ANNUAL MEETING.

The 58th Annual Meeting of the Grande-Ligne Mission was held on the 9th of October, at 2.30 o'clock, p.m., in the French Baptist Church, (l'Oratoire) in the City of Montreal.

Mr. A. A. Ayer, the President, occupied the chair.

The meeting was opened with singing and prayer.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and adopted.

The Secretary then read the 58th Annual Report, which set forth most encouraging features, in all the new fields, and many of the older ones.

The Treasurer presented the Financial Statement, also the Report of the Endowment and Building Fund, which on motion were adopted, and with the Secretary's Report, were referred to a Committee for publication.

The Board met at the close of the Annual Meeting and elected A. A. Ayer, President ; J. Richards, Treasurer ; Rev. T. Lafleur, Secretary ; Rev. E. Bosworth, Field Secretary.

At 8 p.m. a platform meeting was held in the same church. There was a large attendance, and interesting addresses were delivered by Rev. W. T. Graham, on the history of the Jesuits ; Rev. E. Bosworth, on financial conditions ; Rev. A. Burwash, on the work in Quebec, and Rev. W. B. Hinson, on encouragements to be drawn from the mission's origin in prayer ; its growth in the sanctified life of its missionaries, and therefore its assured ultimate success.

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FIFTY-EIGHTH
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The Grande=Ligne Mission.

We desire to record our thanksgiving to Almighty God for the favor which has graciously rested upon the work of the Grande Ligne Mission during the past year.

As we stand face to face in the Province of Quebec with a million and a half of our own fellow countrymen, over eighty per cent of whom are more or less in the darkness of Romanism, we feel appalled with the magnitude of our work and the deep need of this people.

Notwithstanding the many opposing forces, we are thankful to say that the past year has been one of the most successful in the history of the Mission; our evangelists in delivering their message, have called forth the fierce opposition and the anger of those who are always ready to fight either for or against religion, so that once more it has been said, "these men who have turned the world upside down are come hither also." It is because they are themselves upside down in their religious views that they are so disturbed; it is like learning once more that the earth is moving instead of the sun.

But why is not this Gospel more generally received? Because a great many have already the sort of religion they like; a religion with some doctrinal truths, full of compromises with the foibles of human nature, or beliefs in sacramental, or ritual, or magical efficacy, where real spirituality is unknown; and because the religion of the Gospel is far too exacting in morality for their taste. The teaching of Romanism has (in Convents and Jesuitical schools especially) so thoroughly weakened the moral conscience that it will take a long time to mould it into a fit vehicle for moral and spiritual power. In our work, we have not only to sow the

good seed on virgin soil, but to bring back a badly cultivated land overrun with *mauvaises herbes* (weeds) to its pristine vigor, hence our efforts for the good tuition and training of the young. Here at least we have the advantage of working on a new soil, without the complication of false teaching, already received, influencing the heart. If we neglect this important work, a little later on (after catechism and confirmation) many a child will say, "we have a religion of our own, and we have priests to teach us." Unable as we seem to be to reach the educated and influential class of our French people, we are creating an educated and influential community in our churches and by our teaching institutions. We are thoroughly convinced, that though before God one soul is worth as much as another; in this life and in the present conditions of society, one cultivated and enlarged soul spiritualised, will have more influence for good and for drawing others to the truth than an ignorant and incapable one.

Feller Institute.—The school at Grande-Ligne opened last October with every room filled and outside rooms rented, and yet there were over fifty applications that we could not entertain. The class of students was exceedingly bright, a deep spiritual interest pervaded the school and although no baptisms were recorded, a number of conversions took place.

Our work was broken in upon twice during the session by an outbreak of Scarlet Fever. One of our students died, the first student that ever passed away in the Mission building.

We have this year matriculated two young men into McMaster University, who have the ministry in view, and two others into McGill, who have medicine before them. During the year the Principal's residence has been built, almost all of the funds being specially provided by kind interested friends.

