A Few Pointers For Legislators.

By the Gas Company's charter, devidends must not exceed 10 per cent. The company, not satisfied with this handsome profit, wanted more, and this is how it tried to get it. In 1887 the capital stock was \$1,000,000, and the shares were selling at a premium of 80. In that year it applied to the Provincial Legislature for permission to increase Legislature for permission to increase the stock by \$1,000,000, and to allot the new shares pro rata at par among the shareholders, thus making them a present of the premiums. The company's representatives, as they are doing at the present time, appeared before the Private Bills Committee, and carried on an energetic lobby with the object of grabbing the premiums on the new stock, but Mayor Howland and the city's representatives opposed this legislation on the ground that profits were limited to 10 per cent. and insisted that the premiums, instead of being given to the shareholders, should be applied to reduce the price of gas. Finally, after much discussion, the statute 50 Vic., chap. 85, was passed, dividends were still limited to 10 per cent., the shareholders were refused the premiums, which, with other moneys, were to form a Reserve Fund, a Repairs Fund and a Special Surplus Account, with the object of cheapening Eas.

The Reserve Fund was to be formed out of the premiums and earnings, until it equalled 50 per cent. of the paid-up capital. The Repairs Fund was paid-up capital. The Repairs Fund was to be formed by an annual charge against earnings of 5 per cent. on the value of the plant in use. After the formation of these two funds, payment of directors' fees, etc., all profits were to be carried to the Special Surplus Ac-count, to be used to reduce the price of

shareholders as a bonus on stock, set wabout to obtain them in another way. Instead of forming the funds, it sunk the money in its business and in an immense, and to a great extent useless,

The Reserve Fund should amount to \$850,000, which should be in debentures, but it has been put in plant, and is drawing from consumers 5 per cent. annually for repairs.

The company declares it has \$287,000 in the Repairs Fund, obtained by this annual charge of 5 per cent. The actual repairs amount to only about 2 per cent. and the permission to charge 5 per cent. for repairs was obtained on the company's misrepresentation to the Legislature that the charge was reasonable, whereas it was excessive, and a fraud was perpetrated to obtain it. The exees over actual repairs should be returned in cheaper gas. And this \$287,000 has also been sunk in plant and is drawing 5 per cent, again for repairs.

Although there is only one plaintiff named, yet every citizen will share the benefit, for the action is to enforce the rights given them by an Act of Parliament.

Patron members who profess opposition to monopolies can prove their sincerity by voting for the people and against the gas company, which is the worst monopoly that has ever obtained a charter from Parliament.

Above the star is the motto, 'The Lord My Banner,' while below it are the words, 'Post, No. One.' In the upper corner, near the staff, is an oblong blue field, showing 45 white stars, representative of the 45 States of the Union. The star will be surmounted by a golden eagle. God grant that the truth represented by this standard will prevail for all time." Concerning the stafement that Gen. William Booth had said that he could not except a member of his own family in making the transfers in the Army, and thereby destroy all discipline, Commander Booth said: "Netter I, nor Mrs. Booth, ever asked for any exception in our case. 

The Chief Engineer of the Public Works
Department Reports on the Work
Bone Under His Supervision.
Ottawa, March 14.—(Special)—In his report to Parliament, referring to the Work done on Toronto harbor during the past fiscal war, the Chief Engineer

report to Parliament, referring to the work done on Toronto harbor during the past fiscal year, the Chief Engineer of the Public Works Department says: Works at the eastern entrance, which were begun in 1889, consist in building 1650 feet of cribwork to partly close the eastern gap from Fisherman's Island up to the new eastern channel, which is to be opened by the construction of two rows of cribwork respectively 2420 feet in length and 2280 feet in length, 400 feet distant one from the other, and by dredging between these two rows of cribwork to a depth of 16 feet, low water. During the fiscal year 1894-95, fcur cribs 30 feet in width were sunk on the west side of the channel, and one 40 feet wide on the east side, making a total of 58 cribs sunk to date; 1750 lineal feet of superstructure were constructed, forming a total to date of 5510 lineal feet, 78,548 feet; 17,155 cubic yards of stone were placed in cribs and superstructure and 107 cubic yards of large stone delivered for protecting the east pier; 14,970 cubic yards of sand were removed from the channel and crib sites, making a total of 667,493 cubic yards dredged. The total expenditure for the year was \$52,-161.

Mr. Jones admitted that 14 were present when the report of the sub-committee was defeated, and only 9 at the subsequent proceedings.

I have ascertained that the name of at least one of the present bench was placed on the list by the sub-committee to assist their real nominees, although he, in writing, stated to them that he would not allow his name to be used. His notice to them was sent before any list was published.

From the above facts the profession can judge what reliance should be placed on the circular issued, and how far the names mentioned represent the wishes of the bar of Toronto.

I may say I have no feeling in the matter against any name on the ticket—on the contrary, a number of them are personal friends, but I feel the profession should know the facts above set forth.


