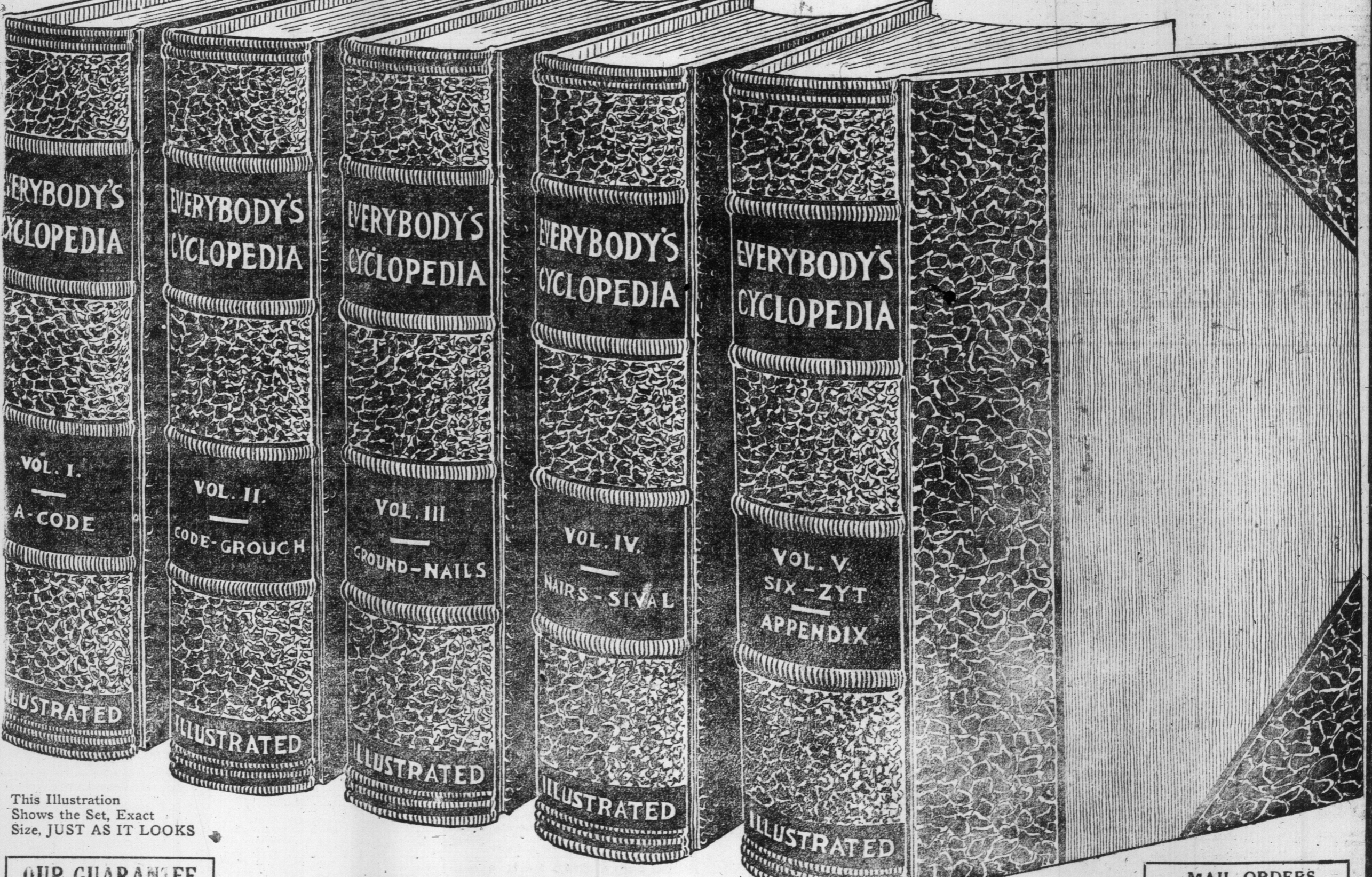

A very crazy man down in Iroquois wrote an article recently which was evidently considered so good by The Mail and Empire that that paper reprinted it, but whether as a final answer to all tax reformers or as a horrible example of what anti-tax reformers are capable of, does not appear.

