**Toronto and National Play at Scarborough**

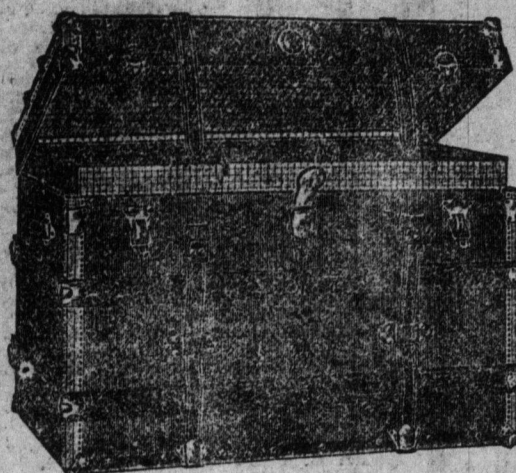

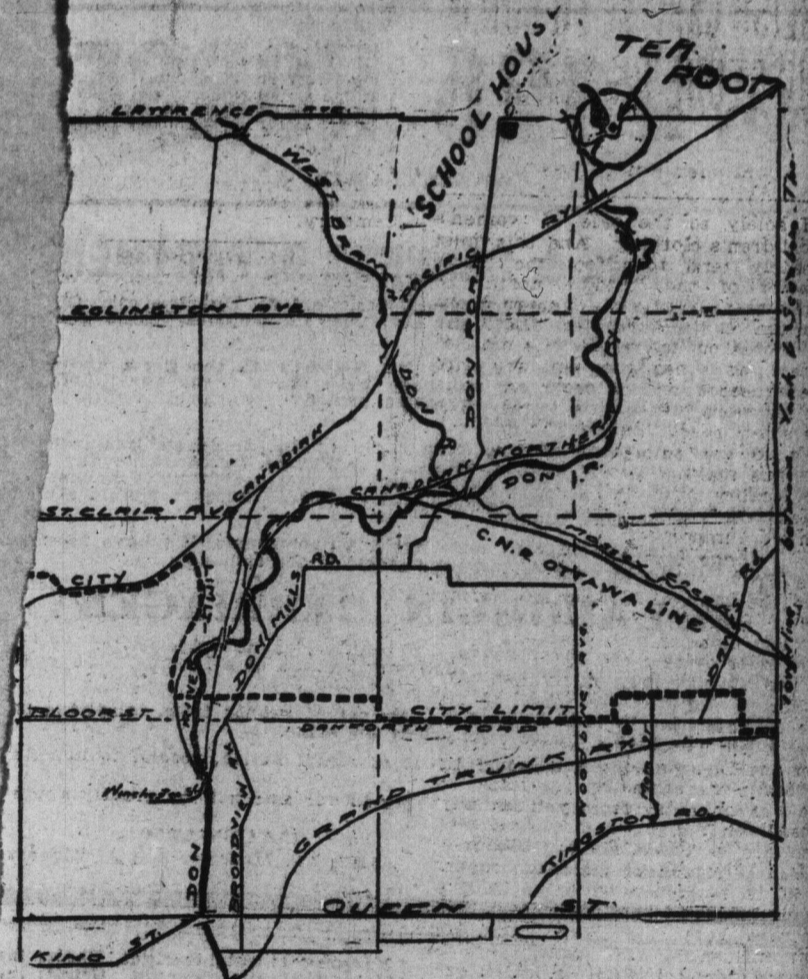

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CANADA NEEDS IMPROVED SYSTEM OF PARCEL POST

Continued From Page 1.

Extend your parcel post system and the express rates in Canada will be cut in two to-morrow.

"Nothing would do so much to improve the conditions in the west as to bring into operation the principle of which I have spoken. I challenge representatives of the west to say what they think of the efficacy of the parcel post system in reducing express charges.

"The fruitmen of Ontario, time and time again, have brought their grievances forward, and in connection with the transportation of their products, I may be told: the parcel post system could not do more for the people than it does now.

