ville. The parents were visiting.

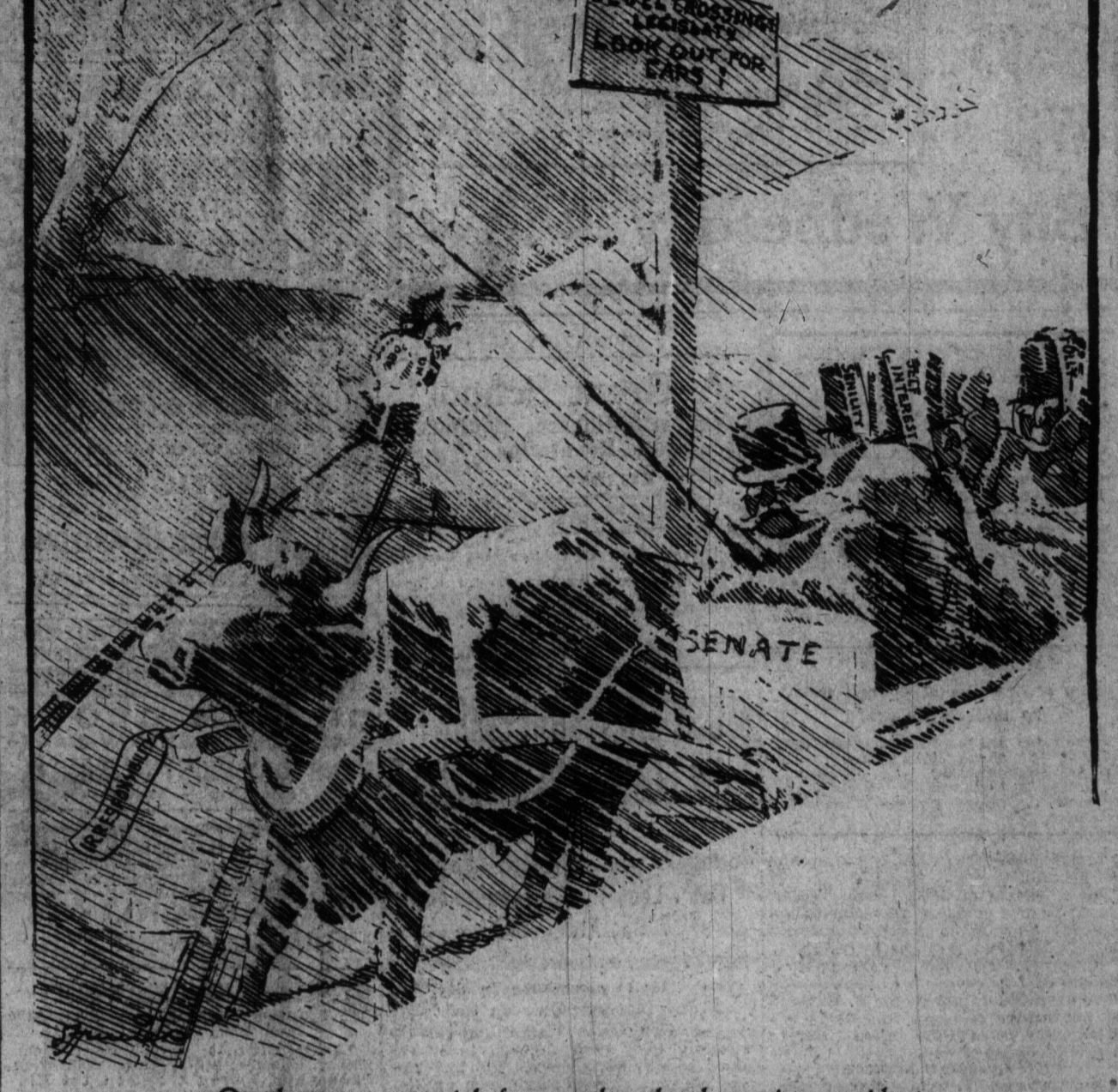
First Conservative Caucus.

AGAINST SELLING I. C. R.

North Toronto Conservatives Strongly
Favor Government Ownership.

"Resolved, that it would be in the
best interests of the Dominion to con-
tinue the Intercolonial Railway as a
government road, managed by a com-
mission," was the subject of a debate
held by the North Toronto Conserva-
tive Association in Cumberland Hall
last night.

Suicide Pact.

NORFOLK, W.Va., Jan. 18.—Having

Saskatchewan Guarantees Bonds.

REGINA, Sask., Jan. 18.—A bill was

lature to-day, providing for a guaran-
tee of the bonds of the Grand Trunk
Pacific and Canadian Northern to the
extent of \$25,000 per mile.