The writer of the article plumes himself on having successfully heckled Mr. R. Stewart Muir, who had the temerity to oppose Premier Whitney in his own constituency last election. He put a poser to Mr. Muir and not acquainted with Mr. Muir and not concerned about his heckling, but why he should have qualified before the Iroquois man's proposition does not appear very clearly.

It is stated as an example of "inconsistency and rank injustice" on the part of the proposed tax reform. Here is the illustration, a somewhat ancient friend: "The prosperous merchant referred to above builds a \$10,000 mansion on a 25 x 100 foot lot on a desirable street that appears to his fancy. Alongside of him resides Mr. Smith, an honest, moderately poor man, and father of a large family" (these facts we are to suppose are all carefully considered by the assessment officer under the present system).

UNITED STATES CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. After forty-three years another amendment has been made to the constitution of the United States. It will be known as the sixteenth and provides that a federal income tax may be levied on individuals without regard to the section of the original constitution, which required that direct taxes should be apportioned among the several states according to their respective populations, ascertained in accordance with its provisions.

This change was demanded so far back as 1843, so that it has taken nearly twenty years to secure acceptance. The mass of the people was favorable to its adoption, but the complicated processes required by the constitution of the United States and the difficulties otherwise in the way of making the popular will effectual, delayed its consummation. This last amendment is, however, expected to yield place to the seventeenth—that of direct nomination of senators. It has already been approved by ten states and many more will this year give their adherence.

AUSTRALIAN NAVAL SERVICE. So eager are young Australians to train for the commonwealth navy that candidates for the Royal Navy College were selected by ballot. It seems that in the commonwealth there were those who anticipated and asserted that sea service would be unpopular. They have been proved wrong in their surmise, and there is as little reason to believe that the service would not have equal appeal in Canada.

The Australian Government has taken pains to ensure that the lands entering service on the training ship are made comfortable, so that the sea service shall be constantly popular. Pay rates on the training ship have been fixed at \$2.62 per week for first-class, and \$1.75 per week second-class. Pocket money on account of services is allowed on scale ranging up to 50c weekly, and the balance is placed to the credit of each boy in the Commonwealth Bank.

INSANITY CAN BE USUALLY CHECKED

Montreal Expert Alienist Says, Taken in Early Stages, Disease Is Curable.

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—(Can. Press).—A stirring appeal for the better education of the community in matters pertaining to insanity was the basis of the report of Dr. T. J. Burgess, medical superintendent of the Verdun Hospital for the Insane, at the twenty-sixth annual meeting of the officers of that institution held this afternoon.

That, taken in its incipient stages, insanity was with rare exceptions curable, was the opinion expressed by the doctor, and his statement was borne out by a presentation of statistics gathered in the institution over which he presides. The trouble was that, as a general rule, the relatives of an afflicted individual, provided he was not dangerous, allowed his complaint to become chronic before any action was taken.

By providing a mentally deficient individual with occupation and amusement, wonders could be worked, and, combined with treatment, cures in the majority of cases effected.

DR. ROSE'S ACTION.

Accident Was Discussed in Lodge Room With Witnesses. "Dr. Rose asked me in the lodge room at the High Court of the Canadian Order of Foresters if I knew anything about the case, and if I remembered his lameness. I did remember." This was what Joseph L. Campbell said in Mr. Justice Britton's non-jury assize court yesterday when T. H. Lennox, K.C., asked him when he was first requested to give evidence in the familiar case of Dr. Andrew Rose against the Toronto Railway Company for \$5,000 damages.

