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PREMIER FLEMING ACCORDED STRIKING OVATION BY ELECTORS OF SAINT JOHN LAST EVENING

Government Leader Wins More Laurels and Effectively Silences Misrepresentations of the Disgruntled Opposition.

The Four Local Candidates Delivered Excellent Addresses Scoring Point after Point and Enumerating Benefits Accruing from Wise Administration of Provincial Affairs--Temper of Audience Augurs Victory.

The popularity of the local government in the city of St. John was made abundantly manifest last evening by the size, the character and spirit of the great concourse of citizens who gathered in the Opera House to hear its leader, Hon. J. K. Fleming, and the city candidates, Messrs. Wilson, Grannan, Lockhart, and Tilley, speak upon the issues of the campaign.

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Special to The Standard. Bathurst, N. B., June 14.—The barbers of Halifax, forty-four strong, will go on strike at the end of working hours tomorrow night, unless the bosses accede to their demand for wages.

The men ask a minimum wage of \$12 a week and fifty per cent of all takings over \$15 a week. There are only four non-union journeymen barbers in Halifax and six apprentices. The men believe the bosses will be forced to comply with their demands.

There are thirty-six master barbers in this city. Six of them have agreed to the men's terms, but the remainder say they will fight against the change. At present the wages run from ten to fifteen dollars a week.

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KNOCKS OUT CANVASS OF OPPOSITION

Contracts Awarded for Construction of Kent Co. Bridge.

Monument to Incapacity of Old Government Will Be Replaced By Modern and Up-to-Date Structure.

Richibucto, June 14.—One of the canvasses resorted to by the opposition in this county recently has been particularly interested in the two last named bridges, they went so far as to state that the call for tenders had already been cancelled and new notices were to be issued, fixing a date for opening tenders some time after the election, when the whole thing would be dropped.

This was one of their iron pot election dodges. They have been particularly anxious that these bridges should not be built by the present administration, as in each case they have themselves used them as election bait, and always carefully forgot it after election day.

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SAD ACCIDENT TO A MILLTOWN BOY

Clarence McLean Has Arm Torn From His Body BROTHER DROWNED

Another Member of Family Met Death Year Ago --Liberals in Charlotte Will Vote for Government.

Special to The Standard. St. Stephen, June 14.—A much regretted accident occurred in the cotton mill at Milltown this morning by reason of which a boy of 15 will go through life minus his right arm.

Clarence McLean, son of Harris McLean, of Milltown, Me., left school last week and went to work in the big mill. This morning he got his right hand caught in a belt and in a second he was carried to the shafting and dropped back to the floor with his right arm torn from his body at the shoulder joint.

MORGAN HELPED FROM DYSPEPSIA STEM THE PANIC

J. P. Arranged Loan of Twenty-Five Million Dollars to Tide Over the Stringency of 1907

New York, June 12.—Some heretofore unwritten history of how J. P. Morgan helped stem the panic of 1907 by supplying \$25,000,000 at a crucial time was dramatically told on the witness stand today by R. H. Thomas, president of the stock exchange at that time. Testifying before the committee investigating the so-called money trust, Mr. Thomas said on the morning of October 24, 1907, sixty per cent, was being offered for call money, and none was available. He went to James Stillman, then president of the National City Bank, and asked him for relief if possible. He told the banker that \$25,000,000 was needed.

Stillman went to Morgan saying, he would tell Morgan that he was coming. When I got to Mr. Morgan's office there was great excitement," said the witness, speaking in dramatic tones and with many gestures. "Mr. Morgan was in a conference and people were going in and out. The excitement was intense. I waited for him twenty minutes. He came out of his private office and said to me: 'We are going to lend you twenty-five million dollars, go over to the stock exchange and announce it.'"

"I said, 'Allow me to make a suggestion, Mr. Morgan.'"
"He said, 'Yes, yes, what is it?'"
"I think, I said, 'That this money should be divided up into lots and distributed among the banks. It would have better effect.'"

"Very good suggestion," said Mr. Morgan, "Perkins," he said, and snapped his fingers, "Perkins, divide that up in small lots."

George W. Perkins, former partner of J. P. Morgan, was the "Perkins" referred to.

Mr. Thomas testified that the loan had a very decided effect in relieving panic conditions.

"Then it rested with one man to say whether the panic would go on. Don't you think that's a dangerous condition?" pointedly asked Samuel Undermyer, counsel for the committee.

"I could answer that," replied the witness.

