PUBLIC MEETING FAVORS BUILDING

Town Needs Fire Station and Council Authorized to Have Plans Made.

The public meeting held in the council chamber Friday evening last was very well attended and many speakers addressed those present. All were unanimously in favor of the erection of a Fire Station, but there was some argument as to the most desirable available site.

Some favored the erection of a combination building to house the Town offices as well as the fire station.

The meeting authorized the council to procure sketches of both kinds of buildings from Mr. Peter Blythe, and the estimated cost together with proposed sites which will be laid before another meeting of the ratepayers which will be called shortly.

SIR HERBERT AMES FINANCIAL DIRECTOR

Ottawa, August 12.—Sir Robert Borden has offered the post of financial director to the permanent secretary of the League of Nations, at Geneva, Switzerland, to Sir Herbert Ames, M. P., Montreal.

Sir Herbert, who has accepted the appointment, will be a sort of financial minister of international economy. He is to prepare the budget, present the estimates at the annual meeting of the League Council, arrange collection of assessments, supervise the expenditure of the secretariat and bring into operation a pension system for the league's staff.

CIVIC ADDRESS TO PRINCE OF WALES

Meeting of Town Council Tuesday Evening To Decide—Other Business.

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair, with Councillors Bissett, Matthews, Dickie, Ingram, Devereau, McKay and Campbell present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

A communication was read from the City Clerk of Fredericton, in reply to an enquiry, from our town clerk as to the manner in which Fredericton is handling the government's housing scheme in that city. The City Clerk stated Fredericton had not taken advantage of the Government's housing scheme.

Placed on file.

A communication was read from the Eastern Securities Co., offering to sell \$2,000 worth of a per cent. Campbellton debentures, falling due in August 1921, at 75. Placed on file.

Clerk instructed to acknowledge receipt of communication stating no money now available for this purpose. A communication was read from a St. John man who wanted to arrange a ten round boxing bout in Campbellton for the benefit of Mrs. Jack Clemmings and her five children. After much discussion on the subject the Council decided it could not grant the request.

There was one tender received for the putting in of a storm sewer on Roseberry and Minto street. This was from Mr. Jos. Caporecco who agreed to do the work at \$2.50 per linear foot, and \$40 for manholes. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A petition was read from the residents of Duncan street praying that that street be extended through the George Duncan property. This petition was referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee and to the Special Committee who now had the matter under consideration.

Seven-livery stable licenses were ordered granted. Also a license to conduct a barber shop.

The usual monthly departmental accounts were passed and ordered paid. Mr. Scott was given permission to install a gasoline tank on Roseberry street, tank to be of approved design.

Mr. James Hanes was heard before the Council. He asked for permission on behalf of the Labor organizations also the G.W.V.A. to put on a street parade, etc., on Labor Day, also to hold sports and games, and asked for the co-operation of the Council in making the Celebration a success.

Councillors Devereau, Dickie, McKay and Bissett spoke upon this question heartily approving of the efforts of those having in charge the arrangements, and on motion the Council pledged hearty support, and co-operation.

The town clerk read the motion passed at the public meeting held for discussing the desirability of erecting a fire station. Councillors Matthews, Ingram and McKay were appointed a committee to see that sketches for a fire station building, also for a fire station and town offices were prepared, and to get approximate estimates on the cost of erection and to report to the Council.

The town clerk was authorized to have the by-laws relating to motor vehicles and livery stables printed in order that those interested may be supplied with a copy thereof.

His Worship notified the council that the rock crusher was now being tested out. The crusher breaks rock into four sizes, and was working admirably.

The Street Committee was given authority to fix up Duncan Street East to the Chamberlain line, and to procure a deal from Mr. A. F. Chabert, for this land, so that the street may be extended and water and sewerage placed thereon.

Councillor Bissett brought up the matter of an old private sewer which was causing the residents in the neighborhood of Gerard street much annoyance. The town clerk was instructed to write the Board of Health Inspector with reference thereto.