Dr. Rose, as everybody knows, claims to have been injured in a trolley accident in May, 1911, at the Parliament and Carlton corner. The case has been tried before, last autumn, but the court of appeal granted a new trial which is now proceeding leisurely at the city hall. It was Dr. Rose's evil fortune to meet with a bicycle accident in June, 1911, and the railway company contends that the injuries from which he is now suffering were not caused by the street car accident. It is a pretty tangle. Dr. Rose has two excellent witnesses, Mr. Campbell and Mr. Boyd, both of whom remembered the doctor having walked with a lameness and a limp between the dates of the two accidents, on the notable occasion of the convention of the High Court of the Canadian Foresters. He is lame at the present time; he limped into the courtroom yesterday. The medical evidence is slightly contradictory, which is not disturbingly unusual.

Miss Carruthers Is Doing Marvelous Things With Her Class.

PARENTS ARE GRATEFUL Many of Them Have Expressed Gratitude at Results Obtained.

Toronto is fairly seething just now with educational enthusiasts who are working out problems along theoretical lines, and offering all kinds of suggestions for the betterment of things generally. Others are working away, accepting things as they find them, doing the best possible with the resources at hand, leaving theories and their solutions to those who delight in them.

Among these practical people is Miss Carruthers, who is doing such wonderful things with her class of "defectives" at 23 Grace street. The word "wonderful" may seem extravagant, but when one witnesses big, overgrown, fat, listless boys, and nervous, frightened little girls transformed into active, happy children, interested in the work upon which they are engaged and progress marking every day of their school life with Miss Carruthers, no adjective seems too complimentary to the results in evidence.

In her class of between fifteen and a score of pupils, Miss Carruthers has found problems right to hand. Patience and a real, womanly, individual interest in the children of her care are the keys by which she finds her way to the confidence. Some of these children are poor and as a consequence underfed, and Miss Carruthers has actually boarded the board of education for a request for milk for these anemic little ones. Could motherly interest itself do more?

It is somewhat puzzling why greater interest is not shown in this little woman at Grace street, this teacher of the physically and mentally deficient in the interim of waiting for the larger environment promised our defectives. Encouragement by way of the best equipment possible for her class and the milk she asks for those whom she judges it would benefit, ought one would think to be at her immediate service.

To transform big listless boys and little nervous girls into interested workers on basketry, to teach the hitherto undocile tongue to count, sing and read and to give to all an attraction towards school and class life are no small feats, but these are what Miss Carruthers has been doing for the past two and a half years. Under her patient and systematic management the truant has become a voluntary everyday attendant, little untrained fingers have learned to stitch and to draw, ears thought to be deaf to the charm of sound have been opened, and eyes have observed shape and color which before knew no distinction. The effects on the homes of these defectives are also worthy of comment. The mothers in several cases have themselves come to Miss Carruthers to express their gratitude at the marked improvement in their little ones. While waiting for the institutions which must come later, Miss Carruthers and her work are deserving of every support.

Stock Markets Show Easy Undertone---C.P.R. Down in N. Y.

TORONTO MARKET ON DOWN GRADE AGAIN

C. P. R. Was Weak in New York Exchange and Brazilian Followed Suit Here.

INVESTMENTS ARE FIRM

Trust Company Stocks Were in Demand—Talk of Further Dividend Increases.

Financial sentiment was further affected yesterday by the war news and the practical certainty that hostilities had not been renewed merely for effect. Cables early in the day characterized as entirely too sanguine the stories that the resumption of the war would mean an early signing of peace, and with another long drawn-out campaign in sight, the stock markets were easily depressed. The most significant development of the day was the fact that values held their own so well. A tightening up of money here was also not without its effect.

In the Toronto market a measure of weakness was shown by practically all of the active issues. C.P.R. was particularly prominent, the early downturn in the London exchange being carried further both here and in New York. In Wall street the shares were quoted as low as 23 1/2 at one period, a decline of 1 1/2 points for the day, and a full 4 1/4 under the close of last week. This security naturally bears the brunt of any apprehension occasioned by the action of the European markets.