"If my voice can do anything for the people of this country, it may be difficult for me to make myself heard beyond this house—it will make known to the people the new charges for the parcel post system.

"Who was in danger?" asked the doctor. "It was the corporations themselves that were in danger."

"This is one of the most important questions that this parliament can deal with," declared a speaker (Conte Sola).

"Major Beattie Filled With Doubts. Major Beattie (London), took the stand that the postoffice could not perform the service now rendered by the express companies; and that a parcel post service would only get the class of business which the express companies do not want.

"By mileage," explained Mr. Lemieux, "four cents a mile where the mail is carried in a baggage car and eight cents per mile when regular mail service is used."

"Yes, the best in the world," said the postmaster-general. In conclusion Mr. Lemieux stated that he had sometime ago given in a bill.

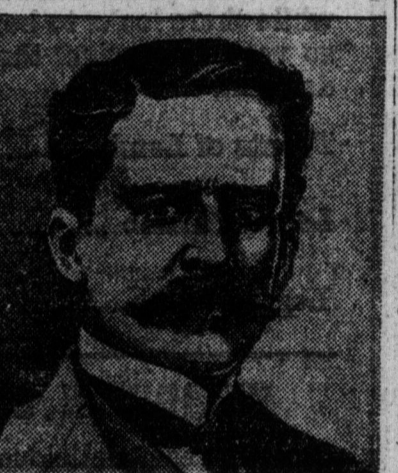

LINDSAY IS COMMITTED ON CONSPIRACY CHARGE

William Laidlaw, K.C., Testifies to Complaints by Halton Farmers of Misrepresentation.

William J. Lindsay, stock seller for the collapsed Farmers' Bank, was committed for trial from police court yesterday morning by Magistrate Denison upon a charge of conspiracy with W. M. Travers, former general manager of the bank, to secure fraudulently the certificates of the treasury board of Canada which enabled the bank to commence business. He will appear at the next sittings of the assizes after vacation.

William Laidlaw K. C. was a witness last yesterday's trial and of receiving complaints from a number of Halton County farmers who had subscribed for stock upon Lindsay's solicitation. He was asked to sign a writ on behalf of these complainants against Lindsay and others asking the rescinding of a stock subscription and a writ seeking an injunction forbidding an application for the banks charter. A copy of the writ was forwarded to Mr. Justice Minister of finance, setting out the alleged frauds. He heard that an emissary of the bank had gone to Hamilton and asked to ransom the subscriptions and to refund payments made and that the court had consented to the withdrawal of the writ.

It was shown that about \$50,000 of the \$250,000 required for the issue of the certificate was secured in this way. Mr. Laidlaw said that these could not have been bona fide subscriptions when the certificate was obtained.

Mr. Laidlaw said that he was at present acting for other complainants in the case for which he is committed. "Have you found any more of this sort of thing?" asked Crown Attorney Corry.

"On the way," was the reply, "almost every case has something of this sort in it." Mr. Lindsay was committed for trial and bail at \$8,000, was removed.

NO DECISION REACHED ON INTAKE CONTRACT

Roger Miller & Sons' Tender of \$259,900 Regarded by Controllers as Much Too High.

The board of control, the board of water experts, City Engineer Rust and Waterworks Engineer, Fellows met in private session in the mayor's office yesterday to consider the tenders submitted to the board of control for the laying of the new intake pipe. A great deal of secrecy was observed about the proceedings and the meeting, and the only official announcement made thereafter was to the effect that there was nothing to read out. The tender, however, was not awarded.

Another meeting is to be held early in the week to give the matter further consideration. It is believed that the bid is not to be awarded, because the city hall regards the figures tendered as altogether too high. The contractors who tendered on the job, and are very close to the limit of the running, as the city has not the plant for them to use in doing the job. Roger Miller & Sons have a very good record for this kind of work, and as they alone submitted a bid tender, they are regarded as the proper parties to get the contract.

