Three Hundred Miles of Railway.

The Government Railway Bill is a cumbersome scheme, and very objectionable in many respects. Instead of indicating a great number of roads to be added it would have been simpler and better to have simply provided a subsidy for any road chartered by the Legislature and located so as to meet the apportionment of the Executive. Then the five-year provision is highly objectionable, as its tendency is to force schemes into activity before their time. It would be far better not to bring any unwholesome pressure of this kind on railway projectors, as they are always too ready to take the money of the House.

The bill in its present form will lead to the commencement of roads within five years that should not be begun for twenty years. Three hundred miles of railway within five years! This means the investment of \$75,000,000, or \$25,000,000 for every hundred miles of the projectors. Can the money not be better employed otherwise? If we put all our money into roads, what will be the result? The Government scheme contemplates the revenue surplus, the proceeds of land sales, and incurring a debt, for the benefit of the projected railways.

We fear that, if half the roads are built, the amount of Provincial debt, as issued by the Government, will be increased \$1,000,000 by this scheme (and it will be no annual charge on the revenue of \$600,000). What then? Should we be compelled to go to Ottawa for Better Terms in order to meet this demand upon the Province? We know that the revenues may be paid, but when the charges may be easily met? While we favor the policy of aiding railway enterprises to the extent of \$500,000 a mile, we are strongly opposed to the limitation clause of the bill that calculated to unduly stimulate projectors to begin work before the Government has been able to carry out its policy.

The Queen and the Napoleon. Consoling a Birth.

Yesterday afternoon Miss Brown was suspected by Mr. Edward Lowell, of Port Howe, to be concealing the body of an infant in the woods behind his residence. She was detained and policeman Pidgeon sent for, to whom she showed the place in a hollow cedar log where she had hid the body. The woman was taken to the Police Office, and as she was too ill to be left in the station house, she was placed under care of Policeman Gray, who took her to his house. She said she belonged to Quaco and had been at service for some time at a hotel in the city, where the child was born on Sunday last. She states that the birth was premature, and she was alone at the time. She fainted, remained unconscious an hour, and when she came to the child was dead. She concocted it until yesterday when she went out to hide the body. This morning Coroner Robery empanelled a jury who viewed the body and then adjourned the inquest until Monday afternoon. Dr. Christie will make a post-mortem examination in the meanwhile. The girl will be arraigned, on a charge of concealing the birth, before Justice Tapley this afternoon or Monday.