Lowest in Two Weeks. Brazilian dropped back to 97 3/4 here, a net loss of 3/4 points for the day, and the close was just a shade better than that, leaving a decline of 1 1/2 points in the two days. The shares were at their lowest in over two weeks. Other stocks to show an easier trend were Spanish River, Tooke, Duluth Superior, Maple Leaf, Cannors, and B. C. Packers. Of these Packers, common and preferred, Spanish and Duluth Superior lost over a point apiece. The decline in Packers was the most significant, amounting as it did to 5 points from the previous sale, and a new high record in its history. Anticipations of the company following the example of other trust and loan concerns were responsible for the movement.

Canada Landed sold at 170, a gain of 5 points on the higher dividend rate.

WHY AND WHEREFORE OF DECLINE IN C. P. R. Sales Against New Stock Issue Carried Price Down Again in New York.

C.P.R. was the weakest spot in the New York market yesterday, the shares dropping nearly two points at 23 1/2, a full 4 1/4 points under the close last week. The decline was due to apprehension over the international situation, owing to the resumption of hostilities in the Balkans, and to liquidation by holders who were not in a position to finance subscriptions for the new stock issue. On account of the stringency in the money market considerable difficulty along this line is expected and anticipations of lower prices for the shares are based on that fact. A New York wire yesterday stated that traders were talking 230 for the stock.

RESIGNS PRESIDENCY. S. H. Ewing has resigned from the presidency of the Toronto Mortgage Investments Company.

Money Tightens Again

One effect of the resumption of hostilities in the Balkans has been a tightening up in the money situation in Toronto. A week or so ago the banks loosened their purse strings somewhat, and brokers hoped the worst of the stringency had passed. During the last few days there has been some calling of loans again, and the situation has become consequently more acute than ever. The present feeling of uneasiness in the stock market may be attributed largely to that account.

If the Balkan war had been concluded, as seemed likely a fortnight ago, money would have worked considerably easier here. The information given out by a prominent banking official yesterday, "As it is conditions will likely remain about as they are until the skies clear."

ONLY ROUTINE AT TOR. RY. ANNUAL

Gratifying Increase Shown in Earnings—Better Things to Come, Says Manager.

As anticipated, nothing beyond the routine business transpired at the Toronto Railway annual meeting yesterday afternoon. The financial statement reported the gross earnings for the year as \$5,448,050.36, and the net earnings \$2,581,500.24, compared with \$2,198,179.56 in 1911. Out of the net earnings was deducted the sum of \$2,012,637.57, distributed as follows: Dividends and interest, \$1,070,638.81; percentage of earnings paid to city, \$798,955.66; pavement charges, \$30,053; general taxes, \$52,127.

The percentage of operating cost was 53.4 per cent. of the passenger earnings, a decrease of 1.8 per cent. as compared with 1911. The amount paid to the City of Toronto was 14.6 per cent., or \$119,816 more than in 1911. The company carried 135,786-573 passengers in 1912, or 14,738,729 more than in 1911.

The Toronto and York Radial Railway Company reported gross earnings of \$492,222.85, an increase of 3.76 per cent. over the previous year.

General Manager Fleming in his address complimented the shareholders and promised even better things to come in the current year.

COTTON MARKET IS DEVOID OF FEATURE

Erickson Perkins & Co., (J. G. Beatty) wired: Today's market was void of feature. A slight improvement occurred, but the volume of trading was the smallest for the year. Sentiment continues bearish, on the small spot of demand and favorable new crop prospects, but bear interests do not seem willing to take an aggressive position. We are not inclined to follow rallies under present conditions.

