The judgment of the Court of Appeal in the case of Holden v. G.T.R., is of pecular importance to railway men, and especially to those who are insured in a railway fund. Holden was a G.T.R. engineer, who lost his life while on duty on that line. His wife brought action against the company, but the trial judge held that there was no negligence on the part of the company, and that by reason of Holden having been a member of the insurance and provident society, to which the company contributed, and being bound by the company's rules and contracts, he could not have maintained an action for his injuries had he survived, and consequently no more could the widow for his death. This decision was approved by the Court of Appeal and the case dismissed with costs.

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
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
