OTTAWA, March 25.—The members of the House might as well have saved themselves the trouble of meeting on Saturday afternoon for all the work they got through. The Government announcement of no revision of the voters' lists this year and Mr. Haggart's statement regarding Government railways were the features of the sitting. Mr. Charlton lost a resolution in favor of penny postage. Only one item was passed in committee of supply. Next week will be a heavy and interesting windup of this the shortest session in many years. The Minister of Militia introduced a bill legalizing the employment of certain professors of the Royal Military College who had been employed for some time contrary to the provisions of the act. Mr. Foster answered several questions put by Mr. Laurier. He would on Monday state whether the Gov-ernment intended to ask Parliament this session to ratify the French treaty or not. He laid additional papers on the table. The Government would drop the bill amending the Franchise Act and introduce a bill suspending for this year the law rea bill suspending for this year the law requiring an annual revision of the voters' lists. This means no revision this year and consequently no general election. At the beginning of the session the Government said there would be a revision, and as is now the fashion with them, they intend the opposite of what they started to do.

A grave constitutional issue is involved in this subject—nothing less than the necessity for a British Government like ours to be in accord with the Crown. Here is the position: On the advice of his constitutional advisers Lord Stanley sanctioned the negotiations which led up to and culminated in the treaty. The treaty was signed by the accordited representatives of the Crown and is an accomplished fact. The Queen's Privy Council for Canada is responsible for the signature of the Queen's representatives, and if they repudate a document sanctioned by these signatures they place themselves by such action in direct antagonism to the Crown. It would never do to advise the Crown to assent to a treaty with a foreign government and after the Crown had accepted that advice to refuse to ask Parliament to ratify the treaty. Parliament is at liberty to reject it but the advisors of the Crown are not at liberty to break faith with the sovereign. This is the position in which the Thompson Administration stand in relation to the constitutional aspect of the question. Changes in the Inspection of Petro-

Reduced Standard as to Quality Legal-ized.

(Special Telegram from our own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, Ont., March 25 .- The Government bill amending the petroleum inspection act has not yet been printed, but I have been able to get a confidential copy. In the first place it transfers the control of inspection from the customs to the inland revenue department. The flash test is reduced from 95 to 90 degrees. Section 4 of the said act is repealed and the following

"Petroleum, designated and known as high test petroleum, may be sold for use in Canada, for illuminating purposes, when it weighs not more than eight pounds and forty-three hundredths of a pound per gallon. If it will stand a fire test of 200 degrees by Fahrenheit's thermometer, or if, when heated in an open cup to a temperature of 180 degrees by Fahrenheit's thermometer, it does not emit a vapor that will flash."

Notwithstanding anything in this section contained, the Governor-in-council may designate places at which petroleum for illuminating purposes may be imported in tank cars, under departmental regulations, but all petroleum so imported shall be put into packages, inspected and marked in accordance with the requirements of section 7."

Latest Developments.

The scene of the flood in London West was visited by large crowds all day yesterday. The walks were not at all inviting, where there were any, and where there was no walk the mud was less inviting still. Dundas and Center streets were passable, but very muddy, and stranded sidewalks were to be met with everywhere.

While the water is off the streets that cannot be said of the low lying fields, especially those hemmed in by the breakwater. In these places it appears to have a much harder time getting out than it had getting in. The grand stand in Tecumseh Park is gradually looming up out of the water as the latter recedes through a sluiceway in the breakwater provided for that purpose by some far-seeing village council in days gone by. The noise of the water falling into the river outside could be heard for a long distance away, so great was the force of the body behind it.

Although the water has been subsiding since Saturday noon, there is still several feet in the baseball grounds and surrounding gardens. It will be many days before the last vestige of it has drained away or evaporated, and it will take as many more of days before the good wives in the flooded section have thoroughly dried and beat the mud out of their carpets. The dampeas, if followed by warm weather, may also cause much sickness and distress.





Special cablegrams from Great Britain are this week unusually interesting. Cabling from London, the correspondents give an excellent resume of the latest notable happenings, which will not be uninter esting to readers of the ADVERTISER.

In the Imperial Parliament.

"It is useless to disguise the fact that the opposition to home rule legislation which has arisen is of an unexpected character," cabled a well-informed correspondent. "Much of it comes from new sources of a non-political kind. It was not until now that many property interests in Ireland which consider themselves menaced by Mr. Gladstone's bill have realized that there was an actual probability of its becoming a law. These interests are now bringing forward a new and formidable opposition. All that money can do directly or indirectly to defeat the plans of the Liberal party will be done. The warfare will be made desparate and unscrupulous. No one can forecast the effect of the use of the new weapons both within and without Parliament. It must be admitted, however, that the fate of the bill even in the House of Commons is becoming ex tremely doubtful. Tory filibustering has been so outrageous as to call for rebuke from the Speaker, which will probably have some effect upon the more respectable members of the party, but the majority scarcely make a pretense of concealing their intention of continuing the tactics which have reduced public business to chaotic condition.

