### The Great Gathering in Rome.

Rome, June 27.—There are more arrivals here of persons to witness the ceremonies in honor of the coronation of martyrs. Four hundred Bishops and thirty thousand clergy are in the city; among these are five American Archbishops, one from each of the following cities: Baltimore, St. Louis, New Orleans, Cincinnati and Philadelphia; and twenty-two American Bishops. When the Pope received the American clergy they presented to him \$200,000 in gold. The model of the yacht Henrietta in silver, laden with gold, coin was presented by Archbishop Wood. The Pope, in fitting the model from his case, said, smiling, "Aurum tuum vapor" (not all steam), alluding to the golden cargo. To the clergy he said he had only pleasant things to say of Americans, and complimented them upon the progress of the church in America. He also spoke in the highest terms of the King and of his father, the highest King, who now lives at the point of death. Archbishops Spaulding and Purcell are on the committee to prepare a reply to the Pope's allocution. The Council will probably meet in November. Archbishop Purcell will occupy the post of honor on the right of the Pope at the ceremonies on Saturday. Every attention has been shown to Americans.

Rome, June 27.—The public consistory was held today, and was attended by some four hundred Bishops from all parts of the world. The Pope, in his allocution, praised the zeal they had exhibited in coming to Rome, and their attachment to the See. He said the example of the union of the church to celebrate the coronation of Martyrs of St. Peter would show its enemies the immense power of the church. The Pope also confirmed the condemnation of errors of Oct. 29, 1865, and expressed a desire to convocate at an early day a Council to repair the evils which oppress the church. The allocution closed by a bestowal of the benediction upon the Bishops.

CHOPS IN CANADA.—With regard to the harvest of Upper Canada—which interests the Maritime Provinces considerably—the Trade Review of last week says—  
"As the crops generally must look promising when the face of nature appears so green, we need scarcely add, that the chance of a good harvest were seldom better than just now. The prospects of the farmers are nearly as bright as the beams of the great orb of day. Almost every species of crop looks well. These own this spring have come up well, and promise an abundant return, should nothing unforeseen occur; the breath of land soon, too, is very late, if any, short of the average quantity, notwithstanding the prognostications of many that the unusual lateness of the spring would render it difficult for the farmers to sow as largely as usual. The meadows are exceedingly luxuriant. The clover has been out in flower for some time, and stands upon the ground so thick that there is now no certainty that the hay crop will be unusually abundant.

The fall wheat is out in ear, and the heels are rapidly filling up. The prospect at present is, that the crop will be slightly above the average, although we hardly think the great expectations expressed in some quarters will be realised, taking Ontario as a whole. This crop came through the winter in good order, but the cold, damp weather during April and part of May, inflicted considerable damage. Taking the good and midding

together, the present indications are that the crop will be a little above rather than below the average. In many sections the farmers have got their trains in, and at the time of writing, rain is urgently needed. No danger of any crop-rot has yet been reported, and doubtless the month will not continue much longer."

Spring weather is thus described by a poet:  
"It shines, it rains,  
The shines again,  
It laughs in doubt,  
The sun comes out  
With drizzling mists between.  
Now dark, now light,  
Like day, like night,  
Tis' changing, fickle weather,  
It rains at times,  
Then, rains or shines,  
And sometimes all together.

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TELEGRAPHIC.

The fate of Maximilian is placed beyond a doubt by the publication of the Official Report of Escobedo. It is as follows:—

San Luis Potosi, June 19, 1866. Citizens' Minister of War. On the 14th inst. at eleven o'clock at night the Council of War condemned Maximilian of Hapsburg Miguel Miramon and Tomas Mejia to suffer the extreme penalty of the law.

Escobedo, writing from Queretaro, says: "I have by the execution of these master traitors, made terror the order of the day everywhere. I have imposed large contributions on the rich, and confiscated their property and their all. When I could not do it in person my delegates have strictly complied with my orders. I hope, before closing my military career, to see the blood of every foreigner spill that resides in my country."

London, July 4. The Italian Minister of Finance resigned his portfolio. The Fenian prisoners Burke, Doran, McCafferty, McClure and others, have been brought from Ireland to England.

London, July 4. The English Government authorities have postponed the grand review which was to have taken place in Hyde Park on account of the execution of Maximilian.

London, July 4. The amount of specie reported in hand in the Bank of England is £22,500,000 sterling. Gold 139 1/2.

Newcastle, July 5. Thirteen (13) houses were burned at Newcastle yesterday afternoon, including the brick building of Hon. Edward Williston, and Store of Joseph Hays.

Dublin, July 5. A Fenian leader, alleged to be General Halpin, formerly Secretary of one of the Fenian organizations in America, has been arrested at Cork.

Paris, July 6. The French Government has granted a concession to the Franco-American Telegraph Company, which proposes to lay a submarine cable from Brest to some point on the American coast.