Schools.—In addition to Feller Institute, we have maintained primary schools at several points, while at Coaticooke, the work opened up two years ago bids fair to accomplish much good. The Misses Stobo have charge and are much encouraged in their work.

Colportage.—This work we regard as fundamental, for through it, we become acquainted with the condition of the people and find out "who among them are worthy." By the Colporteur, many a seed is dropped that will blossom into fruitage in days that are yet to come. An opening has presented itself in the

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County of Megantic. This County was formerly settled by English-speaking people, but little by little they have been driven out by French colonization. Here was situated the old English-speaking Baptist Church of Inverness, the right of which has almost, if not altogether gone out. A few months ago, a Colporteur of the Quebec Bible Society and formerly a student at the Feller Institute Robert Keane, was baptized. He had labored in this county and knew who among them were favorable to the truth. He is now employed by our Board, visiting from house to house and arranging for forthrightly meetings; we endeavor to assist him from the city of Quebec. We are hoping for great success here.

In the City of Quebec, the labors of Brother Grenier have not been without blessing, he has done much in preparing the way for the work in which Rev. A. Burwash has occupied such a prominent position.

In Montreal, Madame Scott has gone quietly about her work with great wisdom and zeal. The spirit of this consecrated woman is truly apostolic. Sometimes she is rudely expelled from the home, and at others threatened with arrest as a bad woman and a seller of bad books; yet still humbly and faithfully she pursues her work, always looking for opportunities to tell of Jesus' love.

In Ontario we have endeavored to prosecute the work of colportage with some measure of success. During the summer, Miss Piché, a teacher at Feller Institute, has been laboring as Bible Woman in conjunction with Miss Frith at St. Eugene. She reports many French Romanists accessible to the truth, some of whom have retained possession of copies of God's Word despite the threatenings of the Priest. Brethren Marcotte and Thibaudeau have done good work in the Valley of the Ottawa. The results from our colportage work are everywhere encouraging.

Sorel.—In our last Report reference was made to persecutions and imprisonment. We succeeded in upsetting the judgment of the Recorder who fined and committed to prison Colporteur Gendreau. The Roman Catholic Judge, before whom the case was finally tried, lectured the Recorder for his unjust decision and treatment of a man who was doing the community no harm. Even in the face of this great victory, our missionary has been threatened, the Mayor and Chief of Police have informed him that they could afford no protection, while members have been systematically

boycotted, and denied employment. Yet steady progress has been made, and during the year 13 members baptized and added to the little church.

There are now 28 members. Rev. Mr. Coté reports fully 200 Romanists who are accessible to his visits and teachings.

The congregations are good, and the prayer meetings excellent.

The appeal of Dr. Morehouse brought forth fruit, and we trust the "*Shame of Sorel*" will ere long be turned to glorious results, from the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Maskinongé.—The brave little band have EVERY ONE STOOD FIRM, notwithstanding reports to the contrary, and are growing in grace and knowledge of the truth. To their number 5 have been added by baptism, including 2 women. The trials of some of the members have been very severe. The *hesitancy* of the wives, last year, has in some cases changed to *rage*. On baptismal occasions a large number of Catholics are present and listen attentively to the preaching of the gospel and seem to be deeply moved by the impressive ordinance.

On the 16th of September 54 Catholics were in the church, and as many more stood outside and listened.

Among the baptisms this year are the husband of the only woman who was baptized when the church was organized 2 years ago, and the aged mother of one of the Deacons, who is over 82 years of age.

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Opportunities for preaching the gospel have opened up in surrounding parishes and the missionary frequently talks with Catholics in homes, by the way side, and in stores, concerning "the way, the truth, and the life."

Since our last report, the beautiful Church and Parsonage have been completed, and were opened 31st October, 1893. It stands near the river, facing the great, massive Roman Catholic church, and is admirably situated, so that every passer by on the public road, or by railway train, cannot fail to see it.