EXPECT WAR WILL BE ENDED SOON

Erickson Perkins & Co., wired J. G. Beatty: The various political considerations here and abroad, make for caution. It is doubtful if formal announcement of the Union Southern Pacific plan would have any considerable effect on prices. Sudden surrender by Turkey would help sentiment for a time, but there is no surrender in sight. It may be delayed for many days, but both sides are seriously short of cash and it would appear that they cannot hold out long.

RAISED THE DIVIDEND.

Crown Life Assurance Company directors have increased the dividend on the company's stock from 6 to 7 per cent., as a result of the biggest year in the company's history. New business amounted to \$4,006,020, an increase of \$1,293,920, or 47 per cent.

STOCKS SOLD OFF ON LIGHT TRADING

Unfavorable Reports of Copper Trade Conditions Exercised Depressing Effect.

BEARS STILL CAUTIOUS

Hesitancy Shown in Putting Out Short Leases—Can Dividends Be Deferred.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Quotations of stocks drifted downwards today, in much the same deliberate way as on the previous days of the week. Sentiment was more bearish, and also there were no developments of sufficient moment to bring about a decided change in market conditions. Such new influences as were brought to bear helped to spread pessimistic feelings.

Disappointment at the failure of American Can directors to take action on the back dividend on the preferred stock, legal obstructions in the way of concluding the subway negotiations, and unfavorable reports of conditions in the copper trade were responsible for declines in the stocks directly concerned, and the heaviness in these shares spread to the general list, although the railroad stocks for a time resisted the movement. But bear traders, although professing increased confidence, did not put their faith to the test by venturing upon heavy operations.

The amount of business continued small, and the movement among the bulk of the standard issues was narrow. Some of the specialties and a few of the high-grade railroad stocks at times were lowered a point or more, giving the market as a whole a heavy tone.

Break in Coppers. The copper group was the weak feature, these shares being sold on the break in the metal market in London and reports of unsettled conditions in the home market. Consumers were said to be holding back pending publication this week of the copper producers' monthly statement. It was predicted that the statement would show a further gain in stocks on hand, Pennsylvania was under pressure, and in this connection were revived reports which were denied recently, that a large issue of new stock was approved. Another bylaw which authorizes the directors to enter into negotiations for the sale of the mine was passed.

NEW STOCK ISSUE WAS VOTED DOWN

COBALT, Feb. 5.—(Special).—In spite of general expectations the annual meeting of the Cobalt Silver Cobalt Mining Company, which was held at the Hotel Lang, the Toronto directors, pointing the favoring board of directors: R. B. McLaren, W. F. Powell, C. A. Richardson, J. H. Black and R. T. Shillington, M.L.A. The new man on the board is J. H. Black, who takes the place of R. B. McLaren.

The bylaw to increase the capital stock of the company was voted down. The new authorization of the directors if they thought fit, to borrow as high as \$100,000 with which to install a concentrator was approved. Another bylaw which authorizes the directors to enter into negotiations for the sale of the mine was passed.

No New Stock Issue

J. M. Smith of the Brazilian Traction, Light & Power Co. last evening gave an absolute denial to the rumors that the company intended to make a new issue of stock.

ENGLISH CAPITAL IN THE COBALT DISTRICT

Practical confirmation of the report published in The World to the effect that a deal was well under way for the purchase of control of the Peterson Lake Silver Cobalt Mining Company, Limited, was afforded yesterday afternoon, and the shares of the company rose to a new high record at 27 in the stock markets in anticipation of the closing of the transaction. It is known that several parties have been endeavoring to clean up a number of big blocks of the stock of late. In this connection it is hinted that interests closely allied to the control have made offers considerably above the market for blocks of 20,000 and 25,000 shares. If the company passes to English capitalists, as it is believed it will, the transaction will mark the absolute confidence which has been shown in London regarding Cobalt and its mines.