NOMINATIONS IN KINGS CO. WENT SWING
Government Candidates In Rousing Speeches Refute False Arguments Advanced by Opposition Speakers to Bolster Up Forlorn Hope—County will Vote Solid for Disciples of Honest Government.

Hampton, June 13.—The nomination proceedings for the County of Kings, despite the inclemency of the weather, brought a large crowd of electors from every parish. Sheriff Freeze declared the court closed for the nominations at two o'clock, and the candidates were called upon to address the electors, and the enthusiasm showed that those present took a keen interest in the public questions of the day. It was clearly seen that of those present three out of four were favorable to the government candidates, and the applause which greeted Messrs. Jones, Murray and Dickson as they made point after point in favor of the Fleming government made the old historic court house ring. It is seldom that the electors of Kings county had the pleasure of listening to a finer address than that delivered by the Hon. James A. Murray. He was in good form, and his address marked him as one of the finest public speakers of the Province of New Brunswick. George B. Jones showed great improvement in his address of four or five years previous made in the same place, and proved himself to be a debater of steel with any antagonist P. by declaring that he had nothing to be ashamed of in his public career, his hands were absolutely clean, and if he were to follow his own inclination and that of his family he would not be in public life at all. Instead of finding any financial benefit from holding office in the government he had spent hundreds of dollars in the interests of Kings County.
He was given a grand burst of applause as he resumed his seat.
S. H. Flewelling was the next speaker, and his address contained notices of his great importance. Small matters engaged his attention and the crowd was restless as he resumed his seat.
Honorable James A. Murray, who followed, delivered one of the best campaign speeches ever given in Kings County, and he brought the crowd to its feet time and again as he flayed the old administration and drew attention to the several improvements made by Hazen and Fleming.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. In certain districts homesteaders in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre.
Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption right for a third time must stand in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre.
Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house.

PREMIER FLEMING ACCORDS TO MAKING COMPENSATION BY ELECTIONS OF SAINT JOHN LAST EVENING

Continued from page one. In opening his address Mr. Wilson said he was glad to see so many present as there has never been an election in the province when it was more important for the people to know the truth, he referred to the promises made by himself and colleagues at the last election and declared that he could say that they had not redeemed their pledges.

When Mr. Fleming addressed a meeting in the Opera House four years ago, he pointed out the administration of the old government it was shown in that campaign that the public monies were disbursed in a dishonest manner.

The auditor had no check on the expenditures. It was known that public money was being paid to the public money to pay their butchers' bills and for other private purposes.

He then dealt with the action of the government in the interests of the workmen. "One thing the government did for the workmen was to adopt the Compensation Act, and I am glad to say that I had something to do with the passage of that act."

After pointing out some of the advantages of the Compensation Act, Mr. Wilson went on to contrast the financial administration of the old and new government, showing by facts and figures that while the present government had a record of which it could well afford to boast, the old government's conduct was marked by blunders and dishonesty.

In conclusion he asked the audience to consider seriously the records of the old and present governments, saying that if they did so they would cast their votes for the Fleming government and not for the present government which had squandered the money and resources of the province in the past.

Mr. Graham was given a hearty reception. In opening he said he was pleased with the reception accorded him, though he did not take it as a tribute to himself, but as a tribute to the government which had done more in four years than other governments had done in 20 years (hear and applause).

He was glad to be the candidate of the local government party, and he felt that the results of his canvass warranted him in saying that the government would have four supporters from St. John.

Mr. Lockhart was the next speaker. In opening he said that everything pointed to the return of the present candidates in St. John by large majorities than ever before (hear and applause).

Continuing the speaker referred to the increased revenue? They greatly increased the grants for roads and bridges; they provided for a pension to school teachers; they made arrangements whereby the price of school books was cut in half. They did many other things which it would take too long to enumerate.

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These items with the subsidy to the St. John elevator made up a total of \$48,000, or nearly half the amount of the increase in the debt.

Proceeding, he pointed out that Mr. Pugsley had issued bonds to build a railway for 45 miles, and had only built 15 miles. That was perhaps the reason why Pugsley feared the Valley Railway would not go to Grand Falls. (Laughter and applause.)

Mr. Fleming then took up the criticism that the present government had much larger revenues than the old, and showed that the old government had borrowed \$1,000,000 from extraordinary sources during its last seven years of office, and consequently had borrowed \$1,000,000 from the present administration. The old government had taken the \$280,000 received in settlement of the eastern extension contract, and instead of applying it to reduction of the debt, had placed it in current revenue. In 1902 it borrowed \$1,000,000 to repair bridges, placing the amount in current revenue. Various other expenditures which should have come out of the money to take care of a small-pox outbreak was charged to capital account, though nobody but the members of the late government would consider a small-pox outbreak as a permanent improvement.