Quebec.—Early in the Spring of this year it was thought best to concentrate the efforts of Evangelist Burwash in special work in the City of Quebec. It was the end of July, however, before the Hall (Salle) was secured at 83 Bridge Street, in St. Rochs, a densely populated Catholic portion of the City. It was reckoned impossible to maintain Evangelistic services in the midst

of these masses where ignorance and superstition reign, and the mob rule.

When thousands gathered on August 6th, to howl and threaten to kill, and actually did completely smash in the front windows, leaving more than a bushel of stones inside the place, the prophecies seemed all too true. God reigns, and when He wills, He prepares the way. Not a little had been said in French Romanist papers concerning the P. P. A.—the boycotting of Catholics,—and the unfair treatment of the French people, because of their religion.

The tables are now turned. What could they do, in view of what already had been printed and circulated in their press, but call off the rioters and make some attempt to denounce this interference with individual rights. Lessons have yet to be taught the Catholics of Quebec concerning real religious liberty. Thus, Romanists and political exigencies have ministered to the furtherance of the gospel.

The city authorities repaired the damage done, and put the Hall in good order, since which date services have been continued almost daily but not without molestation. The Catholic mob learn lessons of religious toleration slowly.

A strong force of police have guarded the building, and the French public press, as never before, has had much to say, concerning "these Baptists" and the Grande Ligne Mission.

Seldom have the meetings been held without from 15 to 20 Catholics being present, and at times as many as 75 to 100 were in attendance. Revs. W. S. Bullock and Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Therrien have rendered valuable assistance in these gatherings. Many young men are deeply interested in our services, and we trust they will soon embrace the truth of the gospel. Rev. A. L. Therrien, L. O. Côté and others will give assistance as necessity demands.

Our hope and purpose is to continue these services through the winter.

Canaan.—After several visits to the Ottawa Valley, with varying results, our Evangelist met with a remarkable case in the conversion of Mr. J. Phileon at Canaan, Ont. This brave spirit, had almost alone, fought against the priest's attempt to turn the public school into a Separate Catholic School. Aided by a few friends an independent school building was erected, so that our

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missionary found both the place and the opportunity to preach the gospel to those who were ready to receive it. The now famous discussion with the priest, soon followed.

Nine Roman Catholics have been baptized into the fellowship of the Rockland Church, and others are reading the Scriptures and are enquiring the way of life.

The building erected for a Separate School has been made over to Treasurer Richards personally in trust, pending the passage of an Act that will entitle the Grande Ligne Mission to hold property in Ontario.

Student Marcotte, from Grande Ligne, has been labouring on this field during the summer months.

Montreal.—This has been a trial year for this city church. What *can* one man do among 200,000 Romanists? Should we not provide more helpers for this important field and start a Hall (Salle) work similar to that in Quebec, and trust the Lord for the money to carry it on. Several families have moved from the city. The sad necessity of pruning has resulted in three members being expelled. Nevertheless, much good has been accomplished, the services are well attended, the prayer meetings are large, thus indicating a good spiritual tone, four persons have been added to the church by baptism, and the good name of this church and its pastor is maintained throughout the city and the province.

Grande-Ligne.—Pastor Parent reports that there are 156 Protestants in this field, 64 being church members; there have been no baptisms on account of sickness, the Catholics in this vicinity wish to live good neighbors that is all and with but few exceptions remain indifferent. Without being very devout, our people are good zealous Protestant christians, ever ready to do a good deal to induce others to follow the truth; and whenever one of our protestants, member of the church or not, finds a man or woman, boy or girl, who can be induced to come to our meetings or to the Mission School, he tries to bring them. I know of no one among our flock who would not go *ten miles to carry a Bible* to a Roman Catholic who was willing to read it. The fact of our being able to secure a Post Office called "Grande-Ligne," near our own doors, after the old one at the station had its name changed last year, has caused the whole surrounding country to feel that we are of some importance. The opponents of the new Roman

Catholic parish have carried their case to the Privy Council, at a large expense to the dissentient Catholics. Father Chiniquy recently visited Grande-Ligne which he had not seen for thirty-four years; he spoke several times to crowded congregations, chiefly Protestants, though a few prominent Roman Catholics were present. He expressed himself as delighted with what he saw, and said "what a great, substantial, glorious work you have done here."