His Worship the Mayor notified the Council that he had received a notice that the excavator sold to an Ontario Co., had reached its destination and was being unloaded, and that a cheque for \$6,000 had been received in payment for the excavator.

Councillor McKay brought up the two Oil Companies having several hundred empty oil and gasoline barrels piled up upon their ground. This he considered quite dangerous to adjacent buildings in case of fire occurring. The Fire Committee was instructed to investigate the matter and report to Council.

Just before adjourning His Worship reported that he had prepared a suitable address to be presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on behalf of the citizens of Campbellton, on his arrival in St. John.

HON. P. J. VENIOT IN ACCIDENT

Auto Went Through Railing of Highway Bridge—Miraculous Escape of Party.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 13.—Hon. Peter J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, was in an automobile which crashed through the railing of a bridge over the Little Nocton stream, near Peterborough, Queens County, this morning, and dropped upside down on a pile of logs in the almost dry bed of the stream. The accident happened about noon while the minister was en route from here to St. John. By almost a miracle, injuries which were suffered by Hon. Mr. Veniot and the other members of the party were not of a serious nature, but the car was badly smashed.

With Burton M. Hill, chief highway engineer, driving the car, Hon. Mr. Veniot left Fredericton this morning, accompanied by Harvey Mitchell, and Tilley Maxwell. The bridge where the accident occurred is at the foot of a steep hill down which they coasted, and it is believed they were running at too fast a speed to make the required turn, which caused them to crash through the railing.

Another auto party coming along soon afterwards found the wrecked car turned upside down on a pile of logs in the bed of the stream some fifteen feet below the level of the bridge with four of its occupants pinned under the wreckage. They were extricated and later it was said that their injuries consisted of some painful bruises.

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SERIOUS ROW AT SHIVES ATHOL

Two Men were Shot and One Hit on Head With Bottle.

A serious row took place at Athol Tuesday evening, and as a result two men are in the hospital with gunshot wounds in leg and thigh, and another with a serious wound on the head as a result of being struck with a bottle. The trouble started after a wedding. The wedding party had left by the Ocean Limited, but those remaining behind decided to have a dance.

Things were pleasant until some of the young men became intoxicated and started a row, which was soon a general mixup, and to fight the rowers and restore order a gun was produced and fired, hitting one man in the legs and another in the thigh. Another man was hit on the head with an empty bottle and severely injured. The three injured men were brought to the Hotel Dieu Hospital for treatment.

Residents of Athol say that there is frequently no observance of the prohibition law in that district and free saloons are a weekly occurrence.

JAPAN READY TO MAKE RESTITUTION OF SHANTUNG.

As Soon as China is Prepared to Fulfill the Terms of the Dual Agreement—Japanese Press Comment on U. S. Discussion.

Tokyo, Aug. 7.—(By the A. P.)—The newspapers generally are treating calmly in their editorial comment the various phases of the debate in the United States Senate on the question of Shantung. The opinion most widely advanced in that the Republic-an senators who are opposing the provision in the peace treaty relating to Shantung are using their arguments against Japan mostly for political purposes and with the idea of discrediting President Wilson.

The Yozoku Chohoku expresses the fear that the "excessive anti-Japanese allegations" will adversely affect the good relations between Japan and the United States, but says it considers the attitude of the Republicans as an attempt to "promote party interests."

The Hoshi Shimbun interprets the attitude of the Republican Senators as being based on America's desire to achieve world economic conquest, including China, from which she desires to oust Japan economically.

The Jiji Shimpu says the Japanese Minister to China already has opened negotiations with China concerning Shantung. It adds: "Japan is ready to make restitution of Shantung as soon as China is prepared to fulfill the terms of the dual agreement and that Japan will withdraw her troops and divide Tsing-Tao into three settlements, Japanese, Chinese and international."

BAKER'S STRIKE IN LONDON HAS COME TO AN END

London, Aug. 1.—The baker's strike which has been in progress for some time ended today. The men agreed to resume work to-morrow on the understanding that the strikers would not be penalized for refusing to work and that the government introduce a bill at the earliest possible moment abolishing night baking.

