FISHERMAN IS SUNK BY STEAMER

Captain Overboard; Rescued as He Goes Down

DISASTER OFF LUNenburg

Auxiliary Schooner Struck by Lobster Steamer Alpha—Crew Manage to Climb From Rake-wana to Steamer's Deck

Lunenburg, N. S., April 29—While the small auxiliary schooner Rakawana, Captain Mearns, was coming into harbor here this morning at four o'clock from the fishing grounds, she was struck and sunk by the lobster steamer Alpha, bound out for Anticosti. The captain of the schooner and the two men of his crew, Clare Walters and Charles Shupe, had a narrow escape.

WANTS TO BE COMMISSIONER, BUT WANTS NO SALARY

Spokane, Wash., April 30—In announcing himself a candidate for city commissioner at the election this fall, Dr. De Lasnutt says he not only will serve without pay, but will furnish his own automobile and will run his own office. Much will donate the salary provided by the charter toward a fund to encourage new manufacturing industries in Spokane or for charitable purposes. Dr. De Lasnutt is under the impression that the salary of the commissioner is \$5,000 a year. AMBASSADORS TO MEET THEN

Belief is That Austria's Move is to Bring Pressure to Bear on Diplomats in Conference—Some Doubt as to Russia's Loyalty—Effort to Have Italy Back up Austria

(Canadian Press)

New York, April 30—A cable to the Tribune from London says: "Austria's threat to take matters into her own hands and to carry out the declared decision of the powers regarding the evacuation of Scutari is regarded here as an attempt to bring pressure to bear upon Great Britain, France and Russia to induce them to accept the Austrian proposals at the ambassador's conference in London tomorrow."

"Austria made her attitude quite clear at the conference on Monday, though the powers represented were opposed to taking military action until Montenegro had reasonable time to reply to the warning. The meeting was then adjourned until tomorrow, it being understood that if King Nicholas had not by then returned a favorable answer, Austria would issue a very short ultimatum and act at once."

"The only reply received up to the present, however, is the laconic note in which the Montenegrin government declares it cannot be bothered with political questions during the orthodox Easter holidays."

"The situation is critical and the ambassador's conference tomorrow may have a fatal issue, as it is more than doubtful that Russia has so far co-operated loyally with the other powers. **Daily Hints For the Cook**

**SOUR MILK CHOCOLATE CAKE.**  
One cup sour milk, one teaspoon saleratus dissolved in milk, one cup sugar, one and a half cups bread flour, pinch of salt, one egg. Last of all pour in two squares of melted chocolate. Bake thirty or forty minutes.

**CHOCOLATE PUDDING.**  
Have boiling three cups water. Mix together three tablespoons cornstarch, two-thirds cup sugar, three-quarters teaspoon salt, three small tablespoons cocoa. Wet with a little cold water and turn into the boiling water, stirring constantly till smooth. Cook slowly about fifteen minutes.

INDUSTRIES AND TRAINING Mr. Manning W. Doherty, chairman of the manufacturers' committee of the board of trade, said at yesterday's luncheon that the committee hoped to be able within the next two months to make a gratifying announcement regarding a new industry or industries for St. John.

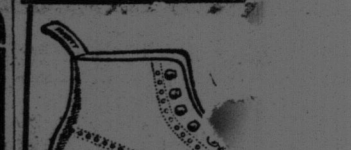

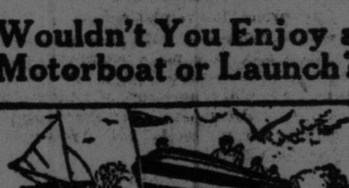

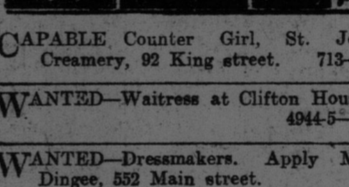

His amendment provided that Canadian banks may not lend money or make advances in excess of ten per cent. of their paid up capital to any foreign person, company, or corporation or upon the securities of such foreign persons, etc., or in excess of 25 per cent. of its paid up capital to any person residing in Canada.

Mr. White declared that it would merely be extending already existing restrictions at certain times of the year would be dictatorial to corporations.

