



Cost of Living Was Highest in January

Prices of 261 Commodities Thirtyone Per Cent, Higher Than Ten Year Average,

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—The department of labor's price record for January shows the general price level of articles entering the cost of living to be cles entering the cost of living to be the highest known, probably, within the present generation, certainly since the early eighties. Since the middle of June last, a pronounced and continuous upward movement has been in progress, and the there was a short breathing spell in December, January now shows the highest level of all.

The department's index number, which is based on the observation of fluctuations in 261 commodities selected for their representative character, rose to 131.0 in January, that is, general prices were 31 per cent, higher in that month than was the average for the decade 1890-1899, which is taken by the department as the standard of comparison in constructing its number Compared with prices in 1897, the lowest year in the past quarter of a

century, prices are now at least 45 per The recent rise is particularly serious from the cost of living standpoint, inasmuch as it is due to industrial expansion having enhanced the price of materials, while the reported shortage in the world's crop has produced a like effect on the price of foodstuffs.







The popularity of Canadian securisponsible for the number of undesirable offerings, both financial and real estate, by untrustworthy firms in Great Britain. Canada, the London weekly devoted to Dominion affairs, draws at-tration to cases illustrating the latest

methods adopted.
Some concern is felt among those prominently connected with Canadian interests in London that the methods adopted by certain seliers of real estate, who have recently come to London, may have the effect of hurting legitimate Canadian investment, and impairing the confidence which the Dominion now so largely enjoys among the various classes of investors in the mother country. Many of the old-services

minion now so largely enjoys among the various classes of investors in the mother country. Many of the old-established and well-known firms in Canada, realizing the very much greater interest which is now taken by British investors in Canadian affairs, have either opened branch offices or appointed agents in London, and the business they offer to their clients is of a sound and genuine character. Their success has, however, led to the formation of a number of small land companies by Canadian promoters, who are privately offering town lots and building sites of doubtful value to the British public, and sometimes the methods used to influence investors have raised a suspicion of their bona fides.

Complaints have been made that the addresses of some of the provincial government offices in London have been used, with the idea—of course—of suggesting to their intending clients that the company or individual has some official connection with that Canadian province. The same remark applies to the Royal Colonial Institute, Remonstrances, and, in some cases, ejections of such persons have, we hear, been made by the officials, but as these and other questionable methods have been employed—tho, we believe, in very few instances—it would be well to warn it vestors that they should exercise the greatest care in thoroly satisfying themselves as to the reputation and standing of any firm or individual thru whom they may think of making any investment in Canadian property, as well as the nature of their propositions.

. JUSTICE LAURENCE DEAD.

HALIFAX, Feb. 13.—Justice F. A. Laurence of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia died at II o'clock to-night at his home in Truro. He had been ill for several weeks with pleurisy and a complication of diseases.

Judge Laurence was born at Mabou, C.B., sixty-nine years ago. He studied law in Truro, was defeated by the late Hon. A. W. McLellan in 1832 in the Colchester election, was elected in 1838 to the provincial assembly, and became speaker. In 1904 he defeated the late Mr. Gourley for the house of commons, and in 1907 was appointed to the bench.

The dropping of the first stamps at one of the biggest stamp mills in Canada is to be made an event of much importance and an all-day celebration of winter sports is planned for, with an elaborate feast at the King George Hotel following in the evening. Mine men from Cobalt, Halley bury, Liskeard, Elk Lake, Larder, and Gowganda will attend. The Dome officials are coming in a private train and several other parties will be here in private cars.

The big mill is enclosed and the stamps placed. There are many small machines to be placed yet. The rock crusher foundation at the main shaft is laid and the aerial tramway built.

Miniature Railway.

Two miniature locomotives with ten small trancars are on the siding, and these will be ready to haul ore in a very few days. The tram cars are to run on the aerial tramway between the stamp mill and the main shaft. The locomotives are so constructed that they may be criven into the drifts where the tramcars can be loaded. By locomotive power the ore will be taken from underground to the stamp mill.

The only outside work now in pro-

mill.

The only outside work now in progress at the mine is the diamond drilling along the main ridge to the south of the pinnacle of quartz and along the east side of the "Ida Maud" claim near the Dome Extension. The drills on the main ridge are used to block out ore bodies in the country rock and to also locate new ore zones. A large stretch of the Dome pinnacle, schiet, quartz, etc., yields values of sufficient worth to warrant the company milling the entire rock without separation.

A complete sewer system is being installed in the low ground to the north of the main ledge and to the east and north of the stamp mill as well as thru the camp.

Corner in Silver Was Not Justified

So Say English Brokers, Who Point to Big Stocks in

Recent advices from the old country on the silver metal situation report that the recent semi-corner in silver was not wholly justified, and the heavy stocks of the metal in London are stocks of the metal in London are pointed out as a reason for the statement. The advance in the price was, of course, occasioned by the rampant speculative purchases of the group which is working in the market. The more conservative tone adopted by the big brokers is accepted as indicative of the fact that conditions have so altered that the situation is showing signs of becoming more or less top-heavy.

Thruout the month of January prices have advanced almost continuously, The quotations on the first day were the lowest, and those on the last day the highest of the month.

The primary cause of this upward movement was a substantial reduction of the silver prices in the Indian treasury reserve, provoking Indian specu-

of the silver prices in the Indian treasury reserve, provoking Indian speculative purchases, and bullish feeling amongst producers. Subsidiary influences have been a fair crop of foreign coinage orders and a demand by Chnia for British dollars.

The governing factors just now are the continued locking up of silver by the Indian speculative group and the reluctance on the part of China to part with silver in the present uncertainty


