



cal Expert Visits the Hairy Ainos.

ments Upon Their Lips.

(Special Correspondence from Paris.) The world of science has just been aroused to the keenest interest by the report, made public for the first time, of the Commercial Geographical Society of France, giving details concern-ing a race of mustached white women, who inhabit the Island of Yeso, one of the northernmost of the Japanese group. The facts which the report furnishes are those learned by A. M. Klabukowski, an explorer and delegate of the society, who has recently returned from a visit to the strange

people described. The existence of Ainos, as the race to which these women belong is called, has long been known to ethnologists, but Mr. Klabukowski has the honor of being the first explorer of modern times to penetrate the country and look upon it and its peopl with the keen eye of the ethnologist. He is believed to be the only white man who has gained full information concerning the women whose mus-taches are equal to those ever worn

by any member of their race. The explorer reports that these women are massive in appearance, and, in fact, appear to better physical advantage than the men. They have high cheek-bones, and are distinctly Caucasian. They do not have that ghastly yellowish complexion char-They have acteristic of the Chinese and Japanese, but rather bear every appearance of white women who have lived much in the open air.

STYLE OF THEIR MUSTACHES. Their mustaches, when natural, are always black and silky and are invariably turned up at both ends. M. Klabukowski says they reminded him of the fashion mustachios affected by Emperor William of Germany. It was at Muroran, one of the ports of the Island of Yeso, that M. At Sea's Bottom.

A Remarkable Submarine Loco-

motive. It Can Also Act as a Surface Tug.

Millions of Sunken Treasure.

A Baltimore correspondent writes: The Argonaut, a submarine craft, has been aunched at the yards of the Columbian iron works, in the presence of a large rowd of interested spectators. This vessel, the invention of a Bal ommercial work, including the explo ation of the bottom of rivers, lakes, bays and even seas for treasure seeking and other purposes of a kindred

The cigar-shaped hull has near the bow two big iron wheels as large as an ordinary cart wheel. The edges are corrugated like a cogwheel. A similar wheel is attached to the stern. The vheels are intended to enable the vesel to run along over the bottoms of ers. Divers can come in and go ou f the vessel while she is on bottom.

A SUBMARINE LOCOMOTIVE. The Argonaut is 36 feet long and 9 feet in diameter, built of steel and strongly ribbed, to resist the water pressure. She is propelled when on the surface by a White & Middleton gasoline engine of 30-horse power. She an also be wheeled along the botton by the same engine, the air supply ing obtained through a hose leading to the surface and supported by float. She can be propelled along the bottom by an electric motor as well taking current from a powerful storage battery.

A strong searchligt is located in the bow, capable of lighting a pathway in front of the craft as she moves along the bed of the ocean. Lenses are also arranged to project a beam of light to either side of the boat, so that objects may be seen in the vicinof the vessel as she passes along Her speed is estimated to be about eight miles an hour on the surface and about five miles on the bottom. She will have fuel carrying capacity fo un of about 2,000 miles. The crew w consist of a captain, an engineer and four divers. It is claimed that one man can handle her.