PREMIER SPEAKS ON CONDITIONS IN ITALY

Nitti in Review of Country's Sacrifices in War and Problems of Future.

Rome, Aug. 8.—(By the A. P.)—Francesco Nitti, the Italian premier, speaking to day of Italy's efforts in the world war, and the evidence of unrest throughout the world, declared that while there have been some cases of unrest in Italy they were not serious enough to warrant alarm.

"Italy's past full pages of history with glory and renown," he said. "In a democracy one does not live upon the vanished past but upon the work and effort which the past created—where the present must strive at all costs to perpetuate. It is in this task that the governments of today are most deeply concerned—the building and restoring of the material wrecks of war to ensure healthier enjoyment of the principles so clearly defined."

"It was in that aim to perpetuate free institutions that Italy threw in her lot. No country suffered more from the conflict or the sacrifice with greater will. Half a million dead testify in silence more strikingly than any other evidence to Italy's sterling youth, her wealth, her all that small youth, constitute another of our offerings in the cause of freedom. Five and a quarter million men went out to fight in a 28,000,000 population in 1915. Every available man in Italy was called to the colors."

"Had America been called upon to continue this proportion she would have summoned 15,000,000 men to arms. Italy's army was given willingly—eagerly on the altar of liberty to be bled witness that right is more precious than peace."

"Before the war, our annual national debt amounted to \$3,000,000,000; our total debt since the war has seen it rise to \$16,000,000,000."

"There was not one atom of endeavor that we withheld in seeking victory. We gave up our homes, our youth, our wealth, our all, that small might exercise their right of government, that the self-determination of peoples might be perpetuated."

"The problem of the high cost of living will be brought near solution when the industrial groups have accepted this need for increased output, and as long as this feeling permeates the mass of the Italian people, fear of a revolution of Asiatic Bolshevism will be unfounded."

LAPLAND ARRIVED SATURDAY WITH ABOUT 1,000 ABOARD

Halifax, Aug. 10.—The steamship Lapland arrived on Saturday afternoon with returning soldiers and women and children dependents. About 1,000 were on board; all told, of whom 800 were soldiers and dependents, half of each. They were forwarded on three trains, the first leaving at 8:30 and the third at 10:30. The destination of the trains was Vancouver and western provinces, and Ontario and Quebec points. Among the passengers was R. E. Asprey, of Montreal. There were on board sixty military, bound for the Orient and proceeding under the auspices of the Ministry of Shipping. They had intended taking a steamer at San Francisco, but the strike delayed their sailing and they now will leave Vancouver. The Lapland sailed at midnight for New York.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN LEAVING TO MEET PRINCE OF WALES

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Sir Robert Borden will leave within the next few days for St. John, N. B., to meet the Prince of Wales, who arrives there on August 15. The date of his departure from the capital has not been made public.

BATHURST VISITED BY SEVERE STORM

One Man Killed, Others Injured.

BATHURST, Aug. 8.—A disastrous cloudburst occurred here early this afternoon. Vincent Power, a returned soldier, was killed when he neared a barn, in which to take shelter, by the collapse of the structure and the falling of heavy beam upon him. His companion, Albert T. Carter, a farmer, aged about seventy years, was seriously injured. Houses in East Bathurst and several barns were lifted from their foundations and carried varying distances, all being more or less damaged. In one of these houses a woman named Chamberlain and several of her children were slightly injured. Throughout the town of Bathurst many trees were blown down, but so far as known no one was injured. A little girl named Bertin, who was crossing the Neplapique bridge at the time of the storm, is missing, and it is feared that she was blown over the bridge into the river.

Reports of serious damage to crops all over the country are being received.





WARNING AGAINST GERMAN DESIGNS
Trying to Enter France Under Guise of Swiss Citizenship.

