Richardson's Eyes

Will Have Been Struck—Peculiar Western Methods of Campaigning Exposed.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 6.—A despatch in the Tribune to-night from Pilot Mound says: The political meeting here last night was one of the largest ever seen in the Mound. Notwithstanding it was in Stewart's home, the fact that it was held there was not a surprise for Richardson. When it was recalled that Richardson swept the Cartwright and Killarney meetings, and that he at least broke even in Stewart's home, some idea of the nature of the meeting may be gained. Richardson declared that in the country the riding is four to one for Richardson.

After Stewart and Sifton had made their speeches, which were along the same lines as already reported, Richardson was introduced. He set out by giving a history of the situation and showing why he was unseated. It was because he was not acceptable to Sifton and the exploiting clique which Sifton was associated with and which a decision had been reached to drive him from public life.

The question was now, did the people want a man to represent them or to represent the exploiting interest after he was elected?

LIQUOR TRAFFIC AN ISSUE
GENERAL DEWEET.

Chancellor of Exchequer Arranged Against Lord Roberts and General Booth.

DISPUTE STIRS GREAT BRITAIN.
Government Protection of Trade Versus Public and Military Reforms.

London, Feb. 6.—The temperance question has come to the front in a sensational way. Two famous army officers are arrayed on one side; on the other stands the Chancellor of the Exchequer. The army men belong to different organizations. One is Lord Roberts of Kandahar, commander-in-chief of the British forces; the other is Gen. William Booth, leader of the Salvation Army.

Booth strikes at the drunkard in general. Moreover, the latter looks for the assistance of keepers of public houses to aid him in the work of reform by refusing liquor to persons known to be habitual drunkards. It is the further purpose of Gen. Booth to limit the drinking of them in their homes and by moral suasion seek to have them abandon the downward path.

Roberts for Reforms.
It is stated that the good results following the signing out of the army canteen in the United States have prompted the initiative taken by Lord Roberts. While he does not desire the annihilation of the canteen from the army establishment here, he desires reforms that shall reduce the amount of liquor and relegate to the background the mere traffic in liquor.

Hits at the Brewers.
Gen. Roberts further declares that control shall be vested in the hands of one committee, and that the profits shall be shared among all departments. This system, he said, will be a blow to the brewer and to the free restaurants flying their flags.

Stand of the Chancellor.
Sir Michael was a guest the other night of the Bristol Licensed Victuaries' Protective and Benevolent Association, and there investigated the prohibition propaganda. He declared not only that it was the hope of the government to prohibit the sale of liquor, but that he had no objection to the prohibition propaganda.

BRITISH LOSSES IN AFRICA
ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND
To Be Exact, Up to Jan. 31st, the Total Casualties Were 5240 Officers and 100,701 Men—Forces Have Been Reduced by 25,305 Men.

London, Feb. 6.—The War Office, this evening, published a summary of the British losses in South Africa. Up to Jan. 31 the total reduction of the forces, from death and permanent disability, was 25,305 men. The total of the casualties, including surviving wounded, was 5240 officers and 100,701 men.

MAILED TO MILNER.
Copies of Correspondence Between Britain and Netherlands Sent.
London, Feb. 6.—In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Balfour, the government leader, announced that copies of the correspondence exchanged between the government of the Netherlands and the government of Great Britain on the subject of the Dutch South Africa had been mailed to Lord Milner, who would be instructed to forward the information to the Secretary, added the information that if the leaders of the Boer forces proposed to accept the terms of the peace treaty, the Netherlands would be asked to recognize the force of the representations of the Chinese plenipotentiaries, that China is making the best terms possible for herself, and incidentally for the equal rights of the peoples in China, and are shifting the responsibility to Russia as the responsible party.

REFUGEE IN WELLINGTON.
Refugees in Convention at Drayton Choose a Candidate.
Drayton, Feb. 6.—Mr. J. McEwing, a commissioner for Wellington County, received the Reform nomination for the approaching election, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the former nominee, Dr. Stewart of Palmerston, who resigned on account of ill-health. A full attendance of peace reformers was present, and many names were put forward, but Mr. J. McEwing was chosen by a large majority.

Oswaga, Feb. 6.—Gladys Christie, who died at the Emergency Hospital, Buffalo on Monday afternoon, from meningitis poisoning, was a native of this town and a daughter of the late Geo. Griffin. Her real name was Grace Griffin, but was more commonly known as Gladys. She was a devoted Christian, and her death was a great loss to her friends.

FEEL FRONT OF ATTACK
Major Ogilvy Shot Down While Charging the Boers in a Night Surprise.