Speaker's Salary Boosted.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—By a vote
of 37 to 27, the United States senate
to-day fixed the salary of the Speaker
of the house of representatives at \$15-
000 instead of \$12,000, as at present.

M. & M. COMPANY
OFFER TO SELL
REJECTED

Winnipeg Council Will Proceed
at Once With Municipal
Power Plant—Asked
Price for Railway as
Going Concern.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 18.—The city
council has rejected the offer of D. D.
Mann, representing the Winnipeg Street
Railway, for the sale of the street rail-
way to the city, and will proceed at
once with the municipal power plant on
Winnipeg River.

The company's offer was:
(1) To sell its railway, lighting plant,
gas plant, assets, rights and undertak-
ing, subject to the bonds, at a value
to the city as a going concern, to be
determined by arbitration. The chair-
man of the arbitration board to be
agreed upon by the council and the
company, and one arbitrator to be ap-
pointed by each party afterwards. To
accept second mortgage 5 per cent,
twenty-year bonds, bearing interest,
payable half-yearly, guaranteed by the
city for the amount of the award.

(2) As a further alternative, the
company will agree to supply the city
upon the terms previously quoted in
our letter of Jan. 11, \$24,000, with the
quantity of power mentioned, delivered
to the consumer, and will undertake
in consideration of a contract being en-
tered into upon such lines for a period of
ten years, and of the city delaying pro-
ceedings with its own power during the
term of such contract, to make a fur-
ther reduction in commercial electric
lighting charges in Winnipeg by one-
fifth, or 20 per cent, immediately, and
to lease the city's tramway to its power
sites at 4 per cent, rental, and to
keep such tramway in running
order for the city until such time as
the city may require it, the city to have
the right, after three years, to deter-
mine this clause on giving one year's
notice.

(3) The company makes these offers
on condition that the same shall be ac-
cepted within reasonable time, and the
contractors should be willing to com-
pact with your committee with a view of
settling further details or modifications.

G.P.R. SWITCHMAN KILLED
MICHAEL CARNEY VICTIM

Trying to Reach Front Platform of
Van, He Fell Under Wheels
of Freight Train.

Mike Carney, a C.P.R. switchman, 21
years of age, living with his parents on
Marguerite-street, in West Toronto,
met with a shockingly sudden death
in the yards there shortly before 1
o'clock this morning.

No. 56, an eastbound freight train,
was just pulling into the station, when
Carney, who was at the rear, attempted
to jump on the front platform of the
van. He missed his footing and fell
under the wheels, which passed over
his body, cutting it in two.

The accident was noticed by the other
train hands, and the body was at once
picked up, but life was extinct.

Dr. Clendenen and Dr. Gilmour, the
latter a coroner, were at once sum-
moned, when Dr. Gilmour ordered the
removal of the body to Spenser's under-
taking parlour, where an inquest will
be held to-night at 8 o'clock.

Deceased was well known in the city,
and among the railway men, and was
a general favorite.

His father was for many years in the
employ of the G.P.R. as an engineer,
and is at present in receipt of a pen-
sion by reason of his long service.

CUT TO FIFTY LICENSES WITHOUT A DIVISION Markets Committee Puts Reduction Question Up to Hamilton City Council.

HAMILTON, Jan. 18.—(Special.)—Without a division this evening the markets committee decided to recommend the council to reduce the number of liquor licenses to 50. There are now 68 in force, but the commissioners have the right to issue 75. The council chamber was jammed with those in favor and those against a reduction. As the reductionists had a majority on the committee there was no division on the question and the council made five-minute speeches in favor of the reduction.

FORGED PEDIGREE OF HORSE. W. B. Williamson Found Guilty in the Sessions. W. B. Williamson was yesterday found guilty in the sessions on a charge of selling a Clydesdale mare, representing her to be "Jane Austin," registered with the Clydesdale Horse Society of Great Britain. It was alleged that he gave the purchasers, Robert Irwin and Thomas E. Morgan, a forged pedigree of "Jane Austin," and thus received \$175 by fraud. This certificate was filed at Ottawa, and when William Cochrane, the owner of the real "Jane Austin" came to register his mare, he found there was already a registration under that name. Williamson was accordingly charged with forging the certificate.

MURDER WILL OUT. In the current number of The Detective, an splendid police bulletin, is recorded the climax of a murder committed eight or ten years ago, in which Toronto's detective force played a large part in running the assailant to earth. It states that last week Vito Antonio Massimo, alias Luigi De Paolo, an Italian, was sentenced to ten years for stabbing Vito Tursello to death. Massimo was arrested June 25 last, while working in a sewer, by Detective Newton.

