The figures were: Sir Wilfrid Lawson, liberal, 3,658; Arthur Straus, liberal-unionist, 2,569.

Considerable rowdyism marked the canvassing. The students of a local mining college had frequent encounters with the villagers.

Sir Wilfrid Lawson's increased majority was not expected, as he was bitterly asalled for his so-called "Little England" attitude. Sir Wilfrid openly declared that the government ought to give back the Transval and Orange Free State to the Boers and he otherwise identified himself with the ardent pro-Boer party.

Mr. Strauss, who already had represented Camborne for five years was considered to be a strong local candidate. The liberal success probably was due to the dissatisfaction of the mon-conformist Cornishmen with the government's educational measures. Sir Wilfried Lawson's election brings back to Westminster a picturesque figure, long known for his vehement enthusiasm in the cause of temperance. Colonial Secretary Chamberlain sent a telegram to the electors pointing out that throughout the war Sir Wilfrid had "invariably sympathized with the enemies of his country."




