REVIEW AND PASTORAL ADDRESS BY THE SESSION.

The year 1886 has been distinguished in the history of St. Andrew's Church by many tokens of the Divine favor. The year was approached and entered on with high hopes, not unmingled with fears; but the overflowing blessings, temporal and spiritual, with which it has been crowned, have exceeded all our anticipations.

ATTENDANCE AT THE PUBLIC SERVICES.

In this particular the Session thankfully express unexceptionable gratification. The increased demand for sitting accomodation has completely filled the area of the Church, and the seats in the galleries will soon be fully occupied by those who continue in increasing numbers to join us. The attendance at the morning service has been invariably very large, while the evening congregation has increased until it is almost equal in numbers to the morning.

The Sabbath School, under the efficient superintendency of Mr. Muir, shows growth in numbers, vigor in teaching power and encouraging results. The Bible Class, taught by the Pastor, is full to overflowing, and a larger room is needed to accommodate all who desire to attend it. In these two important departments of church life and work an encouraging number

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of the young of the Congregation have been trained to give themselves to the Lord and join in full Communion with His Church. If the Congregation need special admonition, in any particular, it is in reference to the attendance at the Wednesday evening service and the Sabbath morning prayer meeting. These are not without evidence of increasing numbers and interest; yet the Session cannot but feel that, in those Special Services for devotion, the members of the Congregation have the means of a mighty Spiritual power that they have in the past made but little use of. A prayerless Congregation, however large and wealthy, must from the nature of their condition, be spiritually inert and lifeless.

THE WANTS OF THE KIRK SESSION.

The staff of Elders, in consequence of removals by death of some of their number and change of residence of others, having become numerically inadequate to the requirements of the Congregation, the Session determined that an addition should be made to their number. By constitutional process an election of Elders was recently held, and thirteen members of the Church were chosen by a large vote to the office of the ruling Elder. Of these only six have seen it to be their duty to accept the office. These gentlemen who have in a spirit of service and self-sacrifice consented to act, and who will, we trust, in a short time be ordained to the Eldership, are Messrs. George Armstrong, Charles Somerville, Robert Allan, A. S. McGregor, Alex. Fraser, and Thomas Bland.

To carry out, with anything like efficiency, the District System in so large a Congregation as St. Andrew's, and to secure proper oversight and visitation of the people, at least twenty Elders, in the prime of life, are required. Let us look unto the Lord and pray him to raise up men qualified for the work, and with willing hearts, and send them into His vineyard.

CHRISTIAN LIBERALITY.

The Report of the Board of Managers, the Session are

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glad to see, testifies to the success of the Scriptural mode of giving—by voluntary offering and as the Lord has prospered—which was introduced early in the year. As the result there is a very prosperous financial condition of the Congregation, affording abundant revenues for all our Congregational wants, and leaving something for help of new and struggling charges. All which proves that the principles of the Word of God applied to church finance are in every way the most pleasant and successful.

For Missionary and Benevolent purposes the amounts raised during the year indicate, on the whole, no lack of interest and some progress in this grace of liberality. Yet when the Session compares what is done in St Andrew's with what is accomplished by other city churches of the same class, they cannot shut their eyes to the fact that in contributions to the great schemes of the Church this Congregation is far behind.

THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

--OF-

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, LONDON. BEING FOR THE YEAR 1886.

rst. The year just closed has marked another pleasant era and circumstance in this Church's history. At the last annual meeting the Congregation was congratulated upon being set free from all debt, as the result of a special effort on the part of the Management and the people; and again this year there is occasion for congratulations on the success which has attended the inauguration of the new system of Weekly Voluntary Offerings for support of Gospel Ordinances.

2nd. It is really a matter for most hearty thanksgiving to Almighty God, the Great Head of the Church, and we trust it may be said of us as Paul wrote of the Church at Corinth (2 Cor. 9:2), "Your zeal hath provoked very many to like liberality," for the plan of Weekly Voluntary Offerings is not only Scriptural (1 Cor. 16:2), but, if rightly gone into and heartily carried out—and because it is Scriptural—the result will undoubtedly be satisfactory.

3rd. The Managers have never before been able to meet the financial engagements of the Church so promptly as during the past year, and the Board desire to express their thanks to the Congregation for the hearty and liberal support which has been accorded to the new plan.

4th. It is especially noteworthy that this result has been attained without any appeal for an open collection, and by the

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relinguishment of all pew rents throughout the entire period of nine months since the new system was inaugurated; and also the fact that no "pledges" were either asked or given by the members and adherents—the weekly offerings being wholly voluntary.

5th. The annual revenue from ordinary collections and pew rents during 1884 and 1885 averaged \$4,500, and the revenue for 1886 aggregates \$5,399—\$1,273 for the first quarter under the old system, and \$4,126 for the last three quarters under the new system.

6th. Although we have no "debts" to pay other than those which are laid upon us from love to God and gratitude for His mercies (Prov. 3: 9; 1 Tim. 6: 17; Deut. 16: 10) there are, and have been this past year, as will be seen from Treasurer's statement, special obligations always coming up and calling for a continuance of your liberality.

7th The Sabbath School received an extra allowance of \$100 for library books; the Manse was slated and otherwise repaired at an expense of \$310, and a special assessment of \$300 towards the Augmentation Fund was met by the Managers.

