



BUYERS'IN LONDON MARKET THIS SEASON

(Times Special Correspondence)
London, June 16—Commercial warehouses in the city report a considerably reduction in the number of Canadian representatives arriving in London to purchase stocks for the autumn season. Many houses in Montreal and other eastern cities, I am told, have not made any European visit for the last two years and have been content with stocks selected from samples carried by commercial travelers sent out from this side. The lines affected include all kinds of domestic appliances, hardware and structural accessories, but there is much less freedom of buying in draperies and men's and women's clothing.

Discussing the matter with one of the heads of a big St. Paul's Churchyard firm, I found that there was some anxiety that the reason was to be found in a further diversion of trade to the United States although he realized that Canadian caution in purchasing large stocks at the present time was an important influence.






