
Canadian Northern Montreal Land Company Forced Into Bankruptcy.


MONTREAL Feb. 6—Creditors' claims of narly \$15,000,000 were laid on the table at the first meeting of creditors of the Canadian Northern Montreal Land Company, held in Prac-tice Court today under the new bank-ruptcy law. The company was put into liquidation on petition of one of the creditors, James B. Taylor. A long list of creditors' claims con-tains the following: Lazare Brothers and Company, Ltd., London, England, \$8,552,159,68; Canadian Bank of Com-merce, \$1,100,000; MacKenzie, Mann and Company, Ltd., \$2,126,530.29; bal-ance due some fifty land vendors for land sold by them \$1,074,155.29; and Canadian Land and Investment Com-pany, Ltd., \$860,348,94. As no statement of assets and lia-bilities is produced in such procedure, it was impossible to ascertain the com-pany's holdings.

Deputation Asks Home Secretary to Modify The Immigration Laws.

LONDON, Keb. 6—A Jewish Board of Deputies, including Lord Roths-child, representing Jews throughout Great Britain, today urged Sir Wil-liam Joynson Hicks, Home Secretary, to modify the present regulations re-garding the admission of aliens. The deputation suggested an increase in the number of aliens admitted to Great Britain after the application of the naturalization law. The Home Secretary, who denied that he was anti-Semetic, replied that he could not increase immigra-tion on account of the million un-employed in Great Britain. "Any country has the right to de-cide whether it will or will not have aliens. That is an inalienable right. The Americans have exercised it very freely in the last two years. The cordon around America is now very strict, indeed," Sir William said.