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this respect we are in advance of any other province of Canada. Will the labor men of this city vote against a government that stood up for the principle of protecting them in this way? (Hear, hear, and loud applause.)

Continuing, Mr. Fleming said the time was ripe for the I. C. R. to become a more important factor in the transportation problems of Canada, and pointed out the practicability of the I. C. R. entering into an agreement by which it would handle the traffic of the Canadian Northern moving both ways, thus assuring the profitable operation of the Valley line, and contributing to the growth of the winter port traffic at St. John.

Continuing, he spoke of the probability of the establishment of a great iron and steel making industry on the shores of Courtenay Bay in conjunction with the dry dock. "There are," he said, "all the natural advantages for such an industry right here; there are all the facilities for bringing in the raw material. It would be an easy matter to secure the iron ore from the Gloucester mines or from Annapolis. There is every reason to believe that you will see blast furnaces, a steel making and steel ship-building plant on the shores of Courtenay Bay. The project is well within the bounds of probability, and I promise you that I will do all in my power to assist the establishment of such an industry here, an industry that would within five years add 20,000 to the population of St. John."

"I come to you tonight," he said, "not giving you a long list of promises, but to tell you that in the seven years I have been serving this province, I have been serving you faithfully as I could. I have given everything that was in me, and if I am successful on the 20th I will promise you that you will come to have the best that is in me, on your behalf, in the next four years."

Mr. Fleming then loudly cheered, and resumed his seat. After cheers for the premier and the candidates the orchestra played God save the King, and the meeting was over.

As a result of the communications sent from the quarterly board of Centenary church, the stationing committee of the Methodist conference opened the matter of centenary supply and considered it at some length at the afternoon and evening sessions held in Fredericton yesterday. The previous arrangement was that Dr. Flanders should go to Fairville, that Rev. Geo. Ross, now of Fairville, be transferred from the Nova Scotia conference to this conference for the purpose of accepting the invitation to try on, should be appointed to Centenary.

The Summerside district in which Trion is located, entered a protest against this arrangement, and this protest was endorsed by Centenary church, which at the same time renewed its previous request. At yesterday's meetings in Fredericton, Joshua Clawson and E. T. C. Knowles were present and presented Centenary's views as fully as could be done. The upshot of the meetings was that Rev. Mr. Young has now been put down for Trion as was originally planned, that Dr. Flanders go to Fairville, and that Rev. Geo. Ross shall occupy the pulpit of Centenary.

This announcement was made late last night and of course the officials of Centenary church have not had an opportunity to consider the new arrangement. It is understood that the final draft of the stationing sheet is to be presented to the conference today. Whether it will contain the arrangement mentioned above or whether there will be a further change, remains to be seen.

She arrived in Westport, however, at ten o'clock yesterday morning under her own power, the pilot boat being an auxiliary schooner. Pilot Fenwick McKelvie and Robert Doherty, who went out in the Troop cruising for vessels bound inward, and three of a crew are reported safe, having gone through a rough experience.

LIST BECOMES WEAKER THAN BEFORE

New York, N. Y., May 14—The first three hours of today's stock market dealings were very light and quite inconsequential, varying from irregularity to listlessness. Later the list became weak and feverish with a marked increase of business. There followed certain amount of liquidation with a liberal sprinkling of short selling. The movement was arrested after leading stocks had recorded declines of 2 to 3 points from yesterday's closing, but the undertone remained unsettled to the close.

Contrary to general expectations, the market at the outset gave no visible sign of relief or satisfaction at the indefinite suspension of activities by the congressional money investigation; neither did it in any tangible way reflect the temporary halt in the proceedings of the dissolution suit of the government against the United States Steel Corporation. As a matter of fact, the general attitude of the trading public toward money investment was largely one of detachment or indifference and the day's dealings probably represented little more than the usual fluctuations of the market. Contrarywise, however, the market was characterized by a certain amount of liquidation, the result in all probability of rumors of known conditions which seriously affect their dividend prospects in the immediate future. Contrarywise, such specialties as General Electric, Westinghouse, American Maltting Common and Preferred, the Tobacco shares and some of the more miscellaneous issues made early gains of one to three points, but most of these advances were obliterated and in some instances gave way to losses later in the day.