Paris, July 12.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—A warning voice on the danger of German infiltration by devious ways comes from Luxembourg according to the Journal of Luxembourg Chamber, for naturalization, 38 come from Prussian subjects, several of whom have been identified as having been connected, more or less, with acts of frightfulness during the war. None of them, the Esch paper affirms, would have dreamt of changing his nationality had the Germans won.

Reports from Switzerland indicate that Germans will try to pacifically re-enter France under the guise of Swiss citizenship. According to a message from The Associated Press correspondent in Switzerland the other day, fully one hundred thousand Germans and Austrians are waiting on the border line between Basle and Constance for admittance into Switzerland; but the Federal authorities are keeping a strict watch on these would-be immigrants.

MANITOBA EXPECTS 50,000,000 BUSHEL HARVEST OF WHEAT

WINNIPEG, August 7.—According to a report given out here, the areas served by lines of the Canadian National Railways in Manitoba give promise of a splendid yield in nearly all grains, and there is an abundance of feed for stock. The area served by lines in Saskatchewan vary in quality of production. The only section in Manitoba that approaches dryness is at the Southwest corner of the province and this appears to extend over into Saskatchewan at that point. The central southwest, about as far as Regina, seems to be fair. It is probable that the yield of wheat in Manitoba will considerably exceed fifty million bushels.

The central areas in Saskatchewan have suffered from drought, but there are large areas even where good crops are looked for. The northeastern and northwestern districts in Saskatchewan give promise of a good crop, although again there are narrow strips of country in both of these where dry winds have wrought some damage.

At many points in Saskatchewan recent rains have materially changed the attitude of the farmers to expectations of a more favorable yield.

Rains have also, in many cases, changed the feed situation from one of anxiety to reasonable hope.

In central and northern Alberta there are considerable areas where serious damage has been effected by hot winds, but in the areas where this is a fact there are considerable sections where better than a fair crop is expected. The win is seen to have had their course and the crops on either side have not been affected. This applies, broadly speaking, to the areas lying to the north from a line drawn through Calgary east and west. In the northern areas conditions seem to be more settled and more uniformly satisfactory.





PRESSURE NEEDED.

The state of affairs existing in Restigouche as regards the enforcement of the Prohibition and Inland Revenue Acts is a disgrace to any community. There are, we venture to state, dozens of private stills scattered throughout this county, and at many places what is known as barley beer is freely made and sold. So much of this is being offered to the public that hardly a country dance or wedding can take place without some of the rowdy element appearing with plenty of refreshment and start a row which is in the end attended in a serious shooting affair.

About a year ago the Prohibition Act inspectors visited a certain section and seized a "still" and a very large quantity of liquor in process of manufacture. Although this party was convicted under the Prohibition Act, the Inland Revenue Officials took no steps and as a consequence it is still a row still in active operation and others seeing the laxity in the enforcement of the law are going into the business.

The Graphic has repeatedly called attention to these facts, but the press officials are probably too busy to be the matter of attention. The matter of an impetus for this county should be pressed and pressed favorably at once. While T. Mann was in charge of the enforcement of the Act we had a reasonable sober county, but it is anything but sober at the present time.

MAKING A GOOD TOWN.
A town must be a good place to live in and a good place to make a living in. The following four points are the essentials of a good town:
1. Production of Manufacture.

Transportation.
Civic Welfare.
People congregate in a town for trade, and if the prosperity growing out of that trade is not directed along the lines of civic welfare, the town is not much good. Water, supply, sanitation, streets, sidewalks, schools, and entertainment feature are the essentials of civic welfare.

The average man does not realize what it means to bring people to his town or what it means for people to go out of his town.
Your town is as big as the trade territory that you supply. If you read our fifty miles, that is the size of your town. You want to protect that town front.

Some farmers' and towns' people think that the merchants of the town are a nuisance, and send away for everything they want, forgetting that their property is more valuable because of its proximity to town facilities. They also ignore the fact that their children attend the town school, and their boy or girl works in the town stores.

The things enhance the value of the land located near the town, and the farmer owes the town something for increasing the value of his land.