"The Speaker is plainly out of sympathy with the Tory plan of campaign, and no doubt is felt that when, after Easter, Mr. Gladstone proceeds to grapple seriously with the obstructionists he will receive full

support of the chair."
The Liberal Caucus. "The object of the general meeting of the Liberal party, which has been summoned for Monday at the Foreign Office, is to im-press upon all members of the party the paramount importance of giving continuous attention at the House of Commons, no

ous attention at the House of Commons, no matter what personal inconvenience may be involved, in order that the Government majority may be kept at its full strength and the Speaker thereby encouraged to deal firmly with the filibusters.

"The Tory suggestion that the meeting has been convened to reconcile dissensions and restore discipline in the Liberal party is ridiculous and mendacious. There has been some grumbling at the apparent leniency shown to the Tories, but Mr. Gladstone has only to anneunce his intention to put his foot down firmly and he will receive assurances of the enthusiastic, unanimous support of his followers."

Local Option in the Balance.

It is not improbable that the Premier will ask his temperance friends to agree to the nement until next session of the Anti-Liquor Bill, the opposition to which has attained really formidable dimensions, Attained really formidable dimensions, thanks to the money lavishly spent and the arguments speciously circulated among the masses. Bismarck Surprises Everybody. BERLIN, March 26 .- Prince Bismarck has surprised everybody by inspiring an ex-ceptionally unprejudiced article in the

ceptionally unprejudiced article in the Hamburger Nachrichten concerning the Army Bill crisis. He advises the Government not to think of dissolving the Reichstag. While recommending the adoption of the bill, with slight alterations, he warns the Chancellor against undue persistence in pressing the measure upon the deputies for immediate action. Even if, when finally presented for ultimate decision, the bill should be rejected, the Government should defer an appeal to the country until after the existing unrest among the electors shall have been allayed. Even among the Ministers this advice is regarded as statesmanlike and free from personal bias. The Emperor, however, still clings to his conviction that the bill should be pushed at once to its fate in the Reichstag and that in case of rejection an immediate dissolution should follow.

Stoned the King. Rome, March 26.—The city is in a state of great excitement over an assault that

Rome, March 26.—The city is in a state of great excitement over an assault that was made Friday evening on King Humbert. The King was returning from Villa Borghese, when a person having the general appearance of an Italian workingman threw a stone at him, the missile almost striking the monarch. Several persons rushed upon the assailant and seized him before he had a chance to make another attempt at violence. An immense crowd assembled and cheered the King with frantic enthusiasm, and all the way to the palace the scene was like a triumphal progress. King Humbert gracefully acknowledged the ovation and was evidently deeply moved. The assailant was, it appears, a religious fanatic named Berardi. He was sentenced to imprisonment for seven years for a murder committed a number of years ago. In 1882 he was released from prison and emigrated to America. Berardi, however, recently returned to Rome. He has acknowledged since his arrest that his intention was to insult King Humbert because the King declined to be reconciled to the Pope. He also claimed that he had been engaged in forming missions for the liberation of slaves in America and China.

Two physicians have examined Berardi, who threw a stone at King Humbert yesterday, and have pronounced him insane.

BERLIN, March 26.—All attention is centered to-day upon the flabby figure and coarse face of Ahlwardt, the Jew-baiter. centered to-day upon the haby haiter accoarse face of Ahlwardt, the Jew-baiter. The brazen confidence with which this man attacked in Parliament the foremost men of the present regime, the utter shamelessness with which he accepted the disapproval of all of his charges, the undiminished effrontery with which he then appealed to the people, and the unprecedented enthusiasm with which they placed on his brow the laurel wreath of victory, have demonstrated to German statesmen that they have now to deal with a popular movement which is less calculable and hardly less perilous than is the social democracy. In the higher political circles everybody is asking, "What can we do with him?" The only method of squelching him is believed to consist of leading him to behavior beyond even the wide latitude allowed to members of the Reichstag. Even then, however, his arrest would be fraught with perils, for he has a following not less enthusiastic than Stockers or Bismarck. Many persons who have previously advocated drastic measures against him were appalled by his triumphal progress on Wednesday through the cheering him were appalled by his triumphal prog-ress on Wednesday through the cheering crowds which filled the Leipziger strasse from the Wilhelmstrasse corner to the Leipziger platz.

Financial Feeling.

Market supplies have been advanced by the Bank of England. Everything, however, points to renewed ease after the holidays, especially as it is abundantly clear that the Austrian currency requirements will not seriously affect European markets. The latter have amassed £26,000,000 more, which will be quietly supplied by the open markets, even if the United States exports cease. Silver has been weak and unsettled. There was a general advance in English railway securities. American railway securities were inert and weak early in the week, but advanced sharply on Friday and Saturday.

At Paris an improved tone was noticeable on the Bourse.

At Berlin business on the Boerse was depressed last week, partly on account of the uneasiness as to the Vienna market. At Frankfort prices on the Boerse were firm.

The robber's confederate, who was outside, hearing the girl's voice, jumped in through the window and rushed to his companion's assistance. This did not dismay the little heroine. They backed slowly toward the window, but suddenly they sprang forward, and one of them knocked the revolver out of the girl's hand.