America's were featureless in London during the regular session of the exchange, but turned weak on the curb. Trading here for London was again too trifling for detailed comment, and there were no indications of an increased strain in Berlin, although that market inclined to heaviness. There were reports that German financiers had negotiated new loans in London and Paris, but our bankers were without information on that point.

Local banks more than recouped their losses to the sub-treasury by receipts from the interior and the increase of \$5,000,000 cash is not improbable. The outcome of the loan account is altogether problematical by reason of the shifting currency movements of the week. Call money was in better demand today, the inquiry sending the rate up to three per cent, just before the close. Lenders continue to make concessions for time accommodations with a slackening of commercial paper. Betterment in steel trade conditions seems to have spread to allied lines. The U. S. 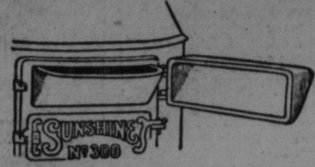

GOVERNMENT CANDIDATES MAKE GOOD IMPRESSION

Speakers of Independent Ticket also Heard—Striking Vindication of Government's Policy Carries Conviction to Large Audience at Newcastle.

Newcastle, June 14.—The Opera House was pretty well filled yesterday afternoon to listen to the candidates nominated.

J. Y. Mesereau, of Chatham, was chairman. D. P. MacLachlan, the first speaker, praised the government for its aid to agriculture that has increased the number of agricultural societies from 50 to 102; for the farm settlement act, that would provide ready-made farms to young men on payment of one quarter down and the balance in ten or twelve years; for the encouragement of fruit growing, and poultry raising; for the workmen's compensation act, factory act providing protection to workmen and compensation for injuries or death; for aiding anatomists, etc.

The St. John Valley Railway would put an extra burden upon the province. Its bonds were guaranteed for \$25,000 a mile, but it was to be operated by the I. R. C. for 99 years for 40 per cent. of gross earnings, and should this not suffice to pay the interest, there was a deposit of \$300,000 by constructing company to provide for any deficit within five years. Besides, the Dominion government had guaranteed the interest for 15 years on \$1,000,000 for bridges on said railway.

This railway would be used by G. T. P. and probably by the C. P. R. and C. N. R. He had done as much for the province would never be called upon to pay one cent on account of it.

He also endorsed the handing over of the Central Railway to the C. P. R. for 50 per cent. net earnings annually. The income might be all for some years, but the annual deficit had been \$20,000 or more. The C. P. R. would operate the new line from Minto to Gibson for 40 per cent. gross earnings, the province guaranteeing \$15,000 a mile.

W. L. Allan, Mr. Allan stood on the last four years' record of the government. He had been assured that as soon as the Miramichi Valley Railway promoters had their surveys made and estimates prepared, Premier Fleming, stood willing to grant authority and guarantee the bonds as had been done for the St. John valley line. The Acadian electors would stand firm this time as last for the government ticket.

Coun. L. Doyle had entered the contest to give the people an election. The great question was one of lumber. If elected he would do all he could to prevent lumber going out unmanufactured.

John Betts. John Betts said he was on the government ticket because Premier Fleming favored a coalition. Burchill had told him Mr. Swin had been willing to go on an opposition ticket. As a practical farmer he appreciated the government's aid to agriculture. He expected great things of the coming Dominion grant.

A. R. Copp's claim that the old government had done as much for the farmers as the new was untrue. He favored anything to keep our young men on the farms.

Councillor Swin, who said that in the by-election of 1908 he had all the wealth and power of the county against him but the farmers and workmen, who earned their living, on his side, was the next speaker. He had stood then, and still stood, on Hazen's platform of 1907. He would criticize the government only where they had gone back on it. He had supported J. L. Stewart for years, believing him a friend of the common people.

Hon. John Morrissey. Mr. Morrissey asked what had the government done—a voice in the silence answered—"Nothing—to deserve censure." All the reason he knew what that he had refused to pay Swin

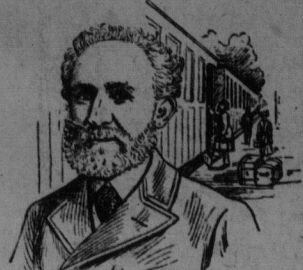

Ottawa, June 14.—Hon. J. D. Hazen returned today from New Brunswick to preside over the dinner given to the International Navigation Congress of Maritime on Saturday night. He will return to New Brunswick again next week. Mr. Hazen says that the present government will sweep New Brunswick in the elections on Thursday next and predicts that they will have a majority larger than in the last house.

