The times in the above table are to be added to or subtracted from the time of high water at Halifax, according to the directions there given. Example—To find the time of high water at Cape Sable, May 10, 1827. The time of high water at Halifax, May 10, by the calendar is 6 hours 36 minutes; to this add 30 minutes (time set against Cape Sable in the table) and you have the time of high water at Cape Sable, 7 hours 6 minutes.

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## ECLIPSES IN 1827.

There will be four Eclipses in the year 1827, two of the sun and two of the moon, in the following order:-

1st. The first will be of the sun on the evening of the 25th of April, at 10 hours 48 min. D's lat.  $51\frac{1}{2}$  min. North; the sun will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 11 hours 26 min. in long.  $125^{\circ}$  degrees east, and lat.  $87^{\circ}$  deg.  $31$  min. North.

2d. The second will be of the moon on the morning of the 11th of May, partial and visible, as follows:

Beginning at 2 hours 33 minutes.

Middle at 4 hours 6 minutes.

Ecliptic Opposition & - 4 hours 11 minutes.

Moon sets - 4 hours 55 minutes.

End of the eclipse - 5 hours 39 minutes.

Digits eclipsed - 11 5 6 on the moon's southern limb.

3d. The third will be of the sun on the 20th of October, the conjunction will take place in the morn. at 11 h. 33 min. in long. 6 signs,  $26^{\circ}$  deg.  $23\frac{1}{2}$  min.; D's lat.  $48\frac{1}{2}$  min. south; the sun will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 0 h. 7 min. P. M. in long.  $65\frac{1}{2}$  deg. west, and lat.  $69^{\circ}$  neg. 40 min. south.

4th. The fourth and last will be of the moon on the evening of the 3d of November, at 1 hour 0 min. consequently invisible. This eclipse will be visible to every part of Great Britain, the obscuration being about  $10\frac{1}{2}$  digits on the moon's northern limb.

♀ Venus will be morning star until the 7th of October, from that time evening star throughout the year.

*Beautiful Admonition.* The Hindoos, in baptizing their infants address to them this beautiful admonition: "Little babe, thou enterest the world weeping while all around smile; continue so to live that you may depart in smiles whilst all around you weep."

Extravagance is a great enemy to charity. So much is required for ostentatious show, to keep up the appearance of gentility, and to pamper the luxurious, that nothing can be spared to the miserable.

*Cure for a Cough.*—Take a lump of alum of the bigness of a hen's egg, put it into a quart of good molasses and simmer it over the fire in an earthen vessel till the alum is dead, and when cool take a spoonful as you feel the cough coming on, and in a short time you will get relief.

*To cure the Piles.*—Take hog's lard eight parts, nutgalls one part; pulverize the galls very fine, and sift through a very fine sieve; then rub what comes through the sieve to a powder. Melt the lard, add the galls, and stir it till cold. Apply it to the parts affected several times a day.

Take from 20 to 30 drops of the balsam of Capaiva on a little sugar, each night, and the yolk of an egg immediately after it.

*Cure for Weak Eyes.*—Take a small lump of white copperas—say about the size of a pea; put it in a small phial, holding about two ounces of water; carry this in the pocket, and occasionally taking out the cork, turn the phial up on the finger's end, and thus bathe the eyes.—This will positively effect a real cure in a short time.

*Infallible cure for chapped lips.*—Dissolve a lump of beeswax in a small quantity of sweet oil, over a candle, let it cool and it is ready for use. Rubbing it WARM on the lips, two or three times, will effect a cure.

*Method of taking spots of Ink from Linen.*—Take a mould candle, the tallow of which is commonly of the poorest kind; melt it, and dip the spotted part of the linen in the melted tallow; then put it to the wash. It will come perfectly white from the hands of the laundress, and there will never be any hole in the spotted part.

*Cheap Paint.*—Take a pound of potatoes, skinned and well baked, bruise them in three or four times that weight of boiling water, and pass them through a hair sieve. Add two pounds of fine chalk in powder, mixed with double its weight in water, and stir the whole well together. This mixture will form a glue, to which any coloring matter may be added, even charcoal, brick or soot, which will make a cheap and durable paint for barns, &c.

*Fish Manure.*—Extract of a letter.—“I have recently paid a visit to my particular friend Charles S. Sewall, Esq. of Hartford county, where I saw the advantages of manuring land with fish, and it is somewhat astonishing to me that more attention is not paid to making land rich where fish are to be caught plentifully.—Mr Sewall has a large body of land, and that which I saw on Bush River was of a cold barren soil. I do not think the arable land there, with the best management, would produce more than three bushels of wheat to the acre: Last year Mr S. commenced manuring with fish, and succeeded very well; he prepared about 60 acres, and it will pay him well for his trouble. Indeed I do not think the fields of wheat I saw two years since, at Col. Lloyd's, upon the Eastern Shore, could have been superior to that of Mr Sewall's.—From the Baltimore Patriot.