Where Shoe Pinches. But the hitch is on the price asked by this concern. Their tender for laying the intake was \$259,900, which is practically three times as much as the old intake pipe cost to lay. Of course, the new specifications are calling for a more thorough job, and are very much more difficult to follow out than those drawn up for the old pipe, but the margin of extra expense looks like together too large even when this fact is taken into consideration. Recognizing this fact, it was decided at yesterday's meeting neither to accept nor to refuse Roger Miller & Sons' tender. An adjournment was taken until next week in order that a conference might be held with the contractors, and an attempt made to get them to pare down their estimates considerably. A suggestion has been made that the city buy its own plant, and do the job by day labor, but the controllers regard it with scant favor.

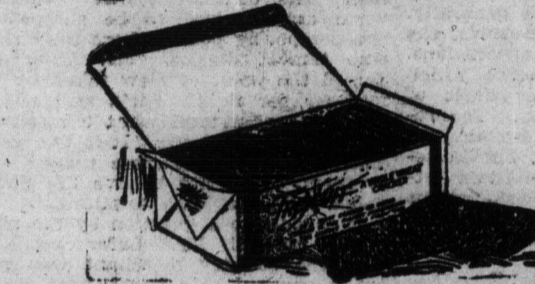

NEW T.E.L. RATES HIGHER?

Business Man Says He is Asked to Pay More.

At least one Toronto manufacturing concern claims to have discovered that, in some respects at any rate, the new Toronto Electric Light rates for commercial service are higher than the old. Manager Frank Wise of the Macmillan Publishing Company, Bond-street, says that after having waited for six weeks for the new T. E. L. rates on direct current he finds them less to his advantage than the old ones. It seems that the city will not be prepared to supply direct current north of Queen-street for some months and that the company were hesitating between alternating current from the city hydro-electric department and direct current for which the city is equipped, from the Toronto Electric Light. Manager Wise says that they will now probably install a transformer and take current from the city.

MONTREAL, July 21.—An effort is being made to form a merger of all the coated paper factories in Canada. There are about eight factories. They are the Montreal Paper Company of Thorold; the Canada Paper Company of Sherbrooke, Que.; the Kimble Paper Company, St. Catharines; the Barber Bros. Company, Georgetown; the Toronto Paper Company, Cornwall; the St. Lawrence Paper Company, Mill River; the Montreal Paper Company, Montreal; and the Northern Paper Company, Quebec. The merger will have a capital of \$5,000,000. The matter has been taken up with the management of the various companies, but a uniform line on amalgamation has not yet been struck.

The revolution in Mexico is only started, and sometime, sooner or later, Madero will pay with life for his treachery."

## PERSIA SENDS PROTEST TO BRITAIN AND RUSSIA

Representations of Intrigues of Deposed Shah, It Says, Were Uniformly Ignored.

TEHERAN, July 21.—The Persian Government to-day sent a note to the British and Russian legations, pointing out that the various representations made on the subject of the intrigues of the deposed Shah, Mohammed Ali Mirza, had been uniformly ignored, and alleging that the indifference of the British and Russian representatives had produced the natural effect in Mohammed Ali's landing in Persia. The note adds that the Persian Government regrets that Great Britain and Russia, which it had the right to expect in virtue of the protocol of Aug. 25, 1909. The situation is of the gravest nature. The government, in spite of its first show of energy is disposed to desist, and nothing yet has been done in the way of equipping an expedition to proceed against the ex-shah and the revolutionaries who are active in Kurdistan. Two thousand Bakhtiars have been summoned to Teheran, but the war minister says that the force cannot be set in motion for ten days.

Hon. J. S. Duff, provincial minister of agriculture, and Mrs. Duff arrived yesterday, and after Mr. Duff had attended cabinet meeting in the afternoon, proceeded to their home at Cooktown.

During his stay in Great Britain Mr. Duff attended the Royal Agricultural Show at Norwich, and he was greatly impressed with the breeds of cattle, sheep and horses.