Marriage Law Reference.

Ottawa, June 14.—Chief Justice Sir Charles Fitzpatrick announced this morning that the Supreme Court would not hand down its answer to the questions submitted to it by the government in the reference on the Lancaster Marriage Bill until Monday. It was anticipated that the judgment would be handed down today, but the Chief Justice stated that for certain reasons the delay until Monday was necessary.

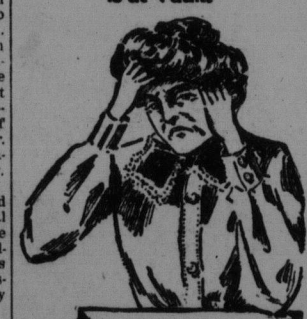

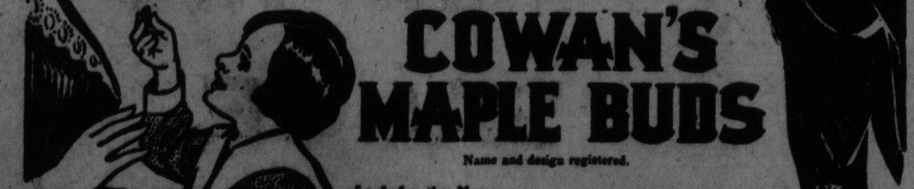

IMPOSSIBLE TO BELIEVE OPPOSITION SPEAKERS

J. B. M. Baxter Tells Fairville Electors that Copp's False Charges Have Been so Numerous as to Utterly Discredit Him—Premier Fleming and Other Speakers Win Approval of Electors.

The electors of Fairville turned out in force last evening when the Orange Hall was crowded to the doors by an intensely enthusiastic and appreciative audience of government supporters. The speakers, Hon. J. K. Fleming, John Barry, J. P. Mosher and J. B. M. Baxter, were constantly cheered and applauded as they proceeded to point out the honesty and excellent administration of the Fleming government. The feeling at the meeting proved beyond a doubt the result of the coming election.

The entrance of Hon. Mr. Fleming was the signal for a great outburst of cheering that made the rafters of the hall resound with the welcoming cry of a grateful people to the man who has, during the past few years, given such sterling service to this province. Hon. Mr. Fleming in his speech took up the manifesto issued by A. B. Copp, the leader of the opposition, and proved beyond a doubt the utter fallacy of that document, which bears the earmarks of a man with more brains than Mr. Copp possesses.

The speaker then went on to show that the charges in this manifesto were absolutely false, and proved conclusively that the old government had made the province liable for a debt of almost half a million dollars. Speaking of the Central Railway Hon. Mr. Fleming pointed out that the manner in which the old government had used this road had cost the province an enormous sum of money, the interest on which had to be paid by the people. One of the bills which the old government had left over to be paid by the coalition administration was for steel rails for the Central Railway. This bill amounted to \$45,000, and the rails were purchased six years before the Hazon-Fleming government went into power.

Another instance of the dishonesty of the old government was proven by the fact that the present administration collected over \$200,000 more revenue through the crown lands department than the old government in closing. Hon. Mr. Fleming asked the electors to support the coalition candidates in the coming election. When Hon. Mr. Fleming arose to leave the hall, the large crowd rose and gave three hearty cheers and a tiger.

Liberals Too. J. A. Barry, the former secretary of the Young Liberal Club, was the next speaker. Mr. Barry prefaced his remarks by expressing his pleasure at being present at the day, when a right-thinking man can be bulldozed by a Liberal machine, is gone. Why, said the speaker, there are hundreds of young men of the Young Liberal Club who will cast their vote this election and cast it for the Fleming administration.

Mr. Mosher was the next speaker. Mr. Mosher complimented the present government, made by Mr. Bentley, for the high school entrance examinations begin Monday morning, June 17th, and the order of examinations is as follows:—

June 17th—Monday—Morning, Geography; afternoon, English Composition.

Tuesday—Morning, Arithmetic; afternoon, Drawing.

Wednesday—Morning, Algebra; afternoon, Natural Science.

Thursday—Morning, English Grammar; afternoon, History.

Friday—Morning, Latin. Examination in reading is now being conducted by the city superintendent. The number of applications for High School entrance this year is 340.

The city schools close Friday, June 21st. These are the public examinations in all the schools and one session for the day.