*To destroy Rats and Mice.* Mix flour of malt with some butter, and add thereto a drop or two of oil of anniseed; make it up into balls, and bait your traps therewith. If your house contains thousands, by this means you may take them all.

*Bed Bugs.*—Of the various recipes for the extirpation and prevention of these vermin, the following have been found by experience, the most effectual

Take of the highest rectified spirit of wine, half a pint; newly distilled oil, or spirit of turpentine, half a pint; mix them together, and crumble into it an ounce of camphor, which will dissolve in a few minutes; shake the whole well together, and with a piece of sponge, or brush dipped into it, anoint the bed, or furniture, in which those vermin harbour and breed; and it will infallibly kill and destroy both them and their nests. Should any bug, or bugs, happen to appear after once using it, the application must be repeated, and at the same time some of the mixture poured into the joints and holes of the bedstead and head board. Beds that have much wood work, require to be first taken down, before they can be thoroughly cleared of these vermins; but others may be perfectly cured without that trouble. It is advisable to perform this work in the day time, lest the spirit contained in the mixture take fire from the candle, while using it, and occasion serious damage;

Or, dissolve 100 grains of corrosive sublimate in a pint of brandy, or whisky; use it with the feather of a quill.

COW HOUSE.

Farmer Fudge may turn up his nose, if he pleases, and think he needs no eaching in this matter. I shall take the liberty to give my opinion about Cow House though to be sure it is rather late in the season.

The floor should be tight and descending a little backwards, that the stale or urine may not be lost. Let it be conveyed to the cellar, if you have one or to the sides of the dung heap. The slovenly and negligent farmer may think this is being too nice and exact; but I assure you that the urine of cattle is most valuable, containing abundance of rich salts, oils, &c. The floor over the cattle should be so tight as to prevent the falling of dust, chaff &c. and so high that a man need not stand in fear of having his head broken by it. Many of our old fashioned cow stalls or stables are none too high for a pigsty; and a man when he would enter one must squat like a goose to save his brains. Let it be of good width also, that the dung may be shovelled back and not discommode the milkmaid. Let the door have a good fastening and the windows good shutters to keep out the cold and storm.

*Method of making excellent butter from the milk of cows fed upon turnips.*—Let the vessels in which the milk is put be kept constantly clear and well scalded with boiling water before using. When the milk is brought into the dairy; to every 6 quarts of milk add one quart of boiling water then put up the milk into the bowls to stand for cream.

Attend to your water courses, so that your land may receive all possible benefit from irrigation. If you have any land (especially mowing lots) which is so situated that you can turn the wash of a public highway over it, you will act wisely in availing yourself of that circumstance. The wash of the roads, early in spring, is highly charged with fertilizing particles, and one pail full of it is worth a barrel of that which flows from a summer shower; and if you do not look out in season, it will find its way to some brook, and suddenly take French leave of your premises. Get your farming tools in readiness before the hurry of business comes on. Let the wooden part of those implements, which are exposed to weather be well seasoned and painted. I don't much believe in sending your son John to college, unless he has something besides laziness to recommend him. The professions are now so crowded, that unless they skin and devour each other, like shipwreck'd mariners, I don't see how one fourth part can get a living.

ECONOMY.—Some persons are ashamed of this virtue, for a virtue it is, and the reverse of it, wastefulness, is a sin. Many are penurious, and they call it being economical. True economy is to spend only what one can afford. Some people will sooner spend what they cannot afford than say, 'I can't afford it.'

## ASPARAGUS.

This is a most valuable plant. It is highly esteemed and easily cultivated. No green which the spring produces is of more account, and it is truly astonishing, when it is so easily procured, why our farmers in the interior do not raise it in greater abundance. It serves both for meat, sance and bread, with the help of a little butter and salt.

To raise asparagus, the soil should be the best in your garden, moderately light and yielding. Open a trench three feet wide and 12 inches deep. The warmer the place the better. Fill the trench half full of good dung; sprinkle over the rich earth making it level, and then place the roots upon it 8 or 9 inches apart. If you have not roots, then take seed and place them half that distance, and cover with rich earth. Roots will produce shoots fit to eat the 2d year, but seeds will require another year.

