



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available dominion land in Manitoba, Saekatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the dominion lands agency or sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any dominion lands agency (but not sub-agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongsido his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after carning homestead patent; also fifty acres extra cultivation. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.