The bigger the town is, the farther the influence on farm property extends. There are two kinds of people that are attracted to towns; one is the old man who has made his money, and the other is the young man who wants to make money.

Communities of the East are losing to the communities of the West, because the west has better towns. The spirit of the west makes it what it is. They are real boosters, and back their boosting with their money. The booster who does not back it with his money is a four flusher.

Good roads are needed to hold the people, and good roads are a factor in the development of a town. The evolution in other communities.

There are just two things a small town can do—either grow into a big town, or get off the map.
If a town has good transportation it is a good retail town. The support of the town comes from the dollars that go over the retail counter.

Retailers are the backbone of the community from an economic standpoint. It is not what a man carries—that is an individual asset, but what he carries is a community asset.
Money must go over the retail counter before you can have civic welfare. The trouble with the average town is a community—meaning Ed. Making a Good town N. 2.

Some towns furnish everything to make it a good town, but nobody is willing to furnish the time and energy. We have to get all the interests of the community together, as well as individual responsibility.

This co-operative work should be a part of your business and not a community duty. You help to gain by helping the other fellow to gain.
If we in Campbellton wish to make our town a REAL TOWN, we should be well advised by the following:
"Real towns are not made by men afraid."
Let somebody else gets ahead.
When everybody works and nobody shirks.
You can raise a town from the dead.
And if when you make your personal stake.
Your neighbor can make one, too.
Your town will be what you want to see.
It isn't your town—it's YOURS.

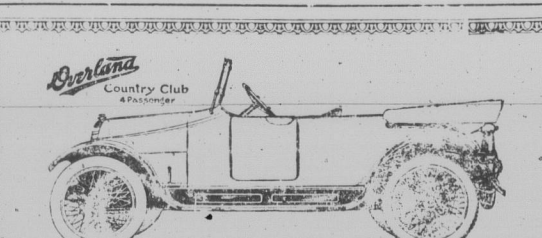
SCHOOLS OPENING.

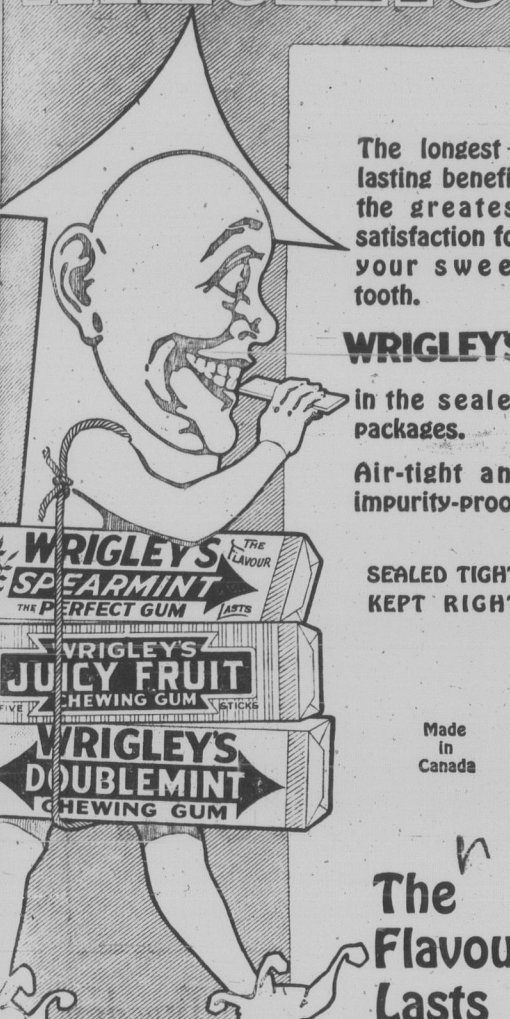

DRAMATIC ENDING TO BOMB MYSTERY

After Gruelling Examination Civic Official Jumps From 11th Floor Window.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 7.—The mystery of the bombing of the house of Oscar Lawler, former United States district attorney, which may result in his death, ended at twelve-thirty o'clock this morning, when the body of Charles H. McGwire, assistant chief engineer for the Los Angeles city board of public utilities, crashed 100 feet to the pavement of New High street.