FATAL BULLET A MARTINI-HEGGY.
Col. Steele Gives an Account of the Sad Affair, Which He Greatly Deplores.
Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Col. Macdonald, chief superintendent of militia stores, this morning received a letter from Col. Steele, dated Pretoria, Dec. 23, in which the latter gives an account of how Major Ogilvy met his death. The writer says: "Poor Ogilvy was killed in action on the 19th. I had an order to clear the country north of the Magaliesburg into the bush north of the meridian of Rustenburg to a squadron of mounted men, consisting of the 1st and 2nd Buffs, the 1st and 2nd Buffs, and the 1st Buffs. A good deal of trekking had been done with success, and the final move was a night march from Heliopol to Klipgat, where I took the enemy by surprise. Ogilvy, charged, pistol in hand, the front of the enemy's position, and was mortally wounded by the first discharge. He died next day as a result of his wounds. He was a brave and gallant officer, and his death was a great loss to the army."

Vanderbilt Interests Are Not Yet in Full Possession of the Canada Atlantic Railway—Government Will Not Interfere With Sale, Tho the Question May Be Discussed.
Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Confirmation of the report of the sale of the Canada Atlantic Railway to the Vanderbilt interests is still wanting from the head officials of the road here. They admit that negotiations have been in progress, and that all that remains to be done is to pay over the money. But they deny the rumor emanating from New York to the effect that the cash has been handed over and the papers of transfer finally executed. "Not Finally Sold."
"There is not a word of truth in the rumor that the road is finally sold and paid for," said Mr. J. R. Booth this morning.

RUSSIA NOW RESPONSIBLE.
Powers Opposing the Manchurian Treaty Shifting Their Protest.
Peking, Feb. 6.—The British, American and Japanese ministers here have renewed their opposition to the Manchurian arrangements between China and Russia. It is probable that this action will result in the further postponement of the consummation of this treaty. The powers opposing the Manchurian treaty are now beginning to recognize the force of the representations of the Chinese plenipotentiaries, that China is making the best terms possible for herself, and incidentally for the equal rights of the peoples in China, and are shifting the responsibility to Russia as the responsible party.

TRANSFER OF I.C.R. DESIRED
Strong Belief in Ottawa That Something Starting Should Follow Enlarged C.P.R. Capital.
Cabinet Minister Sees the Possibility of the Company Getting Fast Atlantic Contract.
Ottawa, Feb. 6.—There has been an undoubted belief in well-informed circles here that something startling might be expected to follow upon the heels of the government grant to the C.P.R. of permission to enlarge its capital by twenty millions. It is suggested now that "something" may be defined in the report which comes from London that there is a move on foot to have the C.P.R. establish a fast Atlantic steamship line, and take over the Canadian government's part of the Atlantic contract.

FAST ATLANTIC C.P.R. LINE.
Matter Is Much Discussed in London, According to Reports.
London, Feb. 6.—The Tokyo correspondent of The Times says 105 copies of soldiers of the Avonmouth detachment, which was lost in the snow, have been recovered. The search was hampered by violent snowstorms. The purpose of the ill-fated expedition was to ascertain the possibility of utilizing the inland route for recovering the command of the coastguard vessel if that should be set by an enemy landing on the northern shore. Falling such possibility, there would be danger that the Avonmouth detachment would be isolated from the defence of the northern coast.

ARCHDUKE IN A BALLOON.
Leopold and His Wife Go 200 Miles in Four and a Half Hours.
Vienna, Feb. 6.—In accordance with a scientific plan, several simultaneous balloon ascensions were made to-day from various European capitals. Three ascensions were made from Vienna, the first being that of Archduke Leopold, who, for years, has been studying practical aeronautics. He used his new balloon called Meteor. He was accompanied by his wife, the Archduchess Blanche, who is daughter of Don Carlos, and who has been previously made four balloon trips. They were not accompanied by a professional aeronaut, their only attendant being an inexperienced aide-de-camp. The voyage was uneventful, and the Archduke landed safely at 1000 feet with perfect safety near Breslau, 200 miles from Vienna. The ascent was in an express train occupies eight hours. The maximum altitude attained by the Archduke was 10,000 feet.

PAPER SIGNED BY LEOPERS.

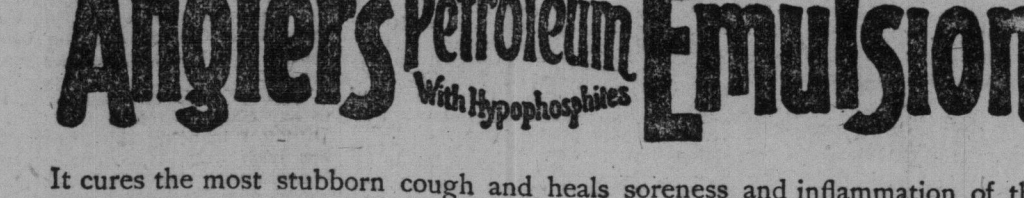