South Ely.—This old church reports cheering results. Pastor Cesan ministers to a happy church, now increased to 45 members, 7 having joined by baptism during the year, from families recently come out from Romanism.

Magog.—French Protestants here live far apart, 7 or 8 catholic families receive the missionary's visits kindly, among whom he has distributed 7 New Testaments and some reading matter.

Roxton Pond.—Pastor Brouillet reports 20 Roman Catholic families where he has free access, and with many of them he has religious conversations; but results are not apparent as they seldom come to church. But there are many who are nominally Roman Catholics, while in reality they are Protestants, of whom he has great hopes.

St. Pie.—Rev. N. Gregoire, recently settled, reports 60 French Protestants, but very few church members; services on Sunday well attended; Roman Catholics remarkably well disposed towards us; but only come to the services on special occasions. As it is an excellent field for work, many Catholics receiving visits kindly, he hopes to do something by special services and by circulating more reading matter.

Waterloo.—This is a new field only occupied for about four months by our young brother, Rev. M. L. Dutaud. He reports good meetings both on Sundays and week days; he has visited families in all the surrounding section; in one instance a meeting with the parish priest was arranged, but the priest failed to appear, while our missionary was present to the surprise of the Catholics. Three have been baptized.

St. Constant, St. Philippe and Lapigeonniere.—Student L. A. Therrien reports 60 French Protestants scattered over these three places, who ought, under proper care and teaching,

to be the means of evangelizing others, as they seem to be zealous, and he hopes for a revival among them.

Marieville.—Pastor Lebeau reports 140 French Protestants in this field. He has large congregations on Sunday mornings, fine and promising youths filling the pews. A few Roman Catholic families are accessible but seldom come to church. He reports but one baptism, and is praying for a revival on this old field.

St. Johns.—Our hearts have been pained that we felt constrained to remove Mr. Gregoire to the larger and more promising field of St. Pie. We hope the day is not far distant when this field may be again opened to the Gospel work.

Clarenceville.—This is more of a Home Mission field, and yet Grande-Ligne has done its part in the support, and as in former years, reaped results. Student Usher has visited several Catholic families, some of whom occasionally attend services.

Difficulties.—In the prosecution of our work, we meet a people who believe in the magical efficacy of relics, the intercession of saints, and who (while they will not acknowledge that they worship images) venerate images large or small, representing the saints, and thus in their dense ignorance and superstition, render blind submission to the priests and the church. This system puts the image in the place of the living Christ; the scapular in the place of the Father's care, and a human saint in the place of the Divine mediator. Even when they are convinced of the truth, when coming out from the Romish church means the loss of means of earning their daily bread, and possibly exile from their native land, it requires brave hearts, touched by the Divine Spirit, before this great sacrifice can be made; thus it is no wonder the actual membership in our Grande-Ligne churches is so small. But the people are beginning to assert themselves, no less than seven parishes are in rebellion against their Bishops and Priests, among the number being the Parish of St. Blaise newly formed around Grande-Ligne itself.

It may be of interest to give a reference here to the provisions of law under which this case arose.

Under Articles 3360 and following of the Revised Statutes of Quebec, provision is made by which the Roman Catholic Ecclesiastical authorities may, with the consent of a majority of

the freeholders in any Roman Catholic diocese, by observing certain formalities, erect a new canonical parish, dismember or sub-divide, unite two or more, or alter the bounds of any existing parishes; and further, that the new canonical parish so formed, shall, on certain other formalities being observed, be recognized for all civil purposes.

In the present case the ecclesiastical authorities proceeded, as they claim, in conformity with these provisions of law, to the erection of a new parish known as St. Blaise, made up of parts of three existing parishes, including the part of the parish in which the Feller Institute is situated.

It will therefore be seen that the rights of the Protestant freeholders who were to be included in the proposed new Parish, are directly affected. They were entirely ignored, for if they had been considered, the petition would not have been supported by a majority of the freeholders. The objection taken was overruled and the new parish erected.

