## HEIR'S TO \$65,000,000.

The Windfall That Has Come to Some Lucky Ohioans from England. SPRINGFIELD, Ohic, Dec. 29.—The heirs o the vast and historic Hyde estate have been discovered in this (Clark) county, by the attorneys in the case. In the early part of the nineteenth century two brothers named recentury two brothers named re-spectively Roswell and Reuben Kimble, married sisters named Hyde in England. To the former were born two children, George and a sister, the latter dying without issue, and to Reuben Kimble and wife were born a son and three daughters. The Duke of Connaught Accidentally Ehoots Prince Christian.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The injuries from which Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holwhich Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg is suffering were caused by one of those accidents that are so frequent in the hunting field. THE CIVIC NOMINATIONS. The aldermanic elections are really the most important from a public point of view. We need a good mayor to preside over the deliberations of the Board, to counsel and to hold in check as far as in his power lies irrepressible ward grabbers. There are always some of these elected. But the aldermen after all carry through the civic tegislation and are in the main the concrolling force in either spending the people's noney economically or squandering it.

There is a pretty big field of aldermen to choose from this year; in some of the wards the number nominated is so large that it may be that some of the best men will be left at home. That would be a regrettable circumstance. What the city needs this year, as every year, is the service of successful business men who will bring the experience and tact that they have applied to their own calling to bear upon civic management, who will have no direct or indirect personal interest in corporation con tracts, and who can be trusted in all things and at all times to economically administe

The city is a co-operative concern, and he mayor, aldermen, water commissioner and school trustees are the director selected by the taxpaying co-partners to manage their business. We each and all have a responsibility therefore in selecting only the best men available for the respecPROFITS OF A LOTTERY.

There are profits in a lottery, but with the exception of a very small amount distributed as bait to those who are anxious to get something for nothing, the money goes into the coffers of the lottery managers. In Canada, the promotion of lotteries-even the sale of lottery tickets-is prohibited by law, but nothwithstanding this fact so strongly has the gambling spirit seized a portion of the people that tickets continue to be sent in and find ready purchasers. On Thursday last the customs authorities at Montreal seized a large number of tickets, which will entail a heavy loss to the agents and purchasers. It is too bad that the lottery managers are able to escape loss or punishment, as they had already been paid for the tickets. Moreover, if by chance any one of the seized tickets should draw a prize, the company will be gainers, as the ticket cannot be produced. Only a small percentage of lottery tickets sent into Canada are seized by the customs authorities. The Louisiana lottery managers take about \$40,000 a year out of Canada, while lotteries in Mexico, Havana, Hamburg and elsewhere manage to wheedle many dollars of hard-earned money out of Canadian patrons.

Some idea of the manner in which

lottery-crazy people are imposed upon by the management of these catchpenny schemes can be gathered from an artic the famous Louisiana lottery in the January Forum. We are there informed that the income and the outgo of this colossal financial octopus per year are as follows:

Face value of tickets, twelve drawings. . . . . . \$28,000,000
Total of prizes, twelve drawings..... 14,767,200

Rem-inder, representing gross pr fits.....\$13,232,800 It is doubtless true that all tickets issued are not sold; but this does not affect the dishonesty of the general rate. So, the un-sold tickets are placed in the wheel, with the sold, and the company is the beneficiary of the winnings upon them. The meaning of this is, that the company would sell tickets to the value of \$28,000,000 and collect the same; generously refund to a comparatively small number of winners less than \$15,000,000, and approximate to themselves more than \$13,000,000. In other words, this company takes a trifle less than 47 per cent. for themselves, a

trifle more than 53 per cent. for the limited band of winners. This is as near to an ap-The United States and Chill.
