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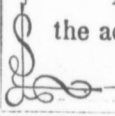

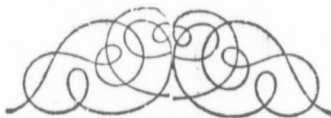

Mental and Written Arithmetic—Algebra, through Quadratic Equations—and Euclid's Elements of Geometry, first three books.

CLASSICS.

Latin Grammar—Latin Reader—Arnold's Latin Prose Composition, first twenty exercises—Cæsar's Commentaries on the Gallic War, first three books—Æneid of Virgil, first three books—Greek Grammar—Greek Reader—Arnold's Greek Prose Composition, first twenty exercises—Anabasis of Xenophon, first three books—and Iliad of Homer, first book.

Exercises in English Composition and Declamation, bi-weekly. Original Declamations in public through the last two years. Greek and Latin Prose Composition during the first, second and third years. French Language and Literature throughout the Course.

## SCIENTIFIC COURSE.

**Surveying.**—The requirements for entrance upon this and the following course of Lectures, are the same as for the Faculty of Arts; omitting the Classics, if necessary. Students are apprenticed to Practical Surveyors in the vicinity. They pass the examinations required by law, before the Quebec Board of Examiners.

**Mining Engineering.**—More complete arrangements are being perfected for this important course. In the mean time, students will pursue the ordinary Collegiate Course of Scientific studies and have frequent opportunities for *practical* instruction under the direction of the Lecturer in Practical Mineralogy, whom they will accompany to the several mines with which he is connected, and which are being wrought under the superintendence of practical Mining Engineers. Students will practise analyses of Ores, &c., under the supervision of the Lecturer in *Practical and Economic Mineralogy*. Further details in this course will be announced at the opening of the next year.

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## JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

### COURSES OF STUDY PURSUED.

**Commercial.**—Orthography, Reading, English Grammar, Parsing and Analysis, Composition, Declamation, Writing, Book-Keeping, Mental and Written Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Mensuration, Linear Drawing, Geography, History, Elements of Natural Science, English Literature, Logic, Rhetoric and French.

**Industrial.**—This course includes whatever branches are required for special preparation for the Industrial pursuit which the Student intends to enter upon.

**Normal.**—Those studies are included in this course, which are required by law, for obtaining Elementary, Model School or Academic Diplomas. The Richmond Board of Examiners meets quarterly in the College for the examination of Teachers.

**Classical.**—This course is especially designed to prepare students to enter the Faculty of Arts. It also includes the branches at present required for admission to the Faculties of Law and Medicine or to Notarial apprenticeship.

# Government of the College,

## EXTRACT FROM BY-LAWS.

SEC. I. The government of the College shall be vested in the Principal and Professors, who shall be styled the Faculty of the College.

SEC. II. The hours of recitation in this Institution shall be from 9 to 12, a.m., and from 1 to 4, p.m., during which time the Officers and Students shall be in their places, unless other arrangements are made by competent authority.

SEC. III. The Principal shall have power to direct in all matters relating to the College, and not referred herein to the Faculty, to govern the Students, and punish all crimes committed by them against the laws of the College. The Professors and Tutors shall each have the same right to govern the Students, provided they may not in any case proceed contrary to the advice and direction of the Principal.

### DUTIES OF STUDENTS.

SEC. I. Every Student shall be subject to the laws and government of the College; and disobedience, contumacy or disrespect to the Faculty, may be punished by censure, suspension or expulsion, according to the nature of the offence.

SEC. II. It shall be the duty of each Student to be diligent and faithful in study during the hours prescribed by the Faculty, and confine himself to his own room or to the Recitation Room during this period, and not to interrupt others by going into their rooms, or in any other way.

SEC. III. No Student shall be suffered to frequent Shops, Stores or Taverns; indulge in games of chance, profane language, obscenity, falsehood, quarreling, turbulent words or behavior, or other crimes of this description.

SEC. IV. No Student residing in College, or in either of the adjoining Villages, away from his parents or guardians, shall go out of town to a distance, without liberty from the Faculty, nor be absent from any College exercise.

SEC. V. Every Student shall be holden for all damages done or caused by himself, to the College buildings, or to the property of his fellow-students.

SEC. VI. It shall be the duty of the Student to attend the Recitation Room.

SEC. VII. It shall be the duty of the Student to attend with propriety on the part of the Faculty.

SEC. VIII. A Student who is absent from the College, and the brevity of the absence occur, the Faculty shall arise, according to the Faculty.

*Students residing in College buildings or grounds shall be subject to the same restrictions.*

*The presence of Students in College Class-rooms shall be subject to the same restrictions.*

SEC. I. Although it is required that it be the duty of the Faculty to conduct of Students who are virtuous and blameless.

SEC. II. The Student shall read some of the opening of the Faculty; and all Students shall be subject to the Principal at such place as the Faculty shall determine.

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SEC. VI. It shall be the duty of the Students to avoid all conduct in the Recitation Room which may be forbidden or injurious.

SEC. VII. It shall be the duty of all Students to conduct themselves with propriety on all occasions, both in and out of College.

SEC. VIII. As from the varying circumstances of such an Institution and the brevity of these laws, they may not reach every case that may occur, the Faculty shall have power to deal with any other that may arise, according to their discretion.

*Students resident in College are not permitted to be away from the buildings or grounds except at certain times and under certain limited restrictions.*

*The presence or absence of Students is carefully recorded in the College Class-Books.*

### Extract from By-Laws of the College.

SEC. I. Although the College is unsectarian in its character, it is required that it be Evangelical in its influence. It shall, therefore, be the duty of the Faculty diligently to inspect and watch the morals and conduct of Students, and in all proper ways endeavor to lead them to a virtuous and blameless life.

SEC. II. The Principal, or one of the Faculty whom he may appoint, shall read some portion of Scripture, and offer prayer in the morning at the opening of the School, and at the close of the day as he may see fit; and all Students shall be present at this service unless excused by the Principal. The Students shall also attend worship on the Sabbath at such place as the parents or guardians may designate.

SEC. III. Monitors may be appointed by the Principal, who shall

note down the absence, tardiness or withdrawal of any Student from Church, and give an account to the Principal.

### Family Worship.

All Students resident in College attend worship with the family of the Principal every morning and evening. The younger pupils recite portions of Scripture, Psalms or Hymns, every Monday morning.

### Sabbath Schools.

Students join the Sabbath Schools in their respective Churches, either as pupils or teachers. Several School-District Sabbath Schools have been maintained during the past session, chiefly by Students, members of the College Young Men's Christian Association.

This will entitle the recipient to free tuition (\$ 32.00) during the session 1865-66.
