### J. C. ELLIOTT TO LONDON LIBERALS

Member for West Middlesex Speaks of the Problems Before Legislature.

THE POWER LEGISLATION

Mr. Elliott Lays Bare the Rather Peculiar Position of the Government in the Matter.

A very interesting meeting was held n Hyman Hall last night, when Mr. C. Elliott, the member of the Ontario Legislature for West Middlesex, spoke of some of the questions that had come up for consideration in the session that has just concluded. The audience was fairly large. Vice-President Briggs acted as chairman.

After speaking of the pleasure he felt in being asked to address the Liberals of London, Mr. Elliott went on to say a few words in commendation of the movement that had given rise to such organizations as the Young Liberal Club. Men owed a debt to their country in return for the liberties she has given them, and this debt could only be adequately paid by men who were conversant with the political situation of that country, and could thus exercise their franchise both honestly and intelligently.

Rights of the Legislature.

Through the provisions of the British North America act, said the speaker, the Provincial Legislature had been given the right to deal with questions oncerning property and private right. and as there were ten times more maters that concerned private interests han there were of wider concern, it was a necessity that men should be onversant with what was taking place n the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. 

The prices that have maintained for local hay this year have made its use for baling practically impossible, and almost all the supply for this purpose has come from the vicinity of Chatham, and was laid down here, freight paid, for from \$10 to \$10 25 a ton. This being the case, there is just that much more hay in the country to be disposed of, and under the circumstances it is very unlikely that there will be any advance in price. while it is easily seen that the possibility of a drop in price is very great.

#### DR. BANKS' ADDRESS ON MODERN PALESTINE

Interesting Description Given a London Audience of the Holy Land.

Modern Palestine was Dr. Banks subject at the Auditorium last night. His lecture dealt largely with the Palestine that is more or less familiar to all Bible students, but the very excellent pictures and descriptions of the places illustrated proved both interesting and instructive to the large audience that listened to the lecturer. Most of the lecture was given over to a description of the places made fam-

ous in Bible history. There are three diverse elements that make up the 60,000 population of Jerusalem. Of these 40,000 are Jews, 13,000 Christians, and 7,000 Moslems There were many pictures of Jerusalem and all of great interest, bu probably the most interesting of these was the view of the Wall of Wailing, where on Friday afternoons the Jews congregate to lament over the downfall of their nation. This custom has continued now for more than a thousand years. there is a temple in the very centre of which is a large square of bare rock the traditional site of the great temple

of Solomon Damascus.

At Damascus there were other enes of great interest. The place in from which Paul was let down, the traditional place of Paul's vision in the road to Damascus, the house of Ananias, who opened Paul's eyes, and "the street that it called Straight," that now anything but justifies that name. In Bethlehem is the beautiful church of the Nativity, the best authenticated of the many historical sites, and the tower of the Virgin, where both Christians and Moslem

Many of the sacred places of Pales ine are in the hands of the Moslem and are closed to Christians. Some interesting views were shown of the traditional sites of Old Testament scenes. Absalom's tomb. where the passing Jew to this day stops to hurl a stone at the monument that marks the resting place of an ungrateful son.

There is also a tree called "Absaom's Tree," which is supposed to be tree in which Absalom was caught by the hair. The tree has grown in the form of a gallows and, perhaps, this is a more likely reason for it being called "Absalom's Tree." Tomorrow night Dr. Banks will give the concluding lecture of the series on "Palestine Underground," which will deal with the excavations and discoveries in the ancient cities of that






