Paris Feb. 18.-Measures to be taken in the event that it is necessary to coerce Germany to fulfill all reparation and disarmament terms were discussed at yesterday's conference between Premier Briand, War Minister Barthou, Marshals Foch and Petain, General Weygand, and others, says the Echo de Paris.

The military experts of France already have planned down to the smallest detail the advance of French troops toward a secret destination, in case of such an eventuality, it is declared. The class of 1919 will be kept with the colors, and the class of 1918 will be called up, and arrangements have also been made to extend the French occupation area into the Coblenz district should the Washington administration decide to recall United States forces

Berlin, Feb. 18.—Anticipating the early death of former Empress Aug-usta Victoria at Doorn, Holland, the pan-Germans, according to the Vospan-dermans, according to the vossische Zeitung, are preparing for an imposing public funeral at Potsdam. Members of the Hohenzollern family are declared to be negotiating with the government for a funeral of the former empress in Germany, but no agreement has as yet been reached.

TO A GOOD BASIS Montreal, Feb. 18.—The necessary of making every effort towards the restoration of currency in Canada to

restoration of currency in Canada to a gold basis as soon as possible was urged by Prof. Stephen Leacock of McGill University, in a lecture he delivered today before members of the staffs of the banks in Montreal. "There is no financial safety," said Dr. Leacock, "except in the gold standard. Without it there can be no stability for our trade, no security for our progress and no reliance upon our public credit. This doctrine was regarded before the war as a truth universally accepted. 

REDS NOW CONFESS THAT SOVIETISM IS ABSOLUTE FAILURE

Descriptions of Serious Conditions Appear in Bolshevik Papers.

DESTRUCTION PREVAILS

Famine Is Spreading in Central Sections of Country.

New York. Feb. 18.—A description of apparently serious conditions in Russia under the Bolshevik administration, as taken from Soviet newspapers and other documents, is given in a statement issued by A. J. Sack, director of the Russian information bureau in the United States. The official Bolshevik organ, Izvestia, of December 28 last, contains the text of a speech by Trotzky before the eighth congress of soviets, in which he declared: "At present about 14,000 versts (36,000 miles) of Russian roalroads are destroyed, so that only the central part, about 15,000 versts, remain intact. Three thousand bridges and 16,000 telephone and telegraph lines have also been destroyed, and we have about 61 per cent of sick locomotives."



Cairo, Feb. 18.—Alarm over the present situation of Egypt's cotton-growing industry is expressed in a memorandum to the council of ministers from the cotton research committee. Should the diminution in the yield of cotton continue, the committee says, the result would be a vertiable disaster for Egypt. It was just over 100 years ago that Mohammed All introduced the cotton plant into Egypt, and the value of the crops steadily increased every year until last year, when it passed the sum of £100,000,000. In spite of 2ll efforts, however, the return per fedden (1½ acres) has in the last 20 years constantly diminished. Although there has been a considerable increase in the area under cultivation, it is said, the total yield last year was less than it was ten years ago. It was only the exceptional prices ruling in 1920 that produced the record value of the crop. Pointing out the difficulties met with rappling with the problem, the committee declares that during nine years the administration has been confined to no fewer than seven ministers and, therefore, it is not surprising there had been no continuity in the study of the problem.

FRUIT GROWERS

Ontario Convention Wants Committee To Note Changes.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—At the closing session of the Ontario fruit growers' convention in this city today, a resolution vention in this city today, a resolution was passed as follows:

"That a strong committee of fruit growers be nominated to watch any changes that may be proposed or made on the present tariffs on fruits coming from or going to the United States, and that they keep in colse communication with the fruit commission at Ottawa."

This resolution had reference to the Fordney bill just passed by the United States. No reference to retailation was contained in the resolution, but one of the delegates in supporting it declared it might be necessary for the Canadian fruit growers to take some decided stand to protect their own interests.

This, of course, did not include the exemptions on his charitable bequests which undoubtedly amounted to the 15 per cent of his total income exempted by law, nor did it include the income from tax exempt Liberty bonds and other tax exempt bonds bonds and other tax exempt bonds such as state and municipal bonds which were excluded by law from fed-

eral tax. Mr. Rockefeller was a large holder Mr. Rockefeller was a large holder of municipal and state bonds when the law was passed exempting them, and as he bought these when interest was low, they capitalized high.

