FIRE CHIEF CLARK'S FUNERAL WILL BE HELD WITH THAT OF LATE SERGT. COCKBURN

City of London, 7th Regiment of Fusiliers and the Masonic Fraternity Will Combine To Do Honor to the Heroic Dead---The Interment on Friday.

At a special meeting of the city council last evening arrangements were made for the funerals of the late Chief Clark and Sergt. Cockburn. Resolutions of sympathy were expressed to the families of the deceased, and it was decided that the council and all civic bodies should attend the funerals.

The last sad rites will be performed on Friday afternoon. The funeral services of Sergt. Cockburn will be held at the house at 2 o'clock, and at 2:45 the cortege will move to the residence of Fire Chief Clark.

The services there will commence at 2:30 and the funeral will be held at 3 o'clock.

Both funerals will be conducted by the Masons.

The members of Tuscan Lodge will officiate at Chief Clark's and the members of Corinthian Lodge at that of Sergt. Cockburn.

The Seventh Regiment will attend Sergt. Cockburn's funeral, and also the soldiers of the barracks.

TRIBUTES TO THE DEAD.

Tributes to the bravery of the dead heroes were paid by all the aldermen last evening. Each had lost a friend in Chief Clark, while Sergt. Cockburn was personally known to all. They were brave men and had died at duty's call.

"Gentlemen of the Council," began Mayor Stevely in opening the proceedings, "when we met two weeks ago to pass resolutions of condolence on the death of an old and faithful servant we little thought that the flag would be again half-masted in so short a time. On that occasion we met to pay our respects to an old servant who had literally worn himself out in the city's service. Now we come to pay our respects to three men than whom none seemed assured of longer life. We mourn the premature death of Chief Clark, Sergt. Cockburn and Fireman Wein.

THE LATE CHIEF.

"Chief Clark was a gentleman in every sense of the word. That he was an efficient officer we found. On his death resolutions of sorrow came to us from all over Canada. How we can replace him I do not know.

"When in Montreal recently I mentioned Chief Clark's name to Chief Benoit. He told me then that Chief Clark was a splendid fireman. He knew him and was well aware of his efficiency."

THE RESOLUTION.

Ald. Greenlees then moved the resolution of condolence, seconded by Ald. Saunders.

"Whereas, the late Lawrence Clark has been the chief of the fire department of the city of London since March 21, 1904, and has proved himself to be an ideal fire chief, and placed his department in a most efficient state;

"And, whereas, the late Lawrence Clark was a brave and fearless man, always the first to face the flame, smoke or other danger;

"And, whereas, his sterling, manly character endeared him to his men and won the complete confidence and respect of the mayor and aldermen, and the public generally:

"Be it resolved, that the council of the city of London, assembled in special session, do hereby convey its expression of the deepest sorrow that while fighting the fire in Westman's hardware store he should lose his life by the falling in of the floors;

"Be it resolved, that the council bear record to his excellent qualities as a brave and fearless man and successful fire chief.

"Be it also resolved that the council express to the bereaved widow and children its sincerest sympathy and assurance that all join her in mourning her irreparable loss, and pray that she will be sustained by Divine Providence.

"Be it further resolved, that the city clerk shall have suitably engrossed a copy of this resolution, and have it forwarded to the sorrowing family of the late chief." A Good Man.

Ald. Greenlees declared that the resolution voiced his sentiments fully, Mayor Stevely, London: and he knew the same was true of every alderman around the board. He boro I extend heartfelt sympathy. referred to the events leading up to the appointment of Chief Clark, and declared that it was a very fine choice for the city of London. Chief Clark Thos. Gillean, London, Ont.: had reorganized the fire department, and had made it one of the most efficient in Canada.

"I was always struck by his energy, occasions," said Ald. Greenlees. "He was a strict disciplinarian, but he always held the respect and esteem of his men. I deeply regret his untimely demise. It will be a long time before we get his equal."

The duty collected amounted to fourteen and a quarter millions, a decrease of a little over six millions compared with the first four months of last year. During July alone the Miss Elizabeth May Stewart Becomes husband, he yelled, 'Let me go! I'll finish imports amounted to \$22,967,094, or a decrease of \$11,590,904, and there was a falling off of \$1,914,257 in the customs revenue for the month.

Canada's exports for the four months ending with July totalled \$67 .-205,010, a decrease of \$5,485,364, compared with the same period the year Miss Elizabeth May Stewart became before. The exports of the products of the mines fell off about a half million dollars in value, while exports of fish increased by about the same amount. There was a decline of a million and a quarter in the export of lumber. Half a million dollars' worth of animals and their produce were exported. In agricultural exports there was a decline of four and threequarter millions. Manufacturers increased their exports by three hundred and fifty thousand dollars. During the month of July only the exports totalled \$23,116,234, which is four and a half millions less than during the same month of last year.



THOUGHT DEAD

But Strychnia Revives

Pulse.

New York, Aug. 19. - A man w from every medical standpoint was dead, and had been dead for five ninutes, was brought back to life last evening in the Eastern District

Hospital in Williamsburg. An experienced nurse watched him apparently, pass away. She applied all the usual simple tests for life and found none. Then the house surgeon examined the man carefully, decided life. 50c a box-6 boxes for \$2.50. that the vital spark had gone permanently.

> Yet a tenth of a grain of strychina, njected into the body as a matter of experiment, brought back the pulse, and six hours later the man was in better condition than he had been an hour before those functions ceased. Oscar Culver, a ward patient suffering from tuberculosis and rheumatism, is the man who had the amazing experience. He probably will not recover, since his tuberculosis is far advanced. But he is in no immediate

danger of death. Miss Josephine Ryan, senior of the ward and skilled in medicine and surgery is the nurse who first pronounced the patient dead, and whose opinion did not change when he began

to breathe again. It was Dr. Michael Jaffer, head surgeon of the hospital who positively decided that Culver had passed-away, and who then experimented with the strychnia injection. The tenth of a grain which he injected into Culver's veins was enough to kill three healthy

Both the doctor and the nurse frankly admit that they are not only astounded, but awed, at the experi-

"It is the most wonderful case I ever saw or heard of," Dr. Jaffer declared several hours afterward. "I still believe the patient was dead. I was so sure of it that I ordered his body removed to the hospital morgue. feel that I can say with certainty the man actually had passed away. Yet, the strychina and some manipulation for artificial respiration brought him about."

Culver was an iron moulder before his tubercular condition precluded further work. He was a fairly powerful man, and is about 49 years old. He made his home with his wife and family at No. 262 South Fourth street. He was brought to the hospital about three weeks ago.