In the suit taken to set aside the decree, *not*, let it be borne in mind, as to its purely canonical and ecclesiastical bearing, but as to its civil effect under the Statute, and affecting all freeholders, Protestants and Romanists alike,—the Superior Court held that it had no jurisdiction, that the ecclesiastical authorities alone had the right to deal with such cases; this was confirmed by the Court of Appeals (Judge Hall dissenting). The case, as already stated, has been carried to the Privy Council, which granted special leave for the Appeal, and it comes before that Court directly on the question of the right of the Civil Courts to exercise jurisdiction in such matters.

OUR HELPERS.

We are pleased to notice increased liberality and larger contributions to all purposes from the Mission churches.

While all our churches are missionary churches, and their pastors missionaries, some of our brethren are chiefly or exclusively employed in the work of evangelization, looking for new openings, or making them wherever they can have access to new fields. Our general Evangelist, Rev. A. Burwash, has been busy during the year, as his report will show, with his associates, Grenier,

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Keane, Marcotte, Gendreau, Thibaudeau and Dutaud, at Quebec, Charlebourg, in the Ottawa Valley, Rockland and Sarsfield.

Coupled with this will be found the reports of our Bible Woman in Montreal, Mrs. Scott, and of Miss Piché in Ottawa Valley and elsewhere.

While this has been done in missionary work proper, our indefatigable Field Secretary, Rev. E. Bosworth, has visited Churches, Sunday Schools, Associations and Conventions, to revive and extend the interest in this most philanthropic, and patriotic, and christian work. As usual, we are again very much indebted to the different Ladies' Associations who have so generously contributed to our Treasury, especially the Brooklyn, the Philadelphia, the Toronto, the Ottawa and Montreal Associations. We repeat this year our thanks to the Associational Secretaries, for their kind help in circulating literature among the churches, and for their efforts in obtaining offerings for the Mission. We also recognize our grateful indebtedness to the pastors of churches and superintendents of Sunday Schools all over the large field for kind and devoted co-operation in our work. In this we especially include those of the Maritime Provinces, where in answer to their generous efforts to help us, we are undertaking to provide a suitable laborer among the French population in their midst. It was in view of this that our general evangelist, Mr. Burwash, visited some portions of that field last spring. Twice we thought we had secured the right men to send, when unfavorable circumstances came in the way, the last case being that of Colporteur Gendreau who has had to go to the hospital for a painful operation. We still hope ere long to fulfil our endeavor to send there a suitable and a God sent laborer. Among the many kind auxiliaries of our work, we are happy to recall a debt of gratitude we owe to the generous little English Baptist Church in Quebec, which from the beginning of the work of evangelization there, has been a devoted helper in many ways. Thanks to them for this long standing fraternal interest.

By the energetic labors of the Rev. C. E. Amaron, and his catholic spirit helped by generous and large minded christian business men, the French Protestants in Montreal and elsewhere have succeeded in putting the "L'Aurore" Newspaper on a better footing to meet the wants of our day, by defending our religious views and proclaiming on the printed page, in various ways and

by divers pens, the immortal living truths of the Gospel. The paper is not yet all we could wish, but we are thankful for the good beginning; and we want much help, intellectually, pecuniarily and spiritually, to make a mighty organ for good among Protestants and Catholics; a visitor feared by hypocrites and evil doers and loved by all lovers of truth.

Our Report shows 43 baptisms in all, but every one knows that those coming forward to confess their faith represent a much larger number, a multitude indeed who have been educated and religiously influenced. Thus the influence of our labor goes on penetrating the masses here and there, forcing the light of the truth into many minds, who still have not the courage to make it known. We are thus moulding character and lives quite widely in this province, and the mass is quietly but surely being leavened by the Gospel and its divine and mysterious power. It will have to yield some day. Our work will bear fruit abundantly if our lives bear out our principles. "Therefore," as the great apostle wrote, "My beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

ENGLISH.—Lemie's, Bullion's and Meiklejohn's Complete Grammar, series of Gage's Readers, Bell's Elocutionist, MacLear's Old Testament History, critical study of Traveller, Deserted Village and other authors.