The man who jumped to his death, the attorney and the murder of his family, leaped to death from the eleventh floor of the hall of records when he had been conclusively fastened upon him.

In his effort to avenge himself for the loss of the executor's fees from an estate of which he was administrator before being removed by the action of Mr. Lawler, he destroyed Mr. Lawler's house, brought the victim and his wife to the doors of death, and then ended the crime cycle by breaking every bone in his body in his leap to death.

The demolition of the bomb outrage was as unexpected as it was shocking and sensational. While the theory that the bomb was planted by terrorists, who were supposed to be fleeing through the desert to the Mexican border, was being exploited, the police and detectives were quietly but effectively wearing a net of evidence about McGwire in which every thread was vital.

When the word "indictment" was mentioned at the end of three hours of grueling examination in which McGwire was made to realize that his cleverness had not hoodwinked the district attorney or police chief, he turned pale, stepped to a water cooler, and then dashed for the open window. A detective who seized him was thrown against a radiator. With his eyes bleeding by blood from a six-inch wound in his forehead, he held to the desperate, trapped man. McGwire, his body out of the window, made one last effort, and escaped the clutches of the wounded man, and dashed to the pavement eleven stories below.

Yes, but they are the graves of undertakers who have died with broken hearts."

In conversation with His Worship Mayor Murray, His Excellency expressed his intention to pay an official visit to our town at a later date.

The party includes Their Excellencies the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, their three daughters and one son, who has just arrived from England where he has been attending college.

At ten o'clock Wednesday morning the party motored to Matapedia in two cars, where His Excellency spent the day, fishing, the members of his family spending the day in motoring around. They returned to Campbellton Wednesday evening, remaining upon the "Hochelega" until the Governor General leaving as stated upon the Ocean Limited this morning at 10:45 for St. John. The rest of the party will remain here upon the yacht cruising about the Bay Chaleur until His Excellency returns on Saturday to rejoin them, when they leave for home upon the "Hochelega."

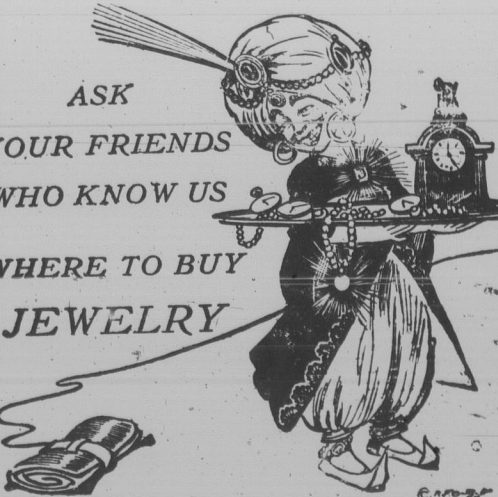

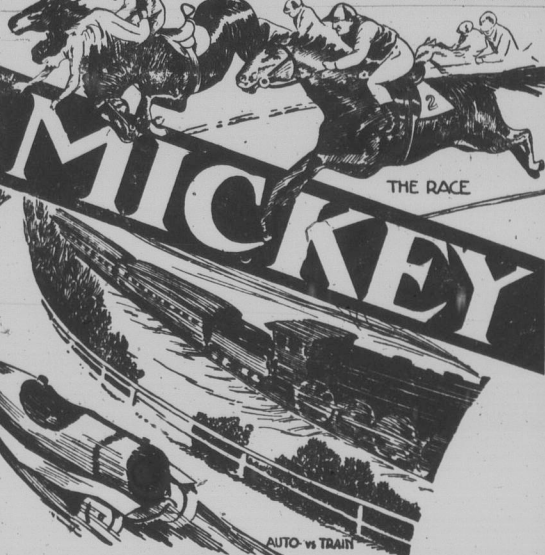