It is no matter howsoon you sow your peas, spring wheat, flax and oats, if the frost is out of the ground. Plant some of the earliest sort of potatoes, Repair and build fences, and if you should make them a little higher, and stronger than absolute necessity demands, you will be "on the safe side of

Do not be in too great haste to turn your cattle into your pastures before the turf has become a little dry, and in some degree consolidated, and the grass has obtained a pretty good beginning of its growth. If you let your cattle, early in the spring, tread your pastures into something like hasty-pudding, and bite off every blade of grass the moment it peeps from the surface of the soil, your summer feed will be next to nothing. Divide your pasture ground into four or five divisions. Let your milch cows take the first bite, then your horses and oxen, and sheep last of all. In planting Indian Corn, steep your seed, for about twenty four hours before planting, in strong tar water, in which a little salt, or salt petre has been dissolved, then roll it in plaster, and it will grow like Jonah's gourd, and the crows and blackbirds will no more meddle with it than if it were ratsbane. In planting corn place the seeds four or five inches apart. Ventilate your cellars, scald, rinse and bung tight your cider casks.

## BUTTER.

A wake, awake, my sweet dairy maids !  
 To your milk pans quick repair ;  
 Nor suffer the burning rays of the sun  
 To curdle the cream so fair.

In this warm season, your milk should remain in the pail till nearly cool before it is strained, and, by putting a little hot water to it, your cream will rise in greater abundance. Let your pans be large and broad. Never wait, in hot weather, till sun rise before you skim the pans. Twenty four hours is long enough for the milk to stand, except in winter, when it may remain in the pans 36 or 48 hours. After the butter is churned, it should immediately be washed in several waters to cleanse it from the milk; and in working it, you will find two pieces of wood convenient to be used, for the hand is too warm and is apt to soften it; and some hands will give it a sort of greasy appearance. Now, should my lady of the churn happen to be a snuff taker, O ! in mercy deliver me from the filthy produce of her dairy.

Listen now to what the farmer of Marlborough said in 1798 on this subject. "The last year," said he, "three cows in this town produced 278 pounds of butter. If their calves had been taken from them at a week old, they would have made 451 pounds of butter. These three cows were a more productive dairy than six usually are, with ordinary feed. Farmers egregiously mistake when they overstock their farms. Were dairies estimated by the pails of milk they produce, instead of the number of cows, many farmers' wives, instead of asking their husbands to buy another cow, would urge them to sell two to enrich their dairies."

No animals that we keep are more profitable than cows. Farmers acknowledge this, yet few practise according to their belief. Some will keep seven or eight poor, miserable things, which will not average more milk or butter than two good ones, and yet how far more expensive is their keeping.

HOGSTY.—A good hogsty is a thing of more importance than many think for. A part of it should be close and warm with a tight roof over it. The other part where the trough is placed should be open.

Take the whites of six eggs with a handful of fine beach sand, washed clean; stir them well together; then boil a quart of molasses down to a candy, and cool it by pouring in cider, and put this together with the eggs and sand into a barrel of cider, and mix the whole together. It will keep for many years, and be good enough for kings, emperors and governors.

There is another kind of cider, which some seem to prefer, and is made in the following manner, viz.: Let your apples lie till they are thoroughly rotten; then take some warm day and grind them up, and immediately press out the juice, and put it up into barrels containing fly blows, rats dung and maggots. Throw in a few handfuls of bird lime and old tobacco ends, and to each barrel five pailfuls of duck water. Bung it up with an old stocking, and it will be fit for use from the cask or bottling at any time. This liquor is preferred to that made in any other manner. Its delicate flavor is equal to the effluvia of a jakes; and the effervescence has sometimes been so powerful as to overturn a cart.

## THE MEAT TUB.

Give me a good sweet barrel. Take 4 quarts of salt, 8 ounces saltpetre, and 5lbs. brown sugar. The juices will make brine enough, if it is well packed. THE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

**S**AMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note.—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a-breast of Chebucto Head, run N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. for the south point of George's Island.

When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

**Burning Glasses.**—Lences of a large diameter are able to melt metals in a few seconds, on which common fires and even glass house furnaces have produced no effect.—M. Villette, a Frenchman, nearly a century ago, constructed a mirror three feet eleven inches in diameter, and three feet two inches in focal distance, which melted copper ore in eight seconds, iron ore in twenty four seconds, a fish's tooth in thirty two seconds, cast iron in sixteen seconds, a silver sixpence in seven seconds, and tin in three seconds. This mirror condensed the solar rays seventeen thousand two hundred and fifty seven times, a degree of heat which is about four hundred and ninety times greater than common fire.
