GREAT LOSS BY STORMS

Every Cannery on the Fraser River Is Damaged, And Several of Them Have Been Entirely Demolished.

Serious Effects of Gales in Other Sections—Nine Vessels Missing From Vessels Port.

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 27.—It is estimated that nearly a million dollars' worth of damage has been done by storms along the Fraser River.

TRUSTEES' ELECTION CONTINUED FIGHTING

The Situation That the School Board Is In.

Two Trustees To Be Elected From Each Ward.

General Vote Does Not Affect Educationists, of Whom There Will Be Fifteen.

The act by which the number of wards in this city was reduced from six to four and the general vote inaugurated, affected the board of school trustees only as regards the number comprising it. The mode of election remains unchanged. It will be re-introduced, the desire upon the part of its promoters, was that it should affect the school trustees just as it did the aldermen; that a lesser number would be elected, not by wards, but by a general vote of the people; but by the opposition of the education department defeated this purpose. So that the trustees' election is still controlled by the old law, which states that they shall represent wards, not the city at large.