# The Mining Market is Getting Back to Its Old-Time Gait

## Dome Ex. and Vipond the Leaders Market Develops Better Tone

Porcupines in Better Demand and Market Picks Up Considerably—Cobalts Still in the Dumps.

World Office, Friday Evening, July 21. Porcupines took a decided turn for the better in the late trading in the market to-day, prices showing an almost all-round resiliency which brought about advances in numerous instances.

The market did not do very much during the morning session, trading being of a generally perfunctory nature, and price changes not insignificant. At the close of the day, however, when the demand brightened up a little, it soon became apparent that the market was pretty well bare of stock.

The feature of the day was Vipond, which was the scene of special operations throughout the session. The shares were quoted at 5 1/2 at the opening, an advance of a point over night, and were moved gradually as high as 59 under insistent buying. Profit-taking on the advance carried the price back to 58, the stock closing at that price.

Dome Extension was another strong performer, but in this instance the improvement was not manifest until late in the day. The shares ruled between 84 1/2 and 85 1/2 until right before the close, when a sudden sharp demand carried the price up over a point to 87. Little was expressed that the recent decline had been brought about for the purpose of getting the market nervous.

Another vein Domes Extension Reported to Be Still Picking Them Up. It was reported on the street last night that a rich strike had been made in the surface prospecting in the Dome Extension, a vein showing excellent values having been picked up.

## Reorganization at The West Dome Mine

Arrangements have been made for the appointment of Mr. J. B. Cleveland of Arizona, who has had considerable experience in gold mining in the west and who will assume the duties of general manager at the West Dome, succeeding the late R. Alvin Wells.

The first undertaking at the mine will be the erection of a steel and concrete building for the machinery. This will also provide a place of shelter in case of emergency thru fire. Mr. Warfield, talking with the World immediately prior to his departure for the north, said that many of the mines which have discovered showings of sufficient richness to warrant going to the development, will undoubtedly put up buildings of this nature. The fact that the railroad is in running order and that supplies can now be gotten into the camp should make for a more substantial character of buildings.

BROCKVILLE, July 21.—(Special.)—On July 4 Fred Arnot, an Ogdensburg plumber, told his wife that his employer had assigned him a job in Malone, N.Y. This was simply a ruse on his part, as it turns out that Arnot eloped from the Malone City to Brockville with Miss Ethel May Baker. There the couple were married at the George-st. Methodist church parsonage by Rev. Thomas Brown.

SPRINKLE LAWNS ANY NIGHT Use of Hose Permitted Between Seven and Eight o'Clock Each Evening.

The local board of health have met and conferred and published a decree that any lawn-owning or lawn-occupying citizen may use can and chain and hereby permitted to water said patches of grass any evening of the week between the hours of seven and eight o'clock. It is understood that the morality authorities have been looking with scant favor on the water by law restricting the time for watering lawns to the hour between ten and eleven o'clock at night.

ARRESTED FIFTEEN WORKMEN Who Were Erecting Poles on Eglinton Avenue in North Toronto.

The North Toronto police have stopped by force the operations of the workmen of the Toronto and Niagara Power company who were erecting poles on Eglinton avenue, North Toronto. Early in the day the workmen were served by the town with notices to quit operations but refused to do so and fifteen of them, with Foreman Woodhouse, were arrested by Chief Collins and a posse of police.

MONTREAL, July 21.—The first case of violence in the carpenters' strike was reported this morning when two shots were fired at a body of striking carpenters, as they were on their way from the United Shoe Machinery building, now under construction, to the labor temple.

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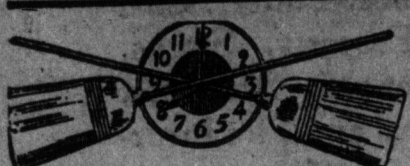

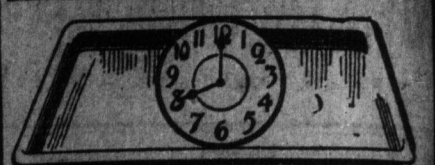