SICK MARKET AT MONTREAL

C. P. R.'s Weakness Communicated Itself to General List—Rally in Brazilian.

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—Local stocks inclined to heaviness today, and most of the issues at the close of the market showed net losses ranging from small fractions to about one point. The general factors in the situation remained unchanged, the market with spasmodic efforts here and there to follow its own spirit of optimism, yielding to outside influence, which continue to hold the financial centres of the world in check.

Of immediate influence here was a lower range of quotations for C.P.R., which was adversely affected in London by continental selling, and later in New York by the generally bearish sentiment of that market. The stock continued dull on the decline here. In the morning it touched a new low of 27 for the movement, and closed in the afternoon only slightly better at 27 1/2 bid, 27 3/4 asked. The rights were weak at 16.

Brazilian gave a fairly good account of itself. After opening 1-2 lower at 97 1/2, the price worked up to 97 7/8 in the morning and 98 in the afternoon, closing finally 1-8 lower on the day.

Montreal Power was affected by general market conditions, and declined about 1 point to 125, while Shawinigan in sympathy closed 1-2 lower at 142 1-2. Detroit opened strong at 80 1-2, but likewise yielded to general conditions, and opening prices proved the best of the day. Conspicuously weak was Packers' common, which, after declining 4 points to 151 in the morning, was offered at 152 1-4 at the close.

"WASH SALES" WILL NOT BE TOLERATED

LONDON MARKET IS IN NERVOUS MOOD

Uncertainty of Near East Situation Reflected in Capel Court—Consols Shade Lower.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Except for moderate improvements in home rails and Chinese bonds, the stock market today was dull and drooping, owing to the uncertainty of the Near East situation. The absence of continental support accentuated the dullness in the afternoon, when copper shares became weak. Consols, in which the settlement was concluded, declined a sixteenth.

ALBANY, N.Y., Feb. 5.—No stock exchange reform legislation will be enacted until after everyone interested has had an opportunity to express his views on the seven bills drafted by Gov. Sulzer and introduced in both houses of the legislature today, according to the governor. While one of these measures would fix a minimum rate of interest of 15 per cent on call loans, the governor tonight said he was not committed to such a proposition.

THE CANADIAN MORTGAGE INVESTMENT COMPANY

The annual statement of the Canadian Mortgage Investment Company for the year 1912, submitted at the annual meeting held yesterday, showed a large increase in profits and a volume of business greatly exceeding that of any former year.

The net profits amounted to \$103,531, exclusive of the unappropriated profits brought forward from the previous year. After distributing \$1,884 in dividends and transferring \$50,000 to reserve fund, the sum of \$53,047 was carried forward to the credit of profit and loss account.

The business of the company is steadily expanding, and it could have employed during the year, the report states, a largely increased capital. The paid-up capital now stands at \$1,200,000, the reserve fund at \$250,000, and the company has debenture capital to the extent of \$827,000.

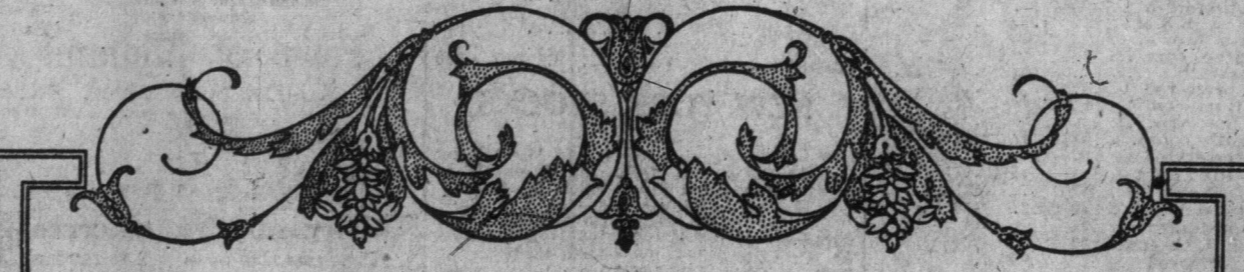
