Confident of Victory.

I am deeply grieved that so many My Lords and Gentlemen :

I am deeply grieved that so many valuable lives should have fallen a sacrifice but I have witnessed with pride and with heartlest gratification the patriotic eagerness and spontaneous loyalty with which my subjects in all parts of my dominions have come forward to share in the common defence of their Imperial interests. I am confident I shall not look to them in valu when I exhort them to sustain and renew their exertions until they have brought this struggle for the maintenance of the Empire and the assertion of its supremacy in South Africa to a victorious conclusion.

Samoan Treaty. A treaty has been concluded with the German Emperor for the adjustment of the rights caimed by the two countries in Samoa, Tonga and other Islands in the Pacific. To a portion of these stipulations the Government of the United States has also been a party.

Australian Federation.

A bill will be introduced at an early date to give effect to the scheme of federation which has been adopted after most careful consideration by five of my Australian colonies.

I have watched with cordial satisfaction the gradual development of my greater colonies into self-governing communities. I feel confident that the establishment of the great federation of Australia will prove advantageous not only to the colonies immediately concerned but also to the Empire at large.

Tribute to Colonial Loyalty.

qualities of the colonial forces engaged in South Africa have already earned high admiration, and patrictic offers of assistance, which it was not possible to accept, have come from many other colonies with populations of various races. I have received from the ruling thiefs of native states of India numerous offers to place their troops and the resources of their states at my disposal for service in South Africa. These proofs of their loyalty to myself and their devotion to the cause of my Empire liave afforded me much gratification.

I regret that, owing to insufficient rainfail in the autumn over a great part of Western and Central India, the harvests and pasturage have failed to such an extent as to create a famine. Timely measures have been taken by my Government and by the rulers of the native states affected to relieve the suffering and prevent starvation.

I regret to add that the epidemic of plague continues, and that, altho its severity has not increased since last year, there is at present no prospect of its diminution.

The War Estimates.

And we humbly express our regret at the want of foresight and judgment displayed by Her Majesty's advisers, as shown alike in their conduct of African affairs since 1895, and in their preparation for the war now proceeding.

Lord Fitzmaurice attacked Mr. Chamberlain's policy, especially his failure to punish the raiders and the retention of Mr. Cecil Rhodes as a member of the Privy Council, together with "irritating and reckless methods that plunged the country into war before any adequate preparations were possible."

Lord Balfour of Burleigh also said it was the duty of the Government to communicate with the Boer Government on the subject of increased armaments, but, as the first step, it ought to severely punish the raiders. The country had not reached a pass that if the Government appealed to it it would not have supported the Government in any preparations it thought necessary. He would do nothing to prevent the Government from carrying the war to a successful conclusion.



The World had at call yesterday from Prof. Odlum, M.A., B.Sc., who, as a Government official and newspaper man, has seen a great deal of the mineral fields of British Columbia. Eastern Canadians are more or less familiar with that part of the province extending away north for hundreds of miles, which promise exceedingly well. Mineral Resources.

"With the improved mining machinery used in placer operations great advantages accrue to those who are giving time and money for the discovery and the acquisition of gold. In Cariboo almost any man can find rich gold-bearing sand-sand gravel, but to find water and get a good dump for the dirt is the greatest difficulty to be met with by all placer miners.

"There is not much said of mining in Cariboo now, as it is an old story. Miners and prospectors of many years have now settled down to work in very much the same systematic manner in which the Ontarlo farmer goes along with the cultivation of his land. There are rich quartz mines in Cariboo, but, owing to the cost of getting in supplies, which have to be handled for hundreds of miles by horses and mules, very liftle has been done yet in the way of installing machinery. Until the railway is run north from the C.P.R. at Kamloops, Asheroft or Vancouver, quartz mining in Cariboo will remain at a standstill. Antimony has been found in large quantities north of and near Lytton. Antimony bearing ore is known to spread irregularly over thousands of acres. Large bodies of Binc have likewise been discovered north of Binc have likewise been discovered

The Second Road.

"Then comes a second plan of railway building, and many favor it in preference to the foregoing, or the third, mentioned later. Starting at Ashcroft, or somewhat bast on the C.P.R., the line would run thruthe rolling uplands of the great Cariboo plateau with an altitude of 2500 to 3500 feet east of Clinton and 150 Mile House to the Forks of Quesnelle, and thence down the river to Quesnelle Mouth.

"From this town the line would go up the Fraser Valley for 100 miles, and then turn westwards towards Hazelton and the Atlin district, with its final terminus pushed on into the Yukon Valley.

"The first 150 miles of this line would run thru a fairly good farming and grazing country, the second 150 miles thru farming, mining and lumbering areas, and the balance of the road would run thru mining and forest-bearing districts.

"The third and latest scheme for which a charter was secured from the Provincial Government last session has its starting point at the city of Vancouver. From this city it would cross Burrard Inlet, an arm of the sea, proceed up the Squamish River, thru Plitmeadows, a rich farming district, thence by Daisy, Seton and Anderson Lakes, tapping the Bridge River mining regions, and on to Lillooet, a very pretty mining town on the Fraser River, at an altitude of about 800 feet.

"From Lillooet it would go up the Fraser Valley, or thru the rich grazing and farming lands of Chilcotin and reach Quesnelle Mouth, from which place it would proceed north and west until it covered the entire distance to Dawson City.

"The these three railways cannot all be built at once, there will eventually be room for them all. In the meantime, some one of the three should be pushed forward with all speed. And it would be in the Interest of all Canada to have a great highway leading thru our rich upper country to the rich gold fields of the north.

"Bastern Canada has too often and too long neglected to give attention to our vast western wealth and areas. But when the great financial and mercantile houses, as well as the numerous factories realize of what immense advantage the west is to the east they will more readily give us a more inteligent and a more earnest assistance in opening up our country and developing its unlimited resources.

The British Empire League held a well-attended meeting last night in St. George's Hall. Sir Sandford Fleming read a paper upon the Pacific Cable. What was wanted was an absolutely independent service connecting all the colonies of the Empire with Great Britain. First, 'hant it is of vital importance to take prompt action in causing the Pacific cable to be proceeded with as a state undertaking and completed with the least possible delay.

Second. That the home 'Jovernment, the Government of New South Wales and other governments be earnessly asked not to assent to any agreement granting concessions to the Eastern Extension Company, which does not contain a clause reserving power to cancel such agreement in the events of the exigences of the public services demanding this.

Third. That the time has come when ultimate state proprietorship of all cables between British possessions should be kept prominently in view, and that therefore, in all agreements giving permission to lay new cables by private capital, a condition be attached empowering the Imperial Government to assume ownership in explicit terms.

Delays Since 1889,

The speaker enumerated the difficulties under which the Pacific cable scheme had labored, and gave an outline of the felays since 1889. Not a year ago, in July last, the colonies had appointed their representatives to a commission to look into the scheme, and everything was progressing favorably. But within the past week a press despatch had said that New South Wales was about to grant certain concessions to the Pastern Extension Company. This looked as if the hands of the monopoly were about to throttle the Pacific cable scheme.

He advocated the necessity of a deep-sea cable, absolutely independent of foreign nations, and this was necessary for the concentration of Britain's navy, upon which Britain's life relied.

Rev. Dr. Potts seconded the resolution and held that the Empire should be guarded at every point and the Pacific cable was an important factor of protection.

A. E. Kemp, in endorsing the resolution, said Canada had signified her willingness to bear five-eighteenths of the expense, equal to Britain's share, and this was a fact that should show Britain Canada was in earnest.






