

Certain clauses which a par in a contract made between F. B. Carvell's hav company and B. F. Smith's company in 1902, fourteen years ago, are being used in an attempt to show that Mr. Smith is not the only man to skin the farmers, but that Mr. Carvell in by-gone years conspired to get all he could for as little as he could. That is the way the matter is made to appear.

Let us look into it. The clause in the contract which it is alleged proves Mr. Carvell himself connived to beat the farmers, is in effect that those to whom he let sub-contracts were bound not to pay more than \$8 for loose hay. That is the kernel of the supposed damaging clause.

In 1902 Mr. Carvell was not in public life-he was not a member of the Commons or the Legislature. He was a private business and professional man, seeking to earn his living in a business-like way. At the time, the dominion government was giving out large contracts for hay to be shipped to South Africa. He secured a contract of upwards of 11,000 tons. He was not a produce-buyer in the ordinary sense but he was instrumental in establishing a compressing plant at McAdam He sublet his contract to practically all the regular buyers in the county, and the maximum price clause was not made for the purpose of cheating the farmers, but as all parties to the agreement knew, it was to prevent the buyers from cutting each others' throats. B. F. Smith was a subscriber to the clause, so were the balf-dozen other contractors. Each was anxious that the other should be held down to the agreed price. That was business, and good business where "business is business." Every buyer of produce seeks to buy as cheaply as he can. . So does everybody else.

Now about the \$8 price. Turning to a local paper printed a few weeks before Mr. Carvell's company got underway we find loose hay quoted at \$5 and \$6 per ton. Mr. Carvell did not squeeze the farmers down in price but, instead, set a new standard of price for hay by paying eight dollars. Local buyers for shipment had never before paid \$8 for loose

Did Mr. Carvell rob the farmers?

The attempt is being made to show that Carvell's charges against Smith have fallen flat. Have they really? Not at all! See: Mr. Carvell's charges have resulted in the government making a new contract with Mr. Smith, at a lower price, and sending a chartered accountant to see that the conditious are lived

In 1902 Mr. Carvell was in private life, seeking his own. In 1915, as for some years, Mr. Carvell was the representative at Ottawa of the farmers of Carleton county. It is his duty to see that they get a square deal

He is there to safe-guard their Carvell, interests. He is remiss in his duty if he does not.

In conclusion it may be pointed out that at the time Mr. Carvell made his charge against Mr. Smith the farmers were getting \$13.50 for pressed hay. Almost immediately afterward the price was boosted to \$15. No buyer along the line will honestly say the Carvell revelations were not the cause of the increased price.

KILLS WIFE AND SELF

A shocking tragedy occurred last Thursday at Woodlawn a settlement in Carleton county, near the boundary line. William Wilson, a well-to-do farmer, murderedhis wife and then committed suicide by hanging. It is not known on just what hour the crime took place, but a neighbor, not seeing anyone moving about the place went over and, finding the doors locked, looked in the window and was horrified to see Mrs. Wilson lying on the floor in a pool of blood with a ghastly covered with blood beside her

An alarm was given, men were soon on the scene, and found the body of Wilson hanging from a beam in the barn. The position of the body would indicate that he first fastened the rope and then jumped from the beam, on which he was standing.

Wilson had not been in good health for some years, and of late had been despondent, and it is thought he committed the dreadful act while in one of these moods. There was no trouble of a domestic nature. Husband and wife were about fifty-six years of age,

and no children. An inquest was held, several witnesses were called, and the For evidence went to show that both were about their home at noon yerterday. The room would indicate that both had their dinner, and that the crime was probably committed soon after. Mrs. Wilson's head had one terrible bruise which was likely the first blow struck by the insane husband. Her neck had two deep cuts and the blood had been wiped up with a cloth and an attempt to wash the floor.

The body of Walson was found in the barn hanging to a beam with a rope that had been used in connection with a pitching fork. The body being frozen must have been in the barn several hours. The crime was undoubtedly that of an insane man. The little settlement was greatly shocked over the sad affair and much sympathy is expressed for the numerous rel-

atives of the victims. The jury through their foreman, Geo. Campbell, returned the verdict that from the evidence submitted William Wilson and Annie Wilson, his wife, met their deaths Thursday afternoon. That Annie Wilson came to her death from the blow of an axe in the hands of her husband, and that William Wilson came to his death by hanging at his own hands,

THE CARVELL CHARGES

Apart frem the war news the great speech of F. B. Carvell in Parliament on Tuesday last week is the leading topic in newspapers. from coast to coast. All admit the speech was brilliant, poignant, [daring. The Conservative newspapers are filled with howls of rage and agonized bleatings. Independent and Liberal newspapers commend the bold stand in which Mr. Carvell challenges the government to show its hand in the shell contracts. Liberal papers are of course expected to by getting a large fifty-cent case of defend Mr. Carvell's stand, but it is noteworthy that the papers that are bound to neither party, the independents, find in his charges something more than political filibustering, something other than "hot air." It is well known that when Carvell goes gunning he always brings home a trophy, so that those not strongly partisan are looking for more than wordy charges. There are results yet to come. Come they will, in spite' of the fact that the Minister of Militia, in his strikingly brilliant speech, declared that the Shells Commission was beyond the scope of parliament for investig-

Of the very many instances of graft and favoritism disclosed by Mr. Carvell, one glaring stroke of boodling is shown to have accurred in St. John. There the York and Cornwall Cotton Co., by reason of its good Tory pull, got a contract for more than \$100,000 worth of shells. They possessed no more facilities for making shells than does Sayre's mill at Hartland. Yet they got the contract, apparently with ease, and turned it over to the Phoenix Foundry Co., to fill for them, they to receive ten per cent commission on the amount involved. They have already received \$5000 in cash rake-off.

This was only one of very many charges which Mr. Carvell hurled across the floors of the house. The Conservatives have no defence and have attempted none. They adopted the subterfuge of declaring the government had no power to investigate the work of the Shells Committee which it had itself created.

For these appalling and unanswerable charges the Tory papers, such as The Standard and The Gleaner, throw fits, and in frothing rage declare Mr. Carvell is no gentleman, a very bad man, unfit for public life.

Mr. Carvell has shown that some few others were unfit for public life, notably among them being one J. K. Fleming, likewise A. B. Morine, W. F. Garland, A. B. Foster and B. F. Smith.