8th. There is no doubt that the weekly offerings have absorbed a portion of the ordinary contributions to the Home and Foreign Missions and other schemes of the Church, the Missionary Association having experienced a falling off in their collections. Last year also, owing to the effort for paying off our Church debt, the Congregation did not contribute even their usual amount towards the Mission schemes by \$200, so that instead of enlarging our contributions to these important Church schemes and taking our proper place as a leading Congregation, we have really been falling back. The Managers, therefore, take the liberty of recommending that an appropriation of at least \$200 be made to the funds of the Missionary Association.

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oth. Many of the members will a so be ready to acknowledge that we owe some help to those smaller Congregations of our own denomination in the city and suburbs, and the Managers feel themselves somewhat pledged to bring this question before the Congregation and to recommend appropriations out of the general funds. Particular reference is made to London South Presbyterian Church, whose claims were presented to us by Rev. Mr. McDonell, of Toronto. This promise was made to prevent a personal canvass, as was contemplated, and in order that nothing should be done during the year, even by special collections, to disturb the "weekly offerings" while the new plan was under trial.

Last year our London East brethren got some help by private canvass, and they really need and deserve it again; but the proper and most equitable way to give such help is out of the general funds for gospel ordinances, towards which all our members contribute. While we are dealing with these "home claims" it certainly would be a graceful act to tender similar help and "good will" to St. James' Congregation, which has been nobly holding its ground while struggling with a debt which we might assist it to carry or reduce. The Managers, therefore, warmly recommend the claims of these several Churches to the most favorable consideration of this Congregation.

The Managers have reason to believe that this enlargement of the plan will be agreeable to a large majority of the Congregation, and they recommend that the same be put into operation at once, by providing special envelopes for each month in which the families and others could contribute (monthly) for the Mission schemes of the Church, and drop into the box along with their other Sabbath offerings. 12th. The thanks of the Congregation are again tendered to the Auditors and members of the Choir for their valuable services.

13th. Although the Congregation has approved of the introduction and use of an organ into the Church, and also authorized the Managers to sell the Dufferin Avenue lot for the purpose of enlarging the building to give accommodation for organ and Choir, nothing definite was done by your Managers during the past year. The Members of Session and Board of Management, in conference, have since agreed that instead of making the alteration to the church building as was proposed at last congregational meeting, there should be a larger addition made to give increased church accommodation—chiefly for Sabbath School and class purposes—which would involve a much larger outlay.

be instructed and authorized to carry out these undertakings, and to borrow such funds for the purpose as may be necessary, it being distinctly understood that the expense of the Organ shall be separately provided for, but that the ordinary and special revenues of the church may be applied towards paying off the loan for other improvements, and no permanent debt created.

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ST. ANDREW'S SABBATH SCHOOL

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1886.

Nothing was done this year for the better arrangement and grouping of classes; but the crowded condition of the school room should make this question of pressing importance, and secure for it earnest consideration from the Session and Managers.

There is an increase in membership, and the attendance this year has been very satisfactory. Although the average for the year is only 200, being 66 per cent., the ordinary attendance (leaving out the summer vacation and bad weather) is about 225, or 75 per cent., independent of the Pastor's Bible Class which is very largely attended.

The Pastor had again the gratification of receiving a number of young people into church membership directly from the Sabbath School, 12 having been admitted this year.

During the summer vacations many of the teachers were absent, as well as scholars, and it was thought best to teach the entire school from the desk—the Superintendent or one of the Teachers conducting the Bible Lesson.

The Library, which now contains 600 books, was thoroughly overhauled, the best books being selected out and repaired; about 300 new books were added, at a cost of \$175; and new catalogues were printed for senior and junior classes. It is now in better form than for years past, and is very largely used

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by both teachers and scholars. To maintain it in a satisfactory condition it is recommended that small additions be made at short intervals, special attention being given to the needs of senior scholars.

Besides the usual summer picnic to Port Stanley, towards which \$25 were contributed out of school funds, the members of the school (over 300) greatly enjoyed a Christmas entertainment, and were each presented, through their respective teachers, with valuable gifts suited to their various ages and tastes, the cost of which aggregated about \$115.

The Band of Hope has been well maintained, and its meetings have afforded much profitable enjoyment to the members and friends

The "S. S. Times" was again supplied by the school to teachers at half-rate; and the scholars have received during the year the Westminster "Primary Lesson Leaf" and the monthly "Visitor."

On 18th July we were favored in the Church with a visit and address from Rev. G. Nergararian, of Constantinople. The collection that day, \$12.38, was given to our visitor. In addition to this we have school collections for Missions for 50 Sabbaths, amounting to \$172.96. Of this we recommend \$170 for apportionment as follows: Foreign \$30, Home \$65, French evangelization \$25, Point Aux Tremble \$45, Welland Canal \$5.

Most hearty thanks are tendered to the Teachers, Secretary, Librarian, Treasurer and Organist.

The list of money and goods is given below.

In December a Mission Band was organized by Mrs. Roger, President of the Presbyterial Society, with a membership of 30. The name they have chosen, "The King's Messengers," is suggestive of great things in the future, and we know we shall not be disappointed.

This year we can only report an increase of four to our membership, and we have to mourn the removal of two dear members by death—Mrs. Henderson and Miss Luke—which is a call to us who remain to "work while it is day, for the night cometh."

Let each of us redouble our efforts in this great work of bringing souls into the Kingdom.

In a spirit of loving consecration we would go on, and to Him who hath loved us and bought us with His precious blood be all the glory.