The only cure in sight for the public franchise troubles that exist in this country and in the United States today is the power to expropriate public service franchises, especially in cities and towns, and exercise this power should be based on an arbitration to ascertain the actual expenditure or physical value of the franchise, no regard being paid to the so-called claims of "vested interest" in the franchise.

In the Knoxville case, the supreme court made a significant reference to the stockholdings of the Water Company. Justice Moody, who delivered the opinion, said: "All, or substantially all, the preferred or common stock was issued to contractors for the construction of the plant, and the nominal amount of the stock issued was greatly in excess of the true value of the property furnished by the contractors."

The loss of the prestige of Great Britain in the last seven years in Canada is quite marked, and I am much impressed by the force of the warning of your correspondent that Great Britain is not soon prepared to reciprocate the preferential tariff, or at least to take measures to protect herself from impending disaster, Canada may be induced to play her own business game.

In doing this, the court intimated that the jurisdiction invoked ought only to be exercised in the clearest cases, and added that if a company declines to observe an ordinance of the nature indicated and went into court claiming it to be unconstitutional, the company must be prepared to show to the satisfaction of the court that the ordinance was so confiscatory as to be unconstitutional.

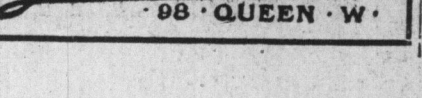

WONDERS OF THE WEST
TOLD CANADIAN CLUB

Peace River Country and Its Varied Resources Detailed by a Resident There for 50 Years.

"A young veteran" was the description given by Chairman McKay of Fred G. Lawrence, P.R.G.S., at the Canadian Club yesterday.

With the exception of the summer of 1883, spent in Chicago, and two years at the State University of Indiana, he has spent all his time there.

Along the banks of all the streams flowing east of the Hudson he has seen the Arctic Ocean, Mr. Lawrence declared, gold was to be found.

Petroleum is found in such quantities that Canadians need not go to Texas to be soaked in what they can be soaked at home, said Mr. Lawrence.

Bitumen in immense quantities, estimated at 8,000,000 tons by government experts, is found capable of supplying all the asphalt used, the consumption hitherto being only 200,000,000 tons altogether.

The largest gas well in the world is found not far from the Pelican Rapids on the Athabasca River, near the asphalt deposits.

On the Mackenzie River down to the Arctic spruce grows two feet in diameter. He had seen spruce on the Athabasca four feet in diameter.

While people thought the Peace River far off, they were going down to South America to develop that country. There were 65,000,000 acres of first-class agricultural land.

A world record was made in one field of wheat which was sown and harvested in eighty-six days. Seeding is generally done from April 20 till May 1.

When Fort Churchill is opened, wheat can be shipped to Liverpool more cheaply than from the United States. Prince Rupert lies directly west of the Peace River district.

Mr. Lawrence's uncle, H. H. Lawrence, tried an experiment in planting three pounds of very small potatoes and the crop resulting was 633 pounds.

Mr. Lawrence paid a compliment to the Northwest Mounted Police. "No man escapes there on a technicality," he declared in speaking of the magistrates who did their best to have the law observed.

The Peace, Athabasca and Mackenzie rivers drain a territory 100,000 miles larger than that of the Amazon and the great lakes. The Mississippi does not compare with the Mackenzie for navigation.

Herring come up the Mackenzie from the Arctic Ocean to Great Bear Lake, and fish are so plentiful fishing would be an advantage.

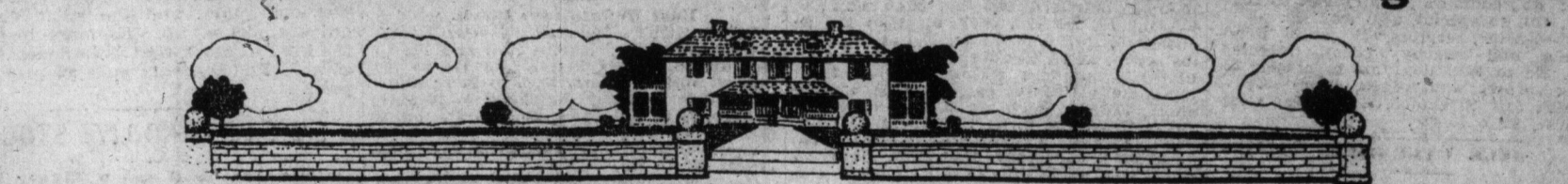