At one time he is said to have bought \$25,000,000 of New York City bonds in a single deal.

By some it is estimated that Mr. Rockefeller's gross income in 1918 was somewhere between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000, probably more nearly approaching the larger figure than the smaller one. The same experts figure

Shall Germany or France Pay the War Bill?

If Germany doesn't pay, France must. In effect, this is the reply of a large section of the press of the United States to those economists who insist that the war bill presented to Germany by the Allies-226,000,000,000 gold marks, payable in forty-two years, plus a 12 per cent export tax—is more than that nation can pay. "The astonishing fact is that it does not seem to have occurred to these British and American pleaders for Germany that if she does not pay for the devastation she methodically wrought, her victims must," exclaims the Philadelphia North American, which points out that "when it is argued that the sum demanded in reparations should be reduced, this means precisely that sufferers from her aggression shall be penalized to the extent of the remission."

On the other hand, some editors are convinced that the Allies are demanding more than Germany can pay. "France wants Germany's blood, and it deserves Germany's blood, but it must get it by transfusion, not by murder," remarks the Louisville Courier-Journal. "Germany can never pay the 226,000,000,000 gold marks indemnity," exclaims the Seattle Times, and the New York Evening World characterizes the reparations program as "amazing and impossible."





SOVIET ENVOYS REACH MEXICO

Propagandists From New York With Moscow Credentials Arrive for Confabs.

Washington, Feb. 17.-Advices from Mexico City state that two Bolshevik emissaries from Moscow have arrived in that city and exhibited their credentials to Mexican communists.

The two envoys are Sergius Landentoff and Michael Silvetzch, according to the report, who arrived there from New York. Both claim to be members of the Bolshevik propaganda committee in New York and state that they are under orders to attend two Bolshevik con-gresses in Mexico, one at Mexico City on February 15, the second at Tampico on

gresses in Mexico, one at Mexico city on February 15, the second at Tampico on February 27.

Landentoff showed his credentials to interviewers, they being signed by the Moscow authorities. It is said the two Bolshevik envoys have been summoned by the I. W. W. and other extremists of Mexico and are alleged to be related to the Third Internationale.

Landentoff, after pointing out that the Bolsheviki were not anarchists and defining the word "Bolshevism," which he declared meant in its signification "rule by the majority," said:

"We are militarists and we sustain a powerful army under iron discipline which is known in my country as the Red Guard. If we have attempted to socialize certain industries on behalf of the community, we are supporting trade as being an indispensable intermediary between the producer and the consumer."

LE PAS DOG RACE FASTER ON ALASKAN METHOD OF MUSHING

Siberian Coast Dogs and Set ter Mongrel Are Exceptions To Usual Huskies.

The Pas, Feb. 17.-By Canadia

The Pas, Feb. 17.—By Canadia. Press.—Fast time should feature the fourth annual Hudson Ray dog derby to be held from here to Fiin Flon and return, a distance of approximately 200 miles, for a purse of \$2,500, March in The Alaskan method of racing has been adouted by the "mushers." and already a sarge improvement in the speed of the teams has been noted in the preliminary trials. What was thought to constitute a record, when Goyne, the derby winner of 1820, covered 100 miles in 13 hours and 14 minutes, has been beaten by the local racing teams is easy fashion time and again this winter in their workouts. One contestant driving a team of nine huskies, covered 50 miles in 5 hours and 14 minutes. This is three miles an hour more than was possible under the old single-file system of harnessing, when barely seven miles an hour could be made.

The type of dogs in the race differ in only two respects from the reliable husky or wolf-mongrel so familiar in Northern Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Stewart possesses a team of eleven Siberian coast dogs with very sharppointed ears, low in the body and well lengthened. Goyne is the other exception, with a team of twelve setters of the setter-mongrel type. His team is perhaps better trained to command than any ofthe others, and he has exhibited wonderful control over them. They do not appear as hardy and powerful as the husky dogs in the other teams, but they may be speedier for shorter distances.
