BIG POTATO CROPS IN MAINE AND IN THE KANSAS VALLEY

Unfavorable Reports From Long Island and New Jersey Re-

C. E. Embree, who for several months has been working in the intrests of the Maine Department of Agriculture in the organization of the farmers' exchange in that state, and who is slated to be the sales or general manager of the Farmers' Union of Maine, recently organized in Bangor, has received reports that the Arosstook poteto crop is now most excellent.

It was reported at a meeting of the Farmers' Union in Bangor in the latter part of June that with 100 men interviewed previous to that meeting, a total increase of 139 acres was announced and he believes that the loss by the excessive moisture of this spring will not be greater on an average than an acre apiece. If this proportion throughout the country is kept up, it would indicate that the acreage of the growing crop this season is about the same as last year, and as more potatoes were shipped out of Aroostook in 1911-12 than ever in any one season before, it is probable that the results in the business this year will be in a way at least as satisfatcory as the season just passed.

Mr. Embree reports on the prospects in Long Island and New Jersey.

The condition in Long Island is reported to be very unfavorable to the growers. Their "come up" was fully 95 per cent and fields were looking finely up to five weeks ago. While there have been innumerable rains on the west end of the island, in Orient and Greenport on the far eastern end of the island there have been but two slight showers in six weeks, while from Manorville to Peconic on the main line of the L. I. R. R. and to Amaganset on the Atlantic coast, there has not been a single shower for six weeks and some of the early fields have commenced to die down before blossoming.

"It is the general opinion among the Long Island and Jersey farmers that sixty tents F. O. B., will be the high water mark during the height of the season."