FIRE LIMITS ARE CHANGED

Important Action Taken Today By Common Council

MATTER OF WOODEN BUILDINGS

Talk of Petition Against Restrictions—July 10 Fixed as Last Discount Day For Taxes—The Blasting Work—Rev. Dr. Raymond to Library Board

Appointments to the city by laws affecting the limits of the fire districts were adopted at a special meeting of the common council at noon today. Under the new regulations District No. 1, the brick district, is extended, the balance of the eastern portion of the city becomes District No. 2 and Carleton becomes District No. 3. The construction of wooden buildings is prohibited in No. 1, and limited to two stories in Nos. 2 and 3.

The time during which the customary rate of five per cent. discount will be allowed on all bills paid on or before July 10. There was some discussion of the blasting operations at Courtenay Bay and Commissioner McLellan announced his intention of continuing his efforts to have the surface blasting stopped.

Rev. Dr. W. O. Raymond was appointed to the Board of Commissioners of the Free Public Library. When the meeting was called to order Commissioner McLellan said that he had to present an amendment to the building laws to restrict new wooden buildings to two stories. It had been represented that this would be a hardship in some sections and provisions might be arranged to cover it.

He referred, however, to applications which had been made recently for three storey buildings and he thought there was enough in the section from which they came. If a big fire ever started there he said there was not enough apparatus in the city to cope with it.

A fourth district had been provided a few years ago in the West End, in which the construction of wooden buildings to a height of thirty-four feet above the base line is permitted and this will be done away with.

The third district is abolished. The fourth district becomes the third, and the height of buildings will be the same as in No. 2, viz. twenty-five feet.

Mr. Schofield raised the question of pitched roofs saying that they were regarded as more artistic. Mr. McLellan said that shingle roofs would be prohibited as dangerous, but pitched roofs covered with metal or slate shingles would be permitted.

The special provision in Carleton had been intended to cover the district known as "the flats," and as this had been built up the need no longer existed. A change had to be made in the law to cover the flats, and they should grapple with it before the situation became more serious. Some of the buildings erected in this district were not only unsightly and unsafe, but they were also a fire hazard.

Mr. McLellan moved the adoption of the amendment, seconded by Commissioner Schofield. The motion was passed. Mr. Agar said he was sorry the commissioner did not make it more drastic, as he would like to see the construction of wooden buildings prohibited except in Stanley ward.

Courtenay Bay Blasting

Commissioner McLellan made a statement regarding the blasting at Courtenay Bay. While he had found the Norton Griffiths Company disposed to meet their wishes and the subcontractors were willing to promise anything, he understood that Superintendent Stewart was not willing to do away with surface blasting. The company's representative admitted in court yesterday that he was an expert in dynamite work and he believed that the man who regarded as an expert did not know as much about it as he should. The present methods must be prevented and he intended to continue his efforts towards this end, but he would do so as a citizen or as a member of the municipality rather than as a city commissioner.

Mr. McLellan also referred to a change that was to take place in the office staff of his department. The motion was prepared to recommend a new appointment, he asked that the matter stand over until the next meeting.

Mayor Frink said that there was a vacancy on the board of commissioners of the Public Library, and the motion of Mr. McLellan, Rev. Dr. W. O. Raymond was unanimously chosen. The mayor expressed the hope that the new commissioner might see the others up to take action regarding the fence around the building which, he said, was in a condition to make a country barn blank.

Mayor Frink submitted a letter from G. F. Palmer and W. A. Stewart, representing the contractors at Courtenay Bay, offering to meet representatives of the city and county in conference over the blasting matter at any time and place. The matter was referred to the committee of the whole and the council adjourned.

It was said today that the applications for permits to build wooden houses, three stories high, in North End, and one for a three story six family apartment in South End, were refused. There is talk of a petition being presented against the change. It is reported that two story buildings do not pay taxes.

IN TWO SECTIONS. The Montreal train was brought to the city today in two sections, the first 45 minutes behind time, the second about an hour. Each train had a large number of passengers. The Boston train was about 20 minutes late.

OFFICIALS AWAY

R. B. Teakle, manager of the Allan Hotel, and Mrs. Teakle, left last night for Montreal, as did Captain McKelvey and his wife. The winter port season had practically ended and most of the officials of the various steamship companies have returned to Montreal or Quebec.

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