LATIN.—Harper's Inductive Method, Harkness' Latin Grammar, Bradley's Arnold Latin Composition, Caesar, Virgil, Cicero, Smith's Latin Lexicon.

GREEK.—Harper's Inductive Greek, Goodwin's Greek Grammar, Abbott's Arnold Greek Composition, Zenophon, Homer, Liddell and Scott's Lexicon.

BIBLE.—Cours de Controverse, Recolin's Cours de Religion, Bonnefon and Decoppet's Histoire de l'Ancien Testament, Bonnefon's Histoire du Nouveau Testament.

MATHEMATICS.—Smith and McMurchy's Elementary Arithmetic, Hamblin Smith's Arithmetic, Todhunter's Algebra, Todhunter's Euclid, High School Book-keeping, Hamblin Smith's Elem. Trigonometry.

PIANO.—N. E. C. NOTES.

The celebrated Missionary, Adoniram Judson, once said to one of our missionaries—(*See Report, 1871*)

“I consider your work in Canada more difficult than ours in India, and involving more self-denial—Our missionary is looked up to and respected; yours is hated and despised. You have to deal with a corrupted christianity, but we with monstrous absurdities. You have my warmest sympathy, and my prayers for your difficult but most excellent work.”

The Feller Institute at Grande Ligne, is as usual full to overflowing, and the Committee regret having to refuse so many. A large number of Catholic boys and girls are in attendance.

\$25,000 for the new wing, and an additional \$25,000 for endowment, are an absolute necessity. A handsome beginning has been made. Be prepared to add thereto.

The name of the old Post Office of Grande Ligne at the R.R. Station was secretly changed to St. Blaise. A new Post Office has been secured near the Institute, where four-fifths of all the mail matter of the community is handled, and we retain the old name of “Grande Ligne” in the new Post Office. This is a victory over priestly cunning.

The Principal's residence and a parsonage have been erected at Grande Ligne.

Grande Ligne Church has paid to various purposes during the year, over \$600.

Principal Massé now in good health, and surrounded by an excellent staff of teachers, is full of enthusiasm and hopefulness in his work. Last year Feller Institute Graduated 2 young men into McGill, and 2 others into McMaster Universities. Among the students this year are 6 young men and women preparing for French Mission work.

The Feller Institute at Grande Ligne, and the primary Schools at our various stations, can be made an ever increasing power for moulding the destinies of the people, and reaching them with the Gospel message.

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It is estimated that five years ago not one Roman Catholic in five, possibly not one in ten, knew of the Grande Ligne Mission,—now, thanks to the Press and the stirring events at Maskinongé, Sorel and Quebec, every one who reads, knows of the Mission, and knows that it is a Baptist Mission.

The influence of the Grande Ligne Mission is increasing year by year. Its work must not be judged by the number of baptisms reported. Converts should be weighed, not counted, and the fact of success concerns quality as well as quantity.

Gradually the mass of superstitious teaching is being undermined, and the people are being led to see the errors of Rome. Some are reading the scriptures for themselves, and many are dissatisfied with Rome's teachings and tyranny.

Our utter inability to reach with the gospel, even one-tenth of the Romanists of this Province, or to properly stem the great tide of priestly influence, or to stir up our Protestant people, to its needs, and their great responsibilities, appalls us, and is sometimes very disheartening. But it is God's work, and some day we trust the result will be manifest in a great upheaval and turning to the Lord.

We have been greatly blessed and encouraged by the work and spirit of our indefatigable Field Secretary, Rev. E. Bosworth, whose untiring energy, and systematic planning, has won for him, the admiration of the Board, and the love of the missionaries and friends in general of the Mission.

Come to our help with your earnest prayers, loving sympathies and generous gifts. Try to be patient with us as we have to be patient in our work, glorious results are sure to follow.
