THE INTERNATIONAL BRIDGE.

Arrangements Made for a Renewal of the Superstructure Across the Niagara River.

Arrangements have been made for the renewal of the superstructure of the bridge across the Niagara River at Buffalo, commonly known as the International Bridge, the property of the International Bridge Company. The bridge consists of two spans, one of which is the bridge across the Niagara River proper; the other is that across Black Rock harbor. The bridge across the Niagara River consists of eight spans, and has a total length of 1967 feet. Two openings are bridged by the arm of the draw, which has a total length of 362 feet. The length of the bridge across Black Rock harbor is 517 feet. The drawing of this bridge has a clear opening of 107 feet. This work is being carried out in order to bring the bridge fully up to the requirements of modern rolling stock and loads, which are considerably more than those of the bridge when it was built. The bridge was built in 1870, when the erection of the existing structure began. The Detroit Bridge & Iron Works have the contract for the renewal, and it is expected that the work will be completed during the current year.

To Be Rebuilt.

Waldeck-Rousseau and told him that he wished to sink all old differences in view of the present distress of the Comedie Francaise.

The bellicose attitude of the Anglo organs of England is undoubtedly partly responsible for this animosity.

KEEP QUEEN'S HOME

It is learned that the Italian Government had already been growing more nervous as the date of the Queen's visit approached, and, finally, notified Her Majesty's Government that it would not accept the responsibility of the Sovereign's safety, owing to the strong recrudescence of the Anarchist movement throughout Europe. Reports from other powers confirmed the Italian impressions.

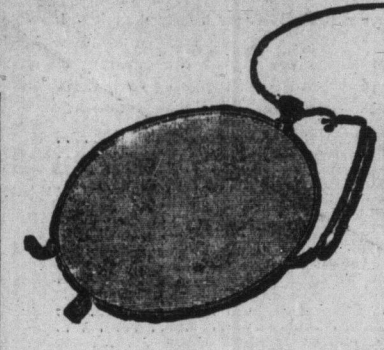

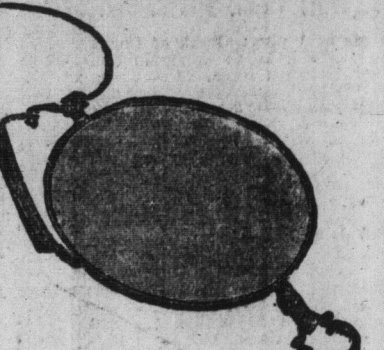
